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Exercise stops smoking

A RECENT US study published in Pediatrics has found that exercise may hold the key to getting teenagers to quit smoking.

The study divided teens into three groups, one was given smoking cessation advice; the other support and counselling on healthy lifestyles and stress; and the last group was given counselling plus physical activity and encouragement.

On average, at the start of the study the teens smoked half a pack of cigarettes per weekday and a pack a day on weekends.

At three months into the study 16% of the smoking cessation advice teens had quit; whilst 21% in the counselling group had quit and 31% of the counselling plus exercise group had quit.

Deciphering evidence

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia has announced a critical appraisal workshop will be held at PAC11, dealing with the art of deciphering evidence and talking to patients about it.

Titled 'Is it any good and does it matter', the workshop will be held on 09 October, and will enable participants to apply a structured critical appraisal approach to a research paper, understand 'evidence based' practice, gain insight into biases and inappropriate claims of treatment efficacy and have the confidence to advise staff and consumers on latest claims and reports on medicines and treatments.

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Immediate action for NCDs

AUSTRALIA and the UN need to act now on the growing threat of non-communicable diseases, according to the Minister for Health and Ageing, Nicola Roxon. Addressing the plenary session of the UN high-level meeting on noncommunicable diseases, Roxon told delegates that "NCDs pose a growing threat - to our health systems, our societies, and our

economies". "In Australia's own backyard, the Pacific has some of the highest rates of NCDs in the world.

Epilepsy discrimination

EPILEPSY Australia is hoping to raise awareness of the burden carried by sufferers of epilepsy, with the results of its latest survey showing one in two Australians living with the condition have experienced discrimination.

Currently affecting around 224,000 Australians, epilepsy is the country's most common chronic brain disorder.

"Current literature suggests that 10 per cent of Australians will have a seizure during their lifetime, onethird of whom will be diagnosed with epilepsy," said study head, Mark Cook, Chair of Medicine St Vincent's Hospital, Melbourne.

Interestingly around 52% of participants said they experienced depression.

"But saving lives and improving the health of the global community is an investment that will pay a huge dividend," she said.

EU trials on the ICTRP

THE European Union Clinical Trials Register (EU-CRT) has been recognised by WHO as one of the primary registries for its International **Clinical Trials Registry Platform** (ICTRP).

As a result of EU-CTR's recognition, its information will be available through the ICTRP portal by the end of the year.

"The recognition of EU-CTR as primary registry for ICTRP illustrates the global effort to improve transparency in research activities," said Dr Marie-Charlotte Bouësseau, co-ordinator of ICTRP.

"Facilitating public access to information on clinical trials is an ethical responsibility," she added.
