Urine test approval

THE first molecular test to help determine the need for repeat prostate biopsies in men who have had a previous negative biopsy, PROGENSA PCA3 (Prostate Cancer gene 3) assay, has been approved by the US Food and Drug Authority.

The FDA has also approved Zioptan (tafluprost ophthalmic solution) to help reduce elevated eye pressure in people with openangle glaucoma.

MEANWHILE the publication of three biosimilar guidance documents by the FDA has been welcomed by industry members.

"The documents provide the infrastructure by which pharmaceutical manufacturers can seek approval for lower cost, clinically comparable alternatives to some of the most commonly utilised biologic agents purchased by health care organisations," said health care supply contracting company, Novation.

"In recent years, an increasing amount of hospital pharmaceutical expense is being devoted to the acquisition of high cost, large molecule biologics, which historically have not been subject to "generic" competition because they are complex to manufacture and are derived from living organisms.

"Biosimilars, or drugs that clinical studies deem "highly similar" to these large molecule biologics, will provide effective, safe, and costefficient alternatives to expensive, current biologic drugs," the company added.

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Sleep and memory

DISRUPTED sleep may affect memory later in life, according to new US research.

"Disrupted sleep appears to be associated with the build-up of amyloid plaques, a hallmark marker of Alzheimer's disease, in the brains of people without memory problems," said study author Dr Yo-El Ju.

To come to this conclusion researchers looked at the sleep patterns of 100 people between the ages of 45 and 80 who were free of dementia.

Half of the group had a family history of Alzheimer's disease.

The average time participants spent in bed during the study was 8hrs, but awakenings during the night meant that the actual average time they slept was 6.5hrs.

In addition, researchers found that people who woke up more than five times per hour were more likely to have amyloid plaque build-up compared to people who didn't wake up as much.

Those who spent less than 85% of their time in bed actually sleeping were more likely to have the markers than those who spent more than 85% of their time in bed actually sleeping.

"We need longer-term studies, following individuals' sleep over years, to determine whether disrupted sleep leads to amyloid plaques, or whether brain changes in early Alzheimer's disease lead to changes in sleep," Ju said, adding that the study lays the groundwork for further investigation as to whether sleep manipulation can prevent Alzheimer's.
