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THE good news is that in general Australians are healthy, and the majority feel positive about the quality of their life, according to the latest national report card on health released by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare.

"Australia compares well internationally: we enjoy one of the highest life expectancies in the world-79.5 years for men and 84.0 years for women-our level of smoking continues to fall, and most children are fully immunised," said AIHW Director and CEO David Kalisch.

But it's not all good news for the nation's health, with the report card finding that most Australians also have at least one health risk factor that is likely to contribute to poorer future health.

As such, the report found that among developed countries, Australia has relatively high death rates from heart disease, diabetes, and chronic lung disease.

In addition, comparatively, Australia was found to have one of the highest rates of obesity, with the latest figures demonstrating that one in four Australian adults and one in 12 children are obese.

Interestingly, the report found that all Australians have at least one risk factor for poor health, and that worryingly around one seven people have five or more risk factors.

The most common combination of risks was inadequate fruit and vegetable consumption with insufficient physical activity.

"Many Australians eat too few vegetables, fruit and wholegrain cereals, and eat too many foods high in fat, sugar and salt," Kalisch said

"And almost 60% of Australians over 15 don't do enough physical activity to benefit their health," he added.

Meanwhile, the report also found that whilst many older Australians have good mental and physical health, nearly half of those aged 65–74 have five or more long-term physical health conditions.

Yervoy approval

THE TGA has approved Yervoy (ipilimumab) as a monotherapy, for the treatment of patients with unresectable (inoperable) or metastatic melanoma who have failed or are intolerant to prior therapy.

The approval follows a global study of 676 patients with previously-treated, inoperable or metastatic melanoma, which found that around 45% of patients who were treated with Yervoy monotherapy were still alive at one year and more than 20% lived at least two years.

Speaking about the approval, Professor Peter Hersey, Research Director of the Newcastle Melanoma Unit and Consultant Immunologist to the Melanoma Institute Australia said, "It has been many years since a new therapy for metastatic melanoma has been approved in Australia".

enVista approval

THE US Food and Drug Administration has approved the enVista hydrophobic acrylic intraocular lens (AIL), the only FDAapproved AIL with labeling which states: "No glistenings of any grade were reported for any subject at any visit in the clinical study".

Rural infrastructure

THE Government has announced \$8.7 million in grants for 50 infrastructure projects across Australia, designed to benefit rural and remote living patients. See www.health.gov.au.

US flouride warning

THE US state of New Hampshire has put in place legislation which requires a notice be posted to warn people who are living in areas where public water is fluoridated that the element is in their water, and that six-month-olds should not be routinely fed infant formula mixed with fluoridated water.

The warning reads: "If your child under the age of 6 months is exclusively consuming infant formula reconstituted with fluoridated water, there may be an increased chance of dental fluorosis. Consult your child's health care provider for more information".

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Children & asthma

LESS than 50% of asthmatic children control their symptoms despite available treatments, according to the European Academy of Allergy and Clinical Immunology (EAACI).

Speaking at the EAACI Congress 2012 in Geneva, the Secretary General of the organisation and Pediatric Asthma ICON Chair, Prof Nikos Papadopoulos said "Pediatric asthma is a chronic disease and therefore, requires chronic treatment".

"With this Consensus we highlight that pediatric asthma can be controlled by establishing a partnership between patient and doctor and adhering to a welldesigned personal management plan.

"Regular monitoring ascertains the effectiveness and fine-tunes treatment," he added.

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The HIS Report

47% of men aged 40-69 years suffer some level of erectile dysfunction, and 67% consider their condition to be a problem, according to The HIS Report.

Based on a survey of more than 1,500 men conducted in March, the report found more than half of all men aged 40-69 would not be comfortable seeking advice from a GP about erection problems or their libido.

Interestingly, the report also found that half of men who experience urinary problems have never consulted a doctor about their issues.

Researchers did note however that the majority of men find it easier to talk about their libido or erection problems if their GP indicates these issues may be related to or caused by another health condition.

Tea and prostate cancer

A UNIVERSITY of Glasgow study published in Nutrition and Cancer, has linked high levels of tea drinking with prostate cancer.

The study tracked the health of more than 6,000 male volunteers over a period of 37 years and discovered that those who drank more than seven cups of tea per day had a 50% higher risk of developing prostate cancer versus non-tea drinkers or those drinking less than 4 cups per day.

"Most previous research has shown either no relationship with prostate cancer for black tea or some preventive effect of green tea," said study head Dr Kashif Shafique.

"We don't know whether tea itself is a risk factor or if tea drinkers are generally healthier and live to an older age when prostate cancer is more common anyway," he added.

LAZY or genius?

With most developed nations worried about rising levels of obesity, it is somewhat ironic that there seems to be a never-ending stream of products created to take physical activity out of people's daily lives, the latest of which is a smart bed which makes itself.

Already a viral sensation, the mechanical bed, designed by a Spanish company OHEA, is designed to detect when its owner gets up and out of bed, and then to automatically put the bed back into order.

To make itself, the bed uses mechanical arms which pop up and draw the bed covers back into the "made" position, whilst the pillows are pulled into place using a cord, then lifted, readjusted and placed back at the top of the bed. The whole process takes around
