THE Department of Health and Ageing has issued an open invitation to apply for funding to develop and deliver Virtual Clinic mental health services.

According to the Minister for Mental Health and Ageing, Mark Butler, the Govt wants the Virtual Clinics to be an area where people with low to moderate levels of mental disorders can receive online counselling with the assistance of a therapist.

"Therapists will use cognitive behavioural therapy techniques to deliver online counselling and will also be able to refer clients to selfguided online therapies, or other services, according to the client's needs," Butler said.

Hospital masterplan

A NEW masterplan for the redevelopment of the Royal Hobart Hospital has been unveiled this week.

The plan will be funded by \$586m provided by the Federal and State Governments, with the design set to include new inpatient and Women's and Children's precincts to improve services for patients and expand the hospital's bed capacity.

"The Women's and Children's precinct will deliver integrated services including a first for a Tasmanian hospital - a dedicated adolescent unit, with flexible design to allow for the appropriate inclusion and treatment of adolescent mental health patients," said Tasmania's Premier, Lara Giddings.

Pharmacists who complete the online program will also be able to access it on an ongoing basis, allowing them to continue to reflect on their encounters with patients using statins and/or ezetimble.

"We are excited to be working more and more in the online space and to be providing pharmacists

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with the flexibility and individualisation that online activities can offer," said NPS Clinical Adviser Dr Danielle Stowasser, who added that the program sets a benchmark for online health professional development programs.

"The changing environment of pharmacy is seeing more pharmacists take part in patient education, screening and monitoring of conditions, lifestyle modification and medicines adherence," Stowasser said.

"The Pharmacy Practice Review helps foster these behaviours and instils more confidence in pharmacists when providing advice to patients with or at risk of cardiovascular disease.

"We urge pharmacists to register for the online NPS Pharmacy Practice Review and see for themselves what a valuable investment of their time it is," she added.

Manual fee ending

PHARMACISTS will not be able to claim the \$0.15 electronic prescription fee manually for eligible prescriptions from 01 April 2012.

From this date, pharmacists will automatically receive the fee for all eligible prescriptions.

Eylea in Australia

BAYER'S Eylea (aflibercept) has been approved for the treatment of neovascular (wet) age-related macular degeneration (AMD) in Australia by the TGA.

Age-related Macular Degeneration is a degenerative disease of the retina that causes progressive, painless loss of central vision and at present it is the leading cause of blindness in the country, with wet AMD being its most severe form.

It is estimated that in 2010, there were over one million Australians with AMD, with one in seven people over the age of 50 affected.

Eylea is the first recombinant fusion protein approved to treat wet AMD.

PIDG sees no problem

THE first meeting of the Pharmaceutical Industry Discussion Group (PIDG) has concluded that, so far, there have been no unintended consequences from the 2010-11 Budget Measure 'Further Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme Pricing Reform'.

The PIDG was formed by the Government to secure the passage of the amendments to the Act, and its function is to discuss the potential and actual impacts of Further PBS Pricing Reform, with reports to be tabled in the Parliament detailing the outcomes of each meeting.

In its first meeting, which was tabled in Parliament on 13 March, the PIDG discussed the potential impacts on patients and the pharmaceutical industry of Further PBS Pricing Reform (including new or increased statutory price reductions and Expanded and Accelerated Price Disclosure (EAPD), to apply to all non-exempt drugs listed on F2).

Despite finding that there were no reports to the PIDG of unintended consequences of the reforms implemented so far, members did note that there had been concerns around the possible impact of the largest of the measures, EAPD, which will trigger its first round of price reductions on 01 April 2012.

As such, the PIDG recommended that the Department of Health "work with peak bodies to continue to manage the potential impacts of EAPD, and monitor the sector in the months after the price reductions come into effect". THE national health agenda needs a far greater emphasis on diabetes, according to the Baker IDI Heart & Diabetes Institute, Diabetes Australia and the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation.

The call comes as the trio prepares to present the results of a new joint national diabetes assessment to Parliament, *Diabetes: the silent pandemic and its impact on Australia*, which forecasts "a legacy of pandemic proportions" could be coming Australia's way, with one-in-three of today's Gen Y's set join the ranks of 'Generation Diabetes' in their lifetime.

The report provides evidence that by 2025 type 2 diabetes will triple in prevalence and will affect three million Australians.

"A tragic prediction, especially given that type 2 diabetes is preventable in a substantial proportion of people," a statement from the report's authors said.

The report also found a continuing rise in the occurrence of type 1 diabetes, particularly in young children aged 0-4 years, but did not pinpoint a reason for the rise.

"Prevalence of type 1 diabetes in Australia is one of the highest in the world," the authors said.

To hinder the progress of this growing epidemic, the trio are asking the Government for a re-commitment to the development of a formal national action plan, in keeping with the United Nations Resolution no. 61/225 on diabetes (a plan which recommends countries review and strengthen

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critical activities to contain the growth and burden of the disease).

"Time is of the essence because unlike other developed nations, despite agreeing with these global recommendations, Australia has failed to take comprehensive action and implement change," said Lewis Kaplan, CEO, Diabetes Australia.

Meanwhile, the report's lead author, Baker IDI's Associate Professor Jonathan Shaw, said "The battle against diabetes requires concerted efforts on a number of fronts - strategies to slow down the rapidly rising number of those developing the disease and ensuring those living with diabetes are able to manage this insidious condition effectively.

"We must also do everything we can to fully understand diabetes via research," he added.

The report highlights four priority areas for the Government to look at, including: focused, timely and integrated action - to ensure national diabetes strategies are reviewed and strengthened to reflect Australian commitments to the UN's resolution; as well as changes in policy, legislation and attitudes - to provide an environment where healthy lifestyle choices can and will be made.

The last two priority areas include access to and availability of info, technologies and proven treatments for every person with diabetes, irrespective of their socio-economic background; and collaborative efforts that ensure research remains at the forefront of effort to find a cure.
