# **Expressing concern**

A survey by Philips AVENT, has shown that 61% of Australian mothers who have expressed milk after returning to work in order to continue breast feeding their child, were made to feel uncomfortable or embarrassed over expressing their milk in the workplace.

Only 29% of new mothers who participated in the survey had access to a comfortable and private space at work and 33% did not feel comfortable talking about expressing at work with their employer.

These figures highlight why mothers are more likely to stop breast feeding when they return to work, the company said.

#### **Contact lenses for MD**

RESEARCHERS have created contact lenses which, when paired with special spectacles, bestow telescopic vision on their wearers.

According to the *BBC*, the contactlens-and-spectacles combination magnifies scene details by 2.8 times, while polarising filters in the glasses allow wearers to switch between normal and telescopic vision, with the system having been developed to help people suffering age-related blindness, especially macular degeneration.

Age-related macular degeneration (MD) is one of the most common forms of blindness and damages the part of the eye, the macula, that handles fine detail.

As this area degenerates, sufferers lose the ability to recognise faces and perform tasks, such as driving and reading, that rely on picking up visual details.

The researchers from UC San Diego and Switzerland's EPFL, adapted a pair of Samsung glasses produced for 3D TV sets which create a 3D effect by alternately blocking the right or left lens in sync with the television picture.

# Chemo review kicks off

THE Department of Health has released the terms of reference for its review of chemotherapy funding arrangements (*PD* 05 May), after health minister Tanya Plibersek agreed to pay an additional \$60 per infusion through to 31 Dec to ensure the ongoing viability of chemotherapy services.

The review will report by Oct this year with recommendations for long-term arrangements for chemo funding, and aims to "maximise the benefits consumers receive from chemotherapy infusions".

Interestingly, it's not just limited to dispensing services funded from the PBS, and will also look at the funding of clinical services as part of cancer treatment, as well as the business models in the private and public health sectors which provide chemotherapy services.

A discussion paper has been issued, with submissions solicited through until 29 July, and the department is in the process of engaging experts in pharmacy and oncology to guide the review, alongside Mike Wallace, former deputy director-general of NSW Health; and the Consumers Health

Forum which has been engaged to consult with consumer groups.

Information sought under the review includes details of costs and processes involved in compounding certain infusions and possible alternative funding models for these medicines; rural and regional chemotherapy provision; guidelines on quality of infusion preparations; and how services and funding roles for chemotherapy have changed, particularly in the light of the government's Efficient Funding of Chemotherapy measure.

The review will also look at suggestions by some stakeholders that "clinical services associated with the provision of chemotherapy by an advanced care or oncology pharmacist should be recognised with explicit funding".

Also up for discussion is the possibility that the cost of containers and devices for chemotherapy could be funded under the PBS, with infusion fees currently not providing for any specialised or high-cost drug delivery systems.

After a discussion, they decided to return the money, and said the best thing about their honesty was finally getting their grub.


### **EXTREME** quitting.
