### **CPD** standards approved

THE Pharmacy Board of Australia has formally approved new accreditation standards for continuing professional development, as the culmination of a process which has been taking place since 2007.

The standards have been developed by the Australian Pharmacy Council in collaboration with a range of organisations which accredit CPD activities, with the aim of ensuring consistency in accreditation outcomes.

The new Standards have become effective from 01 July 2013, and the Australian Pharmacy Council says it will require providers to be accredited to the standards by the start of September this year.

"Pharmacists who undertake accredited CPD can be assured that the quality, relevance and currency of the activity have been independently verified," the APC

### **DDS** bone testing

**DISCOUNT** Drug Stores will next month operate bone density awareness and testing clinics across most of its 112 stores nationally.

The clinics will see customers given information about the benefits of calcium, exercise and vitamin D, as well as completing a questionnaire so their specific risk factors can be determined.

A simple and quick ultrasonic bone density test is then performed followed by tailored advice on preventative measures and recommended relevant products to assist in maintaining healthy bones. said in a statement.

Accredited CPD will be assessed against these standards, and will carry the APC Accredited CPD logo.

### Illegal meds caught

AUSTRALIAN participation in the recent global Operation Pangea VI crackdown on fake and illegal medicines purchased over the internet saw local authorities seize 35 packages at the Brisbane and Melbourne mail centres.

The Australian Customs and Border Protection Service joined with the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority and the Therapeutic Goods Administration to take part in the sweep which brought together customs, health regulators, national police and private sector agencies from more than 100 countries.

Most of the substances detected were erectile dysfunction or domestic pet medications, with TGA national manager, Prof John Skerritt, saying that Australia's involvement was a reminder for consumers of the risks associated with purchasing medicines from unknown overseas-based websites.

"These products may contain undisclosed and potentially harmful ingredients and may not meet the same standards of quality, safety and efficacy as those approved by the TGA for supply in Australia," Professor Skerritt said.

### **Guild Update**

## Chemo threat remains

THE threat to community pharmacy from the Government seeking to fund the shortfall in chemotherapy remuneration from the Community Pharmacy Agreement has not gone away.

A recent Department of Health and Ageing discussion paper for its "Review of funding arrangements for chemotherapy services" does not rule out this shortfall being funded out of the Agreement.

The Guild has clear and unequivocal legal advice that this is not part of the Agreement which is a standalone document and makes no mention of chemotherapy. This shortfall cannot be sourced from the Agreement without the Guild's approval as a signatory.

At \$60 per infusion, which is the level of interim funding the Government is providing until the end of this year from outside the Agreement, the impact would be \$11,500 per pharmacy.

We call on politicians from all sides to give a clear commitment that the shortfall in chemotherapy funding cannot and will not be sourced from the Agreement.

Both sides of politics must recognise that a relatively small proportion of the budget savings from price disclosure – savings estimated to be \$220 million for chemotherapy this year alone – needs to be reinvested to address this shortfall.

### Symbion-EBOS a \$6b group

**NEW** Zealand-based EBOS says it will now seek a listing on the Australian Stock Exchange after the finalisation of its acquisition of Symbion Pharmacy last Friday.

The NZ\$1.1b takeover sees the enlarged company with a total turnover of around NZ\$6 billion, but EBOS md Mark Waller said: "looking forward the increased scale and complementary nature of both businesses can be expected to open up additional revenue opportunities and operational

efficiencies".

The deal was strongly supported by EBOS shareholders and investors and sees Symbion's former owner Zuellig now hold 40% of the combined companies.

Waller said the acquisition transforms EBOS into the "largest diversified Australian marketer, wholesaler and distributor of healthcare, medical and pharmaceutical products by revenue, and a leading Australasian animal care products marketer, wholesaler and distributor".

And Symbion ceo Patrick Davies said he was excited about the opportunities brought by the deal which has "brought together two businesses that have a strong alignment with proven capabilities in adjacent markets".

In relation to the potential ASX listing, Waller said EBOS was now expected to attract significant Australian investor interest given its new footprint here; however he confirmed that its primary sharemarket listing would be on the NZ Stock Exchange, with its head office to remain in Christchurch.

### DISPENSARY CORNER
