## Major CM advertising worry

THERE'S considerable concern among complementary medicine practitioners about proposals by the Therapeutic Goods Administration which could restrict the information and advice they can provide to consumers.

It's part of the TGA's consultation on regulating the advertising of therapeutic goods to the general public (*PD* 03 Jun), with one of the proposals suggesting the exclusion of complementary medicine practitioners as health professionals in relation to advertising of therapeutic goods.

Proposal six of the consultation document includes an option which would update the exemption for health professionals in section 42AA of the TGA Act to "only recognise health practitioners regulated under the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law" - replacing the existing arrangement which includes a list of health workers to whom advertising may be directed.

Switching to professions regulated by the AHPRA would automatically exclude Herbalists, Naturopaths and Homeopathic Practitioners who are currently explicitly included in the list.

#### Mobile mental health

A MOBILE mental health service to help people with mental health crises in Melbourne's Bayside area is to be established in a partnership between Victoria Police, the Alfred Hospital and the Australian Government.

Minister for Mental Health and Ageing Jacinta Collins yesterday launched the Mental Health Integration Coordination Unit, which will be run by Bayside Medicare Local and respond to requests from police or ambulance officers attending incidents in the Port Phillip, Stonnington and Glen Eira areas.

In response to feedback from the local community, Bayside Medicare Local has made better mental health services a priority.

The Bayside Medicare Local is one of the 61 Medicare Locals set up across the country.

Blackmores is strenuously opposing the change, with the company yesterday circulating an email warning that it will result in "significantly less scientific and technical information provided to practitioners, restricting the information and advice you can give to your consumers".

Blackmores is suggesting that the industry object strongly to 'Proposal 6, Option 2' in the consultation document and instead support 'Option 1: No Change'.

The TGA has extended the deadline for submissions to the consultation, which will now be accepted until 5pm on Fri 19 Jul.

"Blackmores has a proud heritage of promoting natural health and we will always campaign to ensure that complementary medicines are an integral part of the Australian allied health industry," the email said.

"We believe that Naturopaths, Herbalists and Homeopaths offer valuable advice and consumers should have access to well trained and informed advice so they have freedom to choose.

"If we stand side by side and campaign, we can stop these concerning proposals and together we can save your profession," Blackmores added.

The CM sector is also being urged to make its voice heard via an online petition opposing the move, initiated by Toowoombabased naturopath David Howell who warned that the proposal will "effectively delete the industry".

Almost 10,000 people have signed the petition at www.change.org.

#### NPS on cough & cold

**NPS** MedicineWise is concerned that parents might still be reaching for cough and cold medicines for their kids this winter, despite restrictions introduced last year.

On 01 Sep 2012, the TGA restricted the use of cough and cold medicines to treat young children in light of potential harms.

"Even though cough and cold medicines are widely used, most have not been studied in clinical trials...and they are known to potentially cause drowsiness, nausea, vomiting or constipation, and more serious side effects like seizures," NPS said.

Under the new regulations, cough and cold medicines should not be given to children under 6 years of age and should only be given to children aged 6-11 years on the advice of a doctor, pharmacist or nurse practitioner.

## Syd Uni pharmacist award

ASSOCIATE Professor Parisa Aslani (pictured) from the University of Sydney's Faculty of Pharmacy has been named as the recipient of the 2013 Royal Pharmaceutical Society's Pharmacy Research UK Award.

Aslani's award is recognition of her international reputation as an expert in her fields of research which include Consumer Medicine Information (CMI) and adherence to therapy.

"The prestigious honour awards individuals who demonstrate leadership and make a significant contribution to the field of pharmacy practice research," according to a statement from the university, where Associate Professor Aslani is the current holder of the Thompson Fellowship.

Her research in CMI has attracted several significant grants in recent years, and fostered several collaborations with academics from the US and Europe as well as with other Australian universities.

Aslani is currently conducting research to develop and evaluate

useable patient medicine information documents to meet consumer needs and ensure optimal delivery by healthcare professionals.

She will travel to the UK in September to accept the award and present a lecture on her work.

Pharmacy Research UK Board of Trustees chair, Professor Anthony Smith, said Associate Professor Aslani was a deserving recipient.

"Her research focus shows an ambition to improve healthcare for the benefit of patients which is at the heart of our aspirations for Pharmacy Research UK," he said.

#### Use it or lose it

YET another study has demonstrated the value of keeping the mind active as a means of warding off Alzheimer's Disease.

The study, which tracked 294 individuals, was published online in the 03 July issue of *Neurology*.

The finding supports the hypothesis of cognitive reserve, which describes the brain's ability to cope with disease or damage.

According to the hypothesis, mental activity helps delay the cognitive consequences of disease.

"An intellectually stimulating lifestyle helps to contribute to cognitive reserve and allows you to tolerate these age-related brain pathologies better than someone who has had a less cognitively active lifestyle," said Wilson, a neuropsychologist at Rush University Medical Center in Chicago.
