THE New Zealand Ministry of Health has published information about the country's national reserve supplies against a pandemic, including composition and costs involved.

The Ministry said the current stock holding was valued at \$28.62m with Tamiflu and Relenza making up a significant proportion of this at 1,112,800 and 229, 880 courses respectively.

# **EMA to review ibuprofen**

**THE** European Medicines Agency's (EMA) Pharmacovigilance Risk Assessment Committee has started a review to evaluate the cardiovascular risks with systemic ibuprofen medicines.

This followed the Committee's work examining the risks of other non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) and would look at the cardiovascular risks of high dose ibuprofen (2,400 mg per day) taken regularly for long periods, it said.

Ibuprofen was usually taken at lower doses for short periods and as such there was no suggestion of similar cardiovascular risk as used by most patients, the EMA said.

The review would also look at evidence regarding the interaction of ibuprofen with low-dose aspirin. A spokesperson for the

#### Sunscreen only a start

**SUNSCREEN** is not the only measure that people should take to avoid the effects of UV radiation. Recent research, published in Nature, investigated the molecular basis of melanomagenesis and demonstrated in mouse models that sunscreen (UVA superior, UVB sun protection factor (SPF) 50) delayed the onset of UVR-driven melanoma, but only provided partial protection.

"UV light targets the very genes protecting us from its own damaging effects, showing how dangerous this cancer-causing agent is," lead researcher Prof Richard Marais told BBC News.

He said the work highlighted the importance of combining sunscreen with other strategies to protect skin, including wearing hats and loose fitting clothing, and seeking shade.

#### **TGA clarifies AE stats**

**THE** Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has elucidated the difference between its medicines and vaccines adverse event report, stating that it received about 17.500 adverse events reports in 2013 and its half year report which said it received about 20,000 reports (PD 30 May).

A spokesperson from the TGA said the medicines statistics excluded reports where causality was unclear or where no temporal relationship was identified between reported event and medicine.

When these 2,604 reports were excluded from the total, the TGA received 17,452 adverse event reports in 2013, they said.

WHAT a pity some officials of the Australian Medical Association (AMA) are continuing to try to obstruct the sensible development of vaccinations by pharmacists across Australia.

The latest phoney arguments from the AMA were raised in Western Australia where a weekend media report noted that the Guild is liaising with Curtin University to develop a vaccination component into the pharmacy degree course.

Predictably, the AMA has raised issues of training and privacy - both of which are fully dealt with in the vaccination trial currently being conducted very successfully in Queensland.

In the Queensland trial, which has already safely vaccinated 8,500 people since April, pharmacies cannot participate unless they have a private area to conduct the procedure.

Pharmacists are administering vaccinations safely in comparable countries all over the word, including in every state of the United States.

Pharmacists involved in any vaccination program must be fully trained. Nationally accredited courses to train qualified pharmacists have already been developed.

This is just a common sense step to improve access to vaccinations, beginning with flu vaccination for adults not otherwise covered by the National Immunisation Program.

Given the pressure on doctors' waiting rooms, we think it would be better if the AMA supported this step for the benefit of patients.

PORCINE parasite protects people.



The humble pig whipworm has surprised researchers at the University of Melbourne's Faculty of Veterinary Science by putting itself forward as a lead in the search for new treatments for inflammatory bowel disease, rheumatoid arthritis, multiple sclerosis, diabetes and autism.

Lead researcher, Dr Aaron Jex, Faculty of Veterinary Science, said it was known that humans infected with the harmless 'pig whipworm' (pictured) could have significantly reduced symptoms linked to autoimmune diseases.

"And now we have the genetic sequence of the worm, it opens the door to future human drug designs and treatment."
