## Side-effect reporting

THE UK's Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) has released new research looking at the rate of side effect reporting by parents of children being treated with medicines.

The results showed that Londoners were the least likely to inform healthcare professionals about suspected Adverse Drug Reactions (ADRs) with just 69% of parents noting that they would report a side effect to a doctor and 39% saying they would ask their pharmacist, compared to a high of 88% and 59% by parents in Wales.

The research was conducted as part of a campaign to increase reporting from parents and carers of suspected side effects associated with medicines taken by children.

Research has suggested that only 10-15% of serious side effects are reported in the entire population.

# **Guild: Audit MedsCheck**

**THE** Pharmacy Guild of Australia has called for an audit of the MedsCheck program.

This follows reports that Chemist Warehouse has been pushing MedsChecks within its pharmacies, with one store completing more than 300 in a fortnight.

In forefront, executive director David Quilty said the Guild had been contacted by concerned pharmacy owners and staff, who were upset that their use of MedsChecks was being curtailed in the 01 Mar cap (PD 13 Feb), particularly if due to other groups allegedly not abiding by the rules.

He said the Guild was passing on any written and anecdotal information it received about alleged questionable behaviours to the Departments of Health and Human Services.

Quilty said the Government

should audit any pharmacies who had been claiming an "inordinately large number" of MedsChecks and any pharmacies found not to be abiding by eligibility criteria and requirements should be required to repay the money, with examples of fraud sent to authorities.

"By taking firm action, the Government will send a strong signal that it is determined to maintain the integrity of these important medication management programs to the benefit of patients and the overwhelming majority of Australia's 5,300 pharmacies who do the right thing."

The Federal Department of Health said it took any report of inappropriate use of services very seriously and would investigate where appropriate.

A spokeswoman said she could not comment on any internal audits or investigations planned or underway, until they were completed and action taken where necessary.

Chemist Warehouse had not replied to a request for comment at time of writing.

# No stress-Crohn's link

A STUDY has suggested that job strain is not a major risk factor for Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis.

Published in PLOS One, 'Job Strain and the Risk of Inflammatory Bowel Diseases: Individual-Participant Meta-Analysis of 95,000 Men and Women' looked at 95,379 participants who did not have inflammatory bowel disease.

It found 111 people developed Crohn's and 414 developed ulcerative colitis during follow up, however job strain was not associated with incident of either.

# **FDA lifts Oxycyte hold**

**OXYGEN** Biotherapeutics Inc has said the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has lifted the clinical hold on Oxycyte, meaning the company can continue with the clinical development program in the country.

The company said it had submitted animal studies' results to address FDA concerns about the use of the drug in treating traumatic brain injuries, and in particular the interactions between OxyCyte and the immune system.

The channel will be available from 01 Jul and would be a no cost service, the department said, designed to assist allied health providers who had a small number costs and delays from the claiming

# Omega-3 for acne

A NEW study out from Seoul National University Hospital has demonstrated that Omega-3 and y-linleic acid can be used as adjuvant treatments for acne.

Published in Acta Derm Venereol, the 10 week randomised, controlled parallel dietary intervention study was performed in 45 participants with mild to moderate acne, aiming "to evaluate the clinical efficacy, safety, and histological changes induced by dietary omega-3 fatty acid and γ-linoleic acid in acne vulgaris."

The authors stated that after 10 weeks, inflammatory and non-inflammatory acne lesions decreased significantly and patient subjective assessment showed a similar result.

Objectively, haematoxylin and eosin staining of acne lesions demonstrated reductions in inflammation and immunohistochemical staining intensity for interleukin-8.

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#### **Antiretroviral success**

**TWO** studies by different groups have found 100% protection against AIDS in monkeys that received monthly injections of antiretroviral drugs.

There was evidence that one injection every three months could work on humans as well, the *New York Times* reported.

'Long-Acting Integrase Inhibitor Protects Macaques from Intrarectal Simian/Human Immunodeficiency Virus', published in *Science*, said the injections could decrease adherence problems associated with daily preexposure prophylaxis, or taking antiretrovirals daily.

# Varicella supply resumes

GLAXOSMITHKLINE (GSK) has said shipments of varicellacontaining vaccines will resume gradually by the end of February.

The company warned in January that a "global manufacturing issue" meant a temporary disruption in supplies of Varilrix and Priorix-Tetra, used to prevent chicken pox and in the case of the latter, measles, mumps and rubella as well (**PD** 29 Jan).

It said at the time that it was working closely with State and Federal Governments to manage existing supplies of the vaccines and to minimise the impact of the disruption.

GSK said the vaccines did not pass the release standard during testing, and an investigation revealed that

# NHMRC: 1.3% to CM

THE National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) said by its calculations, it believes the average yearly commitment over the last decade for complementary and alternative medicine research (CAMS) over the last decade was around 1.3% of total funding.

Swisse ceo Radek Sali said that the average yearly commitment was 0.2% (*PD* 03 Mar).

NHMRC said it was unsure what method the company used for generating the figure.

NHMRC said its Strategic Plan 2013-15 identified 'claiming benefits for human health not based on evidence' was a major health issue.

It said it did not allocate research funds to specific disease types or areas, except in very specific circumstances.

"The overwhelming majority of funding is investigator initiated, and therefore the area of research is determined by the applicant team, not the NHMRC."

The NHMRC said CAM'S applications represented 3% of all applications over the 10 year period to 2013 and 2% of all grants.

"Over the same period CAM's have had an average funded rate of 18.7% compared to 26.8% for all applications."

# Clenbuterol abuse

THE prescription-only S4 drug Clenbuterol, used as a bronchodilator in horses and by athletes as a performance enhancer, is increasingly being used by the general public.

A study published in the Medical Journal of Australia found 63 cases of clenbuterol exposures over nine years of data from the NSW Poisons Information Centre, with a "dramatic increase" from three cases in 2008 to 27 in 2012, with 84% of patients requiring hospitalisation.

Researcher Dr Jonathan Brett said there were arguments to restrict sales by puting the drug into the same category as benzodiazepines and anabolic steroids.

**CAVEMAN** influenza.

Researchers have revived a virus from Siberian permafrost more than 30,000 years old - and said virus is new to science.

The virus infected amoebae and was not a threat to humans, the *Sydney Morning Herald* reported, but raised the possibility that viruses which do harm humans could be lurking in the ice.

Counterfeiters have cheated Girl Scouts not once, but twice, using fake bills to pay for cookies and then getting change for the 'purchase'.

At least two thieves used the scam, in two different locations in Rancho Cucamonga, setting the organisation back by about US\$200, the *Sideshow* reported.

The Girl Scouts even used a 'counterfeit pen' on the cash to check, which didn't pick up the fakes and the troop leader has described it as a "life lesson", the publication reported - presumably to take classes on counterfeiting detection.

DeGeneres encouraged the billion-strong audience to retweet the pic to beat the record, passing the 2m mark in 40 minutes.
