\$854m mental health medications funded

PHARMACEUTICAL

Benefits Scheme/Repatriation Pharmaceutical Benefits Schemesubsidised mental health medications to the tune of \$854m were provided by GPs or psychiatrists in 2011-2012, a new report by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare has said.

A further \$333m was spent on private hospital mental health-related services in the same period, with \$299m coming from private health insurance funds.

Subsidised medications have grown an average 0.8% pa over the five years to 2013, the report said.

The most frequently managed mental health problems were depression, anxiety and sleep disturbance, it said.

Community backs pharmacy

THE Moore Park Beach community has backed its local pharmacy after a series of break ins by launching a fundraiser to raise money for additional security.

First reported by *News Mail*, Moore Park Lions Club president Liz Coker told *PD* that pharmacist Adam Harradine had had two break ins in the last four months, and the community was worried he would leave the area.

Harradine went out of his way to help the community, opening the Moore Park Beach Pharmacy in Bundaberg, QLD, on weekends to deliver medication to people who had run out, Coker said.

He had been active in trying to get a GP stationed in the town.

"The whole community just wants to give back to him."

Without the pharmacy, residents would have to travel about 20 km for their medications, and the area had an older population, without much public transport, Coker said.

Funds raised could be used for security shutters for the pharmacy, and any left over money could go towards further security measures,

Harradine said he had no plans to leave but that the community response had been humbling, and people had stepped up to help after an exhausting period.

He had not asked for charity but the response showed how important pharmacy was to a community, he said, and hoped that the funds raised would be used for all businesses in the Moore Park Beach Community Centre in which the pharmacy is located.

The fundraiser includes a sausage sizzle and entertainment and will be held from 12pm tomorrow at the Moore Park Beach Community Centre.

A spokesperson for Primo Property, the landlord for the shopping centre, said no one was available to respond to requests for comment, which included why further security measures have not been implemented in the Centre.

Underpaid by \$62,000

AN EGYPTIAN migrant who delivered medicines to customers in Sydney was underpaid more than \$62,000 over almost four years it will be alleged in court, the Fair Work Ombudsman has said.

As a migrant with limited English, it was alleged he was a vulnerable employee and was paid \$12-\$14 per hour when he should have been paid \$16-\$20 per hour.

The Fair Work Ombudsman announced that it would take legal action against three Sydney men, Nader Bastawrose, Amgad Samaan and Ashraf Youssef, who operated pharmacies trading as 'Save and Deliver'.

A second case against the company related to an employee working mainly in customer service at Shellharbour.

Three Ebola trials

MÉDECINS Sans Frontières (MSF) has announced that it will host clinical trials in three Ebola treatment centres in West Africa aimed at finding an effective therapy for the disease.

The French National Institute of Health and Medical Research would lead a trial using antiviral favipiravir in Guinea, the University of Oxford would lead a trial of antiviral brincidofovir in an as yet undetermined site and the Antwerp Institute of Tropical Medicine would trial a whole blood and plasma therapy, also in Guinea, MSF said.

The World Health Organisation was also taking part, it said.

PPA and Guild meet

PROFESSIONAL Pharmacists Australia (PPA) and the Pharmacy Guild met this week to ensure the organisations have good lines of communication.

PPA presented a petition of 1,235 pharmacists who wanted to see an increase in the base rates of pay for pharmacists, while both groups stayed firm on their stances regarding the reduction of penalty rates, the organisation said.

PPA president Dr Geoff March said it was important to meet given the Fair Work Commission was about to review the Pharmacy Industry Award, and given the upcoming Sixth Community Pharmacy Award negotiations, to represent the views of community pharmacists.

Toddler poisoning

HOSPITALISATION of Australian children aged one to four years from accidental poisoning with pharmaceuticals and other substances in the 12 months from 2011 to 2012 was the highest of any age group, according to a report released by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare.

Adolescents (aged 15 to 17 years old) had the highest rate of intentional self-harm at 320 cases per 100,000 people, with females at four times the rate of males.

The most common means for both was intentional self-poisoning, the report said.
