MA: PBS spend flat

MEDICINES Australia (MA) has said the Department of Health has confirmed the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) grew by \$150m last year to \$9.15b to the Senate Select Committee on Health.

This was below inflation, MA ceo Tim James said, and negligible for the 2013-14 financial year.

"The rest of the Health portfolio may not have made the tough decisions to bring costs under control, but the PBS is flat as a pancake.

"There is clearly fiscal room to get new medicines listed quickly for Australian patients."

SHPA numbers grow

MEMBERSHIP continues to grow for the Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA), with a total of 3,268 compared with 3,169 in 2013.

In its annual report, the organisation had a net year surplus of \$177,513, compared with \$450,297 in 2013.

Fred IT: business as usual

TELSTRA'S \$1b health business will not see any changes to the Fred IT Group (*PD* 23 Oct).

Fred ceo Paul Naismith said it was business as usual for the organisation, as Telstra launched its new business unit, Telstra Health.

With a 50% stake in Fred It Group bought last year, Telstra said the pharmacy software provider would form one of the foundations of the unit.

Naismith said there was no short term change to Fred IT, but the company supported Telstra's vision of making health care better and more accessible.

Telstra recognised the role of pharmacy in the future of health and it was important that pharmacists could be part of the health care team going forward, he said

PSA vax course tick

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) has earned national accreditation with the Australian Skills Quality Authority for its vaccination training course used in the Queensland Pharmacist Immunisation Pilot (QPIP).

The course forms part of the PSA Graduate Diploma of Applied Pharmacy Practice.

PSA national president Grant Kardachi said the course was modelled on pharmacist-specific training used by more than 150,000 pharmacists globally. partnering with industry to advance healthcare and connect the different parts of the health industry, including pharmacies, hospitals, patients, government and health funds.

The organisation launched a joint venture with Swiss company Medgate called ReadyCare, which would see patients speaking with GPs over video or phone to receive prescriptions and referrals.

Information would be provided back to the patient's regular GP, with the service operating at all hours, Telstra said.

Australian Medical Association president Associate Professor Brian Owler has said the ReadyCare project would undermine doctorpatient relationships and was a "commercial solution dressed up as a health solution", as patients could get scripts and treatments prescribed from a doctor they had no knowledge of, or relationship with, the *Australian* reported.

Blackmores \$8.7m profit

BLACKMORES has posted net profit after tax of \$8.7m, up 61% year on year from \$5.4m, and up from \$7.9m in the prior quarter.

The company said the quarter saw record sales and profit, with group sales of \$98.5m, up 17.2% year on year and up from \$93.0m from the prior quarter.

The quarter was the highest on record for profit and sales, beating the fourth quarter of last year into the top spot, ceo Christine Holgate told PD.

The company said the result was driven by strong sales growth and supported by improvements to its cost base.

These included improved recovery from its packing and bottling facilities, and some reduction costs through various agreements, Holgate said.

Sales in Australia grew by 23% compared with the corresponding period, with growth in every sales channel including pharmacy, which generated record sales in the quarter, the company said.

Holgate said challenges remained in core markets, particularly Thailand and Australia, though the board was optimistic about prospects to improve shareholder returns this financial year.

These challenges included a subdued retail sector in Thailand due to political and social unrest, and in Australia, many retailers reporting a lack of consumer confidence in the Australian economy, Holgate said.

Warfarin is 1st choice

WARFARIN is still the anticoagulant of first choice for GPs according to new Cegedim data surveying 400 GPs.

The analysis showed that warfarin still holds 82% of the market, with Bayer's Xarelto (rivaroxaban) at 10.8%, Boehringer Ingelheim's Pradaxa (dabigatran) at 4.5% and Pfizer's Eliquis (apixaban) at 2.5%.

Concord Hospital Heart Failure Unit and Cardiac Rehabilitation director Professor Andrew Sindone said confidence and familiarity with the novel anticoagulant (NOAC) therapies which have been on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) for 12 months may contribute to ongoing growth of their use.

"Overall I would have expected more proactivity with use of NOACs.

"The new data reflects a level of caution by GPs and a focus around new patients versus proactively reviewing long-term patients on warfarin where NOACs could be an option."

LOVE your pharmacy.

But do you love it enough to want to keep attending it daily, forever?

One dedicated teacher who taught at Puchenii Mosneni elementary school in rural southeastern Romania loved his school so much after teaching there for 50 years that he donated his skeleton to the school as a display for the science classroom, the Daily Mail reported.

It had always bothered him that the school did not have a human skeleton on display, so he obtained all the appropriate approvals to fulfil his dream of always being a part of subsequent generations' education, the publication reported.

The skeleton was credited with influencing a significant proportion of students pursuing a science or medicine career, although not many took up teaching, the report said.

It may be that pharmacy will soon be able to sell marijuana, but if you are thinking of growing your own and that the pot trade may be the saving of your business, you may need to reconsider.

One 65 year old woman in Buffalo, Pennsylvania, presented her logic to court that to raise several grandchildren after her daughter died, she had to grow and sell hydroponically grown marijuana, according to TribLive.

Candace Kelly explained to the judge that she sold as much as 100 pounds (approximately 45 kg) of marijuana a year for more than four years, the publication reported.

Kelly was freed on bond and has forfeited US\$393,000 found in her house, it said.
