

Med stockpile data must stay onshore

THE Department of Health has said any data relating to the National Medical Stockpile must not be transmitted outside Australia, including as part of cloud data storage.

Answering a query for clarification of the tender document (PD 04 Feb), the Department said due to restrictions on government information, data must remain within the boundaries of Australia. "given the implications for national security".

The Department said tenderers would still be considered if their systems used offshore data storage; however this would be a factor in its evaluation.

Guild: TGA is cannabis reg

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) is the regulatory body most appropriate to regulate the use of medicinal cannabis in Australia, representatives from the Pharmacy Guild have said.

At a public hearing for the inquiry into the Regulator of Medicinal Cannabis Bill (PD 14 Feb) held at the end of last month, Guild NSW national councillor Denis Leahy told the Legal and Constitutional Affairs Legislation Committee that the Guild did not believe the creation of a new, separate regulator for the medicinal cannabis supply chain was required.

The Guild submission to the inquiry said it was unclear what benefits having a parallel system for authorising the growth and production of medicinal cannabis would have.

Leahy said a new regulator could fragment medicine regulation and lead to unnecessary duplication.

Guild SA national councillor Ian Todd said the Guild suggested scheduling cannabinoids as S8.

The Advisory Committee on Medicine Scheduling had recommended an S4 entry for preparations with no more than 2%

A NETWORK of about 20 pharmacies in Canberra over 2015 and 2016 are participating in a government funded \$138k program to encourage smokers to quit.

The program was announced last week by the Minister for Health Simon Corbell and ACT Pharmacy Guild ceo Margaret Beerworth, with Corbell saying the program would have a multi-faceted approach to increase awareness and access to support.

Chemmart Pharmacy had a higher percentage of satisfied customers on December while Soul Pattinson saw a lower percentage, Roy Morgan Research said, with a sample size of 9,026 people.

Paracetamol doesn't work 4 low back pain

PARACETAMOL has been shown to be ineffective in the treatment of low back pain and provides minimal short term benefit for people with low back pain due to osteoarthritis, according to a systematic review and meta-analysis published in the BMJ.

Mining data from various sources including the Cochrane Central Register of Controlled Trials from inception to December 2014. 13 randomised trials were included giving "high quality" evidence that paracetamol was ineffective for reducing pain intensity, disability or improving quality of life.

By contrast, "high quality" evidence did demonstrate significant effect on pain and disability for sufferers of hip or knee osteoarthritis, the study said.

Inept polypharmacy

JUDICIOUS deprescibing is the solution to inappropriate polypharmacy, with resources and strategies available to facilitate the optimal approach, according to new research out of Australian universities and published in JAMA Internal Medicine.

The study proposes a five-step deprescribing protocol which includes assessment of all current medication relevance, overall risk of drug-induced harm, current and future benefit and an appropriate discontinuation schedule.

Phmcy 'cycle of rent seeking'

THE pharmacy ownership and location rules have created a 'cycle of rent seeking', where new owners look to keep regulations in place, University of Melbourne Professor of Health Economics Philip Clarke has said.

Writing in the Conversation and referencing the Australian National Audit Office (ANAO) report (PD 06 Mar), Clarke said payments pharmacies received for dispensing and mark ups had tripled from 1991 to more than \$2b in 2013, adjusting for inflation, due to higher dispensing volumes for various reasons including population increase and ageing.

"But as well as the increase in amounts paid to pharmacies each time a drug is dispensed, government payments are now around 20% higher in real terms than in the early 1990s, due largely to greater pharmacy remuneration from mark-ups."

Restrictions on competition meant there were a similar number of pharmacies now as there were when the first Agreement was signed, despite the increase in total remuneration. Clarke told PD.

The ANAO also found about 18% of pharmacies received more than \$1m in remuneration from dispensing PBS drugs from 2013-14, Clarke said, up from 802 in 2012-13.

These higher levels of remuneration went into the price of pharmacies when sold, meaning the next generation of owners were saddled with debt, Clarke told PD.

This created a 'cycle of rent seeking,' where new owners looked to keep regulations in place, if not add to them, in order to make their businesses profitable, or even viable, he said.

Government would need to have "reform with compassion", he said, perhaps introducing a targeted compensation package for owners who had bought pharmacies in recent years, and the reforms could be separated, with the location rules the higher priority to remove.

A spokesperson for the Guild said references to pharmacies receiving \$1m in remuneration were "meaningless" without considering the costs that must be deducted including wages and rent.

Pharmacies received less in real terms to dispense a medicine today than they did in 2009, the spokesperson said.

"If this current downward trajectory is not addressed, pharmacies face ten consecutive years of real reductions in their dispensing remuneration.

"This is unsustainable for any business."

Writing to the SDA, the Commission said the draft would be discussed further at a conference scheduled for 15 Apr.

The groups called for withdrawal of the draft, with the SDA saying it added a "further layer of complexity".

Faster access call for oncology drugs

Merck Serono has said that patients deserve faster access to oncology medicines, citing Erbitux's seven applications over almost seven years to funding.

The company was submitting to the Senate Standing Community Affairs Reference Committee inquiry into the availability of new, innovative and specialist cancer drugs (PD 05 Dec, 26, 27 Feb, 25 Mar).

Amgen also submitted to the Committee inquiry, emphasising the difficulties of establishing the value of new cancer therapies.
