Rules to go unless Guild signs - report

THE government could be prepared to let the pharmacy location regulations lapse unless the Guild signs a new Pharmacy Agreement by the Fifth Agreement's expiry date, a news. com.au report has said.

Quoting "senior sources involved in the negotiations", the article said this followed a report that the government was considering reducing the co-payment when generic medicines were used.

University of Melbourne Professor of Health Economics Philip Clarke has said pharmacy reform could be separated, with the location rules the priority to remove (*PD* 08 Apr).

Pharmacy groups have rejected recommendations to remove the location and ownership rules (*PD* 01 Apr).

Health Minister Sussan Ley said negotiations for the Agreement were ongoing and confidential.

Ley said the government had opened up discussions to the "whole pharmaceutical supply chain" for the first time, to make sure consumers had a "seat at the table", to ensure pharmacists and consumers got a fair deal.

QPIP: expand to other vax

THE final report for stage one of the Queensland Pharmacist Immunisation Pilot (QPIP) has said it is reasonable to explore expansion of pharmacist administered vaccinations.

The report, submitted to government last year, said given the medicines knowledge of pharmacists combined with new competencies in administration of vaccinations, and international experience, it recommended considering expansion to travel vaccinations, HPV and "selected vaccinations" to those under the age of 18 years old.

The EU approved the product as a non-prescription item in January following a European Medicines Agency recommendation in November last year (*PD* 25 Nov 14).

It was registered in Australia as an S4 product in March.

level of privacy given to patients increased, moving from a booth to a private room, the number of patients wanting to be vaccinated also increased, with a minimum standard of a private room or closed-in booth with space for several chairs and a table recommended for vaccination services.

Australian Medical Association Queensland branch president Dr Shaun Rudd said the organisation still held a number of concerns about vaccines administered by pharmacists, the most important being safety.

Doctors were best placed to respond in the case of adverse reactions, "rare as those cases may be", he said.

Vic pharmacy lesson

THE Victorian Pharmacy Authority (VPA) has said a lesson to be learned from a panel hearing in March is that approval must be granted before making significant alterations to a pharmacy.

The VPA's April communiqué said the case involved proprietors constructing a room in the dispensary for dose administration aids and patient counselling without prior VPA approval.

A caution was issued, with the VPA saying unnapproved alterations could see pharmacies no longer registered with "possible PBS and professional indemnity insurance consequences"

The guideline for facilities used to provide immunisation services in pharmacies had also been amended, effective immediately.

MSF renews Pfizer, **GSK vax cost call**

TIMED to coincide with Pfizer's shareholder meeting in New York, Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) has launched a campaign which again calls on both GSK and Pfizer to reduce the price of the pneumococcal vaccine in developing countries to US\$5 per child.

MSF previously called on the Australian government to back this call (PD 21 Jan), releasing a report which said in the poorest countries, it was 68 times more expensive to vaccinate a child now than in 2001, with many places unable to afford "high-priced" vaccines, including against pneumococcal disease.

Pfizer committed in January to reducing its per dose price for Prevenar 13 to US\$3.10 for its four dose product (PD 22 Jan), starting in 2016.

The new price would be extended to Gavi eligible and graduated countries through to 2025, it said.

GSK said about 80% of its vaccines, including its pneumococcal vaccine, were provided at a "substantial discount" to developing countries, and it had committed this year to a 10 year price freeze for Gavi-graduated countries, as well as to supply its pneumococcal vaccine at a "nominal cost" to MSF to immunise children in ongoing crises.

Study shows no MMR vax/autism link

RECEIVING the measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccine was not associated with increased risk of autism spectrum disorders (ASD), new research has found.

The US study published in Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) looked at 95,727 children, of whom 994 were diagnosed with ASD and 1,929 had an older sibling with ASD.

The study found no link between the vaccine and an increased risk of autism at any age, even among children already at higher risk, but did find that those children with older siblings with ASD had a lower vaccination rate, of 84% at two years of age and 92% at five years old versus 73% and 86%.

The paper said it was plausible that parents of older siblings with ASD would be especially attentive to developmental delays in younger children and put off immunisation.
