VPA warns of S8 breaches

A "DISTURBING number" of pharmacists are continuing to ignore requirements for secure storage and maintenance of accurate records for Schedule 8 poisons, according to the Victorian Pharmacy Authority (VPA).

The VPA has resolved to convene Panel Hearings following cases of alleged serious breaches of S8 legislation, and during Jul heard four cases, two of which involved premises where S8 poisons were not stored in a controlled drug safe.

In one of these cases there was found to be a failure of good pharmaceutical practice at the premises, which were also not maintained in a clean and hygienic manner, along with the S8 breaches.

The proprietors were reprimanded and a condition was placed on the pharmacy business

RGH Phcy E-Bulletin

THIS week's bulletin explains the acronym 'SAMe-TT2R2', the clinical measure by which effective anticoagulation with Vitamin K antagonists (i.e. warfarin) is determined, maintaining International Normalised Ratio (INR) within therapeutic range.

A distinction is drawn between the value of the acronym for warfarin patients versus those prescribed the novel anticoagulants (NOACs).

THE US Food and Drug
Administration (FDA) has extended
the use of Promacta (eltrombopag)
by Novartis to treat low blood
platelet count in pediatric patients,
aged one year and older, with a
rare blood disorder called chronic
immune thrombocytopenic purpura.

license requiring quarterly audit reports for at least 12 months.

A Friendly Society proprietor was also found to have failed to ensure the timely, secure removal of returned/unwanted S8 poisons, and failed to maintain records of S8 poisons in their possession.

In another hearing the pharmacy proprietor was found to have failed to comply with the Act because there was alteration of the registered premises without prior approval of the Authority.

And a fourth case found S8 breaches, a failure to store S4 poisons in the dispensary, and a failure to maintain current editions of mandatory references.

Aged care feedback

THE Australian Aged Care Quality Agency has issued a discussion paper as part of a consultation on the measurement and monitoring of quality in aged care services.

Feedback forums will run in Brisbane, Adelaide & Parramatta in Sep, with online submissions of input which will see a report submitted to the Department of Social Services to help inform a review of current standards.

Homeopathy queries

BOTH the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) are reviewing their regulation of homeopathic drugs, says the FDA Law Blog.

The FTC had issued a 'comment' to the FDA requiring claims for homeopathic drugs to be supported by competent and reliable scientific evidence.

This conflicts with the FDA's current position allowing marketing of these products without proof of efficacy; a workshop is planned for September - CLICK HERE for more.

PRESCRIPTION repeat folders have been sent to community pharmacies to help raise public awareness about recent changes to the way older Australians access aged care services.

From 1 July 2015, the 'My Aged Care' service will help improve the quality of aged care in Australia, giving older people more choice and flexibility, and helping them stay independent in their homes and communities for longer.

To help spread the message about this major reform, the Department of Social Services has invested in a national prescription repeat folder campaign to assist in raising awareness of the availability and functions of the My Aged Care website and contact centre.

The Guild has called on pharmacies to support the new campaign by using the prescription repeat folders.

Each community pharmacy was sent 1,500 folders promoting the service to their customers.

The Department recognises pharmacies as a key contact point for older Australians to the health care system.

DISPENSARY CORNER

A COURT hearing in the US became a matter of life and death last week after one of the lawyers managed to convince the judge he really needed a continuance.

Attorney Marc Daffner filed an urgent request with the Pittsburgh magistrate hearing a case he was involved with - because his wife was going into labour.

The formal document read "Defense counsel's wife went into labour at approximately 11.15am today, and defense counsel will be killed by his wife if he does not get to the hospital immediately".

Although there wasn't a legal basis for the delay, the judge and opposing counsel agreed to the move, meaning Daffner made it to the birth in time.

IN AN example of true inspirational determination, a 21-year-old quadriplegic has managed to complete a gruelling 20km Tough Mudder course in his wheelchair.

British student Rob Camm (pictured below) was paralysed from the neck down in a car accident two years ago.

He decided to take part in the challenge in a special off-road wheelchair linked to a guad bike.

"I wanted to do a Tough Mudder before the accident and still wanted to do it now," he said.

Although he wasn't able to complete some of the obstacles such as the monkey bars - Camm managed to navigate most of what the organisers described as the UK's "deepest, darkest mud and soul-crushing terrain".
