FOLLOWING months of ongoing, significant and widespread price reductions and PBS changes imposed across the broader pharmaceutical industry, Apotex Australia has announced that it will cease supply of two of its PBS-listed products.

The PBS delisting date is yet to be confirmed, and stock will remain available at wholesalers until exhausted.

Apotex md Roger Millichamp says Apotex has been incurring sustained losses by supplying these products under current legislated PBS pricing regimes, with some 68 medicines listed at, or below, exmanufacturer price of \$2.

Products facing the chop are Paracetamol/Codeine Tablets 500mg/30mg Blister Pack 20 (early Q4 2016), Cephalexin Suspension 125mg/5ml Bottle 100ml (midlate Q4 2016) and Cephalexin Suspension 250mg/5ml Bottle 100ml (mid-late Q4 2016).

Vic first cannabis state

VICTORIA has made Australian medico-legal history by becoming the first state to pass legislation allowing the manufacture, supply and access to safe and high quality medicinal cannabis for people in exceptional circumstances.

Children with severe epilepsy will be given first access to medicinal cannabis from early 2017, following the passing of the Access to Medicinal Cannabis Bill 2015 on Tuesday, a state government release said.

Announcing the government's small-scale strictly controlled cannabis cultivation trial, Health Minister Jill Hennessy said, "It's absolutely heartbreaking to see families having to choose between breaking the law and watching their children suffer - and now ... they won't have to."

An Office of Medicinal Cannabis is to be established by the Victorian government to oversee the manufacture of the drug and all clinical aspects of the framework.

THE Pharmacy Board of Australia has published a new infographic (right) which details the obligations of a registered pharmacist. Chair William Kelly said pharmacists who BURRHACT BOARD OF AUSTRAL are registered under the National National Registration and Registration Accreditation and Accreditation Scheme must Scheme meet the Board's standards and AHPRA expectations of the profession. "This is a requirement throughout pharmacists' careers and not just upon initial registration," he said. The infographic aims to provide a simple guide to the obligations of

a pharmacist under the National Law, "and will help pharmacists ensure they do the right thing as one of the 14 regulated health professions," Kelly said.

The Board has also developed a



sample CPD plan/record to guide pharmacists in developing their CPD plan and record of completed activities.

HAIL the salary gender gap.

At least women in Concord, New England did, for one day.

The Works Bakery Cafe bakery chain in New Hampshire offered a discount on purchases to women only at a rate of 21% to illustrate the salary gender gap that exists, reports Yahoo News.

The promotion was in recognition of Equal Pay Day, a national symbolic event emphasising how much longer it takes a woman to earn as much as a man.

with Women campaign asked them to take part in the event. He said his company employs a lot of women, and they are paid the same as men.

SUPERHEROS really do exist - at least when it comes to special DNA which can be found in some extremely healthy people.

That's the conclusion of a study pubished in the journal Nature Biotechnology which found some people are born with a genetic makeup which "cancels out" diseases such as cystic fibrosis.

The researchers from the Icahn School of Medicine at New York's Mount Sinai Hospital looked at DNA databases covering almost 600,000 people and found 13 who should have developed various debilitating diseases - but apparently didn't thanks to DNA mutations.

Lead researcher Professor Stephen Friend said the findings could be a starting point to searching for genome changes which could similarly protect others against the conditions.
