Chinese shoppers

INFLUENTIAL online celebrities from China arrive in Australia next week for the 'Walk Into Australia and NZ' campaign, organised by turnkey e-commerce solutions company Azoya and China's online shopping guide SMZDM.

Designed to build bridges between Chinese online shoppers and Australian retailers by offering face-to-face interactions, the campaign will help participants understand the authenticity and reliability of ethical products from Australia.

"China's ecommerce landscape is rapidly evolving, offering Australian brands and retailers a huge opportunity to take advantage of it," said Sylvia Wei, deputy md Australia for Azoya.

The 12-person delegation includes four high-profile Chinese KOLs (selected from over 1,000 applicants) and editors from SMZDM all of whom will participate in a series of online and offline events in Sydney, Melbourne and Auckland between 21-30 Aug.

Reid said the recognition in the awards "highlights how companies

are bridging the gap between a paper-based industry and a digital future.

NZ to consider morning after pill

NEW Zealand's Medsafe regulator will consider a proposal to reclassify selected oral contraceptives (desogestrel, ethinylestradiol, levonorgestrel and norethisterone) from prescription medications to Pharmacist Only.

The agenda for the next Medsafe Medicines Classification Committee meeting on 01 Nov will also consider rescheduling melatoninin as a "general sales medicine" as well as moving nitrofurantoin from prescription to Pharmacist Only.

Webster pack and inserted into another patient's pack. Brian McLean, whose registration

has lapsed, faced the Health Care Complaints Commission which ruled yesterday that he is not able to reapply for registration for a period of four years and may not provide health services to the public while not registered as a nurse.

Mclean's actions meant that a patient who was prescribed

The inappropriate administration of the drug happened over a period from Apr to Oct 2014 and at no time did Mclean discuss the medication regime of residents at MVH with other healthcare professionals or the patients involved.

The Commission's finding places its hearing costs as McLean's responsibility as well.

Infants vit D poison

DOZENS of infants in sun-poor Denmark were poisoned after being given a liquid vitamin D supplement that contained 75 times the level recommended and indicated on the bottle, according to Danish health authorities writing in a BMJ article.

Danish firm Inno Pharma, which produces and markets the supplement for infants and pregnant women, recalled the product from the market on 21 Jul after the incorrect levels of vitamin D were discovered - www.bmj.com.
