**THE** Therapeutic Goods Administration is urging product sponsors to take immediate steps to amend any labels affected by the new requirements in the Required Advisory Statements for Medicine Labels (RASML) No. 3, which will become effective 01 Jul 2017.

The updated labelling statements reflect public consultations and new Conditions of Listing over the last couple of years, with items affected including OTC cough medicines, OTC nasal decongestant preparations, esomeprazol, metoclopramide, chloramphenicol and NSAIDs for oral use.
