### **Golden Ant alert**

THE TGA has issued a warning about Golden Ant tablets (pictured) which have been found to contain the



undeclared prescription-only substances sildenafil and chloramphenicol.

TGA investigations have shown a number of people in Australia may have bought the products online.

### Codeine dependence screen tools call

THERE is a need to develop extra support tools for healthcare professionals



including patient screening tools for identifying codeine dependence, according to a BMJ Open study.

Issues include assessment of patient understanding of their medication and the risk of dependence, the authors said, adding that the support structure for managing codeine-dependent patients in primary care requires further examination.

# New hypertension guide

TREATMENT guidelines for patients with hypertension were this morning unveiled in the Medical Journal of Australia, with the update from a group of clinical experts facilitated by the National Heart Foundation.

One major change is the recommendation of a lower target blood pressure (<= 120mm Hg) in high risk patients, reflecting a 2015 trial which showed benefit in a selected high risk population.

The guidelines also now recommend confirmation of clinic blood pressure through other measures such as ambulatory and home blood pressure assessment, as these are stronger predictors of outcome in patients with uncomplicated mild hypertension. Professor Gary Jennings from the

### Matraville robbery

POLICE are still searching for a man who allegedly used a syringe to threaten staff at a pharmacy in Sydney's Matraville on Sat morning.

The offender fled with cash and prescription medicine, sparking a helicopter manhunt, but he remains at large with officers appealing for public assistance to identify and locate the man involved who is described as being of Aboriginal/Torres Strait Islander appearance and with a slim build.

Baker IDI Heart & Diabetes Institute said the guidelines were "adapted for Australian conditions at a time when knowledge of the field has been moving rapidly".

He said the guidelines deal with the paradox that most people who have heart attacks or strokes caused by elevated blood pressure do not meet the conventional definition of hypertension.

Jennings said uncontrolled high blood pressure is "one of the greatest preventable risk factors that contributes significantly to the cardiovascular disease burden".

# **HPS-Healthscope contract**

HPS, described as one of Australia's largest independent providers of pharmacy services to private hospitals, public hospitals and cancer centres, has resigned its national contract with Healthscope Limited.

Healthscope operates private hospitals, medical centres and International pathology services out of its Melbourne-based headquarters and is listed on the Australian Stock Exchange (HSO).

said HPS' innovative solutions ensure Healthscope patients gain access to new and emerging treatments and provide them with the highest quality of care.

"Both companies share a vision for delivering first-rate healthcare to hospital patients and we are very fortunate to have developed an outstanding relationship which will continue to grow," Cooke said.

HPS presently services 34 of Healthscope's 46 hospitals across the country, with Wyatt saying the contract represented "enormous certainty for the future and provides a solid foundation to support exponential growth".
