WSMI conference

THE Australian Self-Medication Industry (ASMI) and its New Zealand counterpart have announced they will jointly host the World Self Medication Industry General Assembly in Oct next year.

Oct price cuts

THE Health Department has unveiled a summary of price disclosure reductions for the 2016 October Cycle, which for the first time incorporates the 'Removal of Originator Brand Data' measure.

Almost 300 items are affected by the change, with the biggest cut being to epicubicin injections which will see an 82% price drop.

Any questions or concerns about the new pricing can be lodged by responsible persons as a dispute by 5pm on 25 Jul 2016.

25.9% under co-pay

FIGURES released yesterday by the Depatment of Human Services confirm that about 79 million prescriptions processed last year were under the co-payment, comprising 25.9% of the total.

The data was collected from Jul 2014-Jun 2015 from community pharmacies and hospitals, with the proportion rising from 24.4% in 2013/14 and 22.7% in 20121/13.



New reduced rate for in-pharmacy telemedicine service

COMMUNITY pharmacies have the opportunity to offer patients a telemedicine consultation with a GP at a reduced rate of \$27 until the end of July.

The consultation is through ReadyCare, Telstra Health's purpose-built telemedicine service where consumers can consult with an Australianbased and registered GP by phone or video 24/7 through the convenience and accessibility of their local pharmacy.

ReadyCare, under the CP2GP initiative, is designed to be accessed at times and in areas where access to local GP services may be limited or even unavailable. The service also speeds access to care when the waiting times for GP services are excessive and may compromise optimal patient care.

Until the end of July patients can access ReadyCare through their local participating pharmacy for \$27, reduced from the usual \$65 with the pharmacy still receiving the \$15 facilitation access fee.

Performance review training

A HOSPITAL in Canada is planning a major menu makeover after its senior executives ate food from the wards for a week.

Dr Jack Kitts, ceo of Ottawa Hospital, asked his management team to eat three hospital meals per day, after hearing complaints from patients for years.

The move was revealed in a response from Dr Kitts to a patient who had written to him saying the food was "appalling".

'Thank you for raising your concerns with me...our management team has recently eaten hospital food for a week and agrees with your observation that we need to improve the presentation and taste," he said.

It's not a small task, with the hospital making about a million meals per year, but changes include more salads, fresh sandwich plates and less stews.

Director of Food Services Kevin Peters also envisages an even more radical future in which patients could order a kind of room service or even offer a buffet option for those who are ambulant.
