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# **Robotic pharmacy**

THE pharmacy automation devices market is expected to see incredible growth in the coming years, with a new report published by Grand View research predicting it will be worth US\$8.99 billion by

The market sees the mechanisation of tasks including packaging and labelling, medication dispensing and storage and retrieval systems.

Demand for precise robotic equipment and tools to perform operations at a faster rate are expected to be the key factors for market growth.

# Fake drug crackdown

PANGEA IX, the Ninth Annual International Internet Week of Action (IIWA), a global cooperative effort, led by INTERPOL to combat the unlawful sale and distribution of illegal and potentially counterfeit medical products on the internet, is underway.

Involving regulatory authorities worldwide, the FDA announced that it took action this week against 4,402 websites that illegally sell potentially dangerous, unapproved prescription drugs to U.S. consumers.

# Vic assisted dying report

**DYING** with Dignity Victoria (DWDV) has welcomed the report of the Victorian parliament's Legal and Social Issues Committee saying it is a "momentous step forward" to enable assisted dying and a "hopeful signal of accessible help for people with end-of-life decisions".

DWDV president Ms Lesley Vick said the decision by the Committee was consistent with legislative principles from the organisation's submission in relation to the enquiry.

"This enquiry has been particularly indepth and extensive – for example, several members of the committee visited overseas centres where the law allows physician-assisted dying," she said.

"It is unusual for committees of the upper house to be funded for such overseas research, so this is an indication that they were taking the issues extremely seriously – not simply paying lip service to them."

The Committe report said that it "sought to strike an appropriate balance between respecting the end of life choices of Victorians while recommending a sufficiently robust eligibility framework for competent adults that protects

against abuse".

"The Committee recognises that assisted dying is contentious, that is why there should be no legal, moral or ethical compulsion on any individual or institution to participate in any part of this process, including through referral."

Given that continuous palliative sedation is widely accepted as an appropriate way to relieve suffering for someone at the end of life, "its use is not centrally recorded, the extent of its use is unknown, and no guidelines exist to regulate it," said Committee chair Edward O'Donohue in commending his report to the parliament.

He added that this report should provide some direction for doctors and improve transparency.

# Antidepressants more harm than good

**ANTIDEPRESSANTS** may be largely ineffective and potentially harmful for children and teenagers, according to a new study published in the *Lancet*.


The major review assessed the scientific evidence for 14 antidepressants in nine to 18-year-olds, revealing only Prozac (fluoxetine) was better at relieving depression than a placebo.

The analysis of 34 clinical trials involving 5,260 patients found the drug Efexor (venlafaxine) was connected with increased suicidal thoughts and attempts when compared to a placebo.

One of the key authors Andrea Cipriani of the University of Oxford said psychological treatments should be the first port of call before prescribing drugs.

Major depressive disorders affect about 3% of children aged 6 to 12 years, and about 6% of teenagers aged 13 to 18 years.

"The balance of risks and benefits of antidepressants for the treatment of major depression does not seem to offer a clear advantage in children or teenagers, with probably only the exception of fluoxetine," the study concluded.



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### Cancer pathogens

PATHOGENIC E.Coli and others are now known to be the cause of bowel cancer, according to a report from the University of Liverpool, published on The Conversation.

Dietary fibres from plantains, bananas and broccoli can block harmful risk-increasing bacteria, as can vitamin D (almonds, red onions and chives are named), regular exercise and even antiinflammatory drugs such as aspirin and perhaps other NSAIDS.

## **PBS via EFT only**

**THE** Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme is encouraging healthcare professionals to support their patients by helping them prepare for the 01 Jul PBS patient refund conversion to EFT payments only.

All PBS patient refund cheques and EFTPOS refunds at service centres will cease on that date, with only the EFT option available.

Patients need to register their bank account details to avoid delays in payouts.

The PBS Patient Refund Claim Form (PB132) has been updated to capture bank account details and is available on the department's website, found by **CLICKING HERE**.

Any claims submitted after 01 Jul 2016 using the old PBS Patient Refund Claim Form will be rejected so that a new claim using the updated form with a completed bank details section will need to be submitted.

# **NZ Pharmacy Action Plan**

THE Pharmacy Guild of New Zealand has welcomed the Ministry of Health's release of the Pharmacy Action Plan which is intended to address the need to provide "sustainable, high quality pharmacy services in an evolving environment".

The Plan emphasises the importance of taking an integrated, coherent approach so that all stakeholders are clear on the role they have to play in making its vision of the future into a reality, said Minister Jonathan Coleman.

"There is general agreement that we face complex challenges that make it more difficult to use pharmacists' skills more effectively," he said.

"However, there is also confidence that we can work together to address these challenges, using the very real strengths of our system and the experience and skills that everyone brings to their roles."

# Aspen - AZ portfolio

**ASPEN** Holdings has announced that its wholly owned subsidiary Aspen Global Incorporated (AGI), has signed an agreement with AstraZeneca AB and AstraZeneca UK (AZ) whereby AGI will acquire the exclusive rights to commercialise AZ's global anaesthetics portfolio, with the exception of the US business.

AZ's anaesthetics portfolio comprises seven established medicines, namely Diprivan (general anaesthesia), EMLA (topical anaesthetic) and five local anaesthetics (Xylocaine/Xylocard/ Xyloproct, Marcaine, Naropin, Carbocaine and Citanest).

The products are sold in more than one hundred countries worldwide including China, Japan, Australia and Brazil, generating revenue of US\$592m in the year ended 31 Dec 2015.

# Prison meds reliance

**AUSTRALIAN** prisoners, especially females, are taking more medications for chronic diseases and mental health conditions than their age-related cohort in the general community, according to a new report released today by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW).

The report shows that about half of all prisoners are taking medications of some kind, with many prisoners having complex health conditions, at times complicated by histories of trauma combined with underlying chronic and mental health conditions.

"Prisoners are largely considered to be in poorer health than the general community, and this is reflected by the types and quantities of medications taken," said AIHW spokesperson Mark Cooper-Stanbury.

"Prisoners are nine times as likely as the general community to take antipsychotics, four times as likely to take medications used to treat addictive disorders, and more than twice as likely to take antidepressants or mood stabilisers," he added.

Among female prisoners, 26% took analgesics and 13% took antipsychotic medication, compared with 14% and 1% respectively in the community but the difference is less pronounced in males, the report said.
