#### **UTS PhD scholarships**

**UNIVERSITY** of Technology Sydney has announced an extensive new PhD scholarship program for its Graduate School of Health, commencing in Jan.

Nine new scholarships will be offered, spanning the school's current research fields including pharmaceutical science, pharmacy practice, psychology, orthoptics and physiotherapy.

"We seek outstanding candidates with excellent academic records to become health leaders of the future, creating new and innovative solutions to some of the world's most difficult problems," the university said.

Each scholarship of \$26,288 pa is for three years, with applications closing Oct 31.

Candidates are offered 11 potential pharmacy supervisors with a range of research specialisations including quality use of medicines, pharmacy and nursing, pharmacy practice and education, and consumer pharmaceutical self-care.

### **PSA Code of Ethics review**

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) is calling upon interested stakeholders to give feedback on its proposed revised Code of Ethics for pharmacists.

PSA has commenced the process of review by creating a revised draft of the Code "to ensure the Code is consistent with the ethical requirements of contemporary pharmacist practice, and reflects the expectations of Australian healthcare consumers."

Input is sought from interested individuals and organisations, including members of the pharmacy profession as well as consumers, other health professional groups and practitioners, educators, researchers and government bodies, PSA says.

The Code of Ethics for pharmacists applies to every pharmacist irrespective of the role, scope,



level or location of practice the Society emphasised, including interns and pharmacy students in supervised practice or clinical placements.

Significant changes to note in the proposed new Code is the "alignment of the Code's Principles to three ethical values pertinent to professionalism, namely Care, Integrity and Capability, with the revised Code seeking to articulate the behaviours that encompass these values in pharmacy practice".

The review also refocuses on patient-centred collaborative care and is designed to ensure that public trust in the profession continues to be enhanced.

Acknowledging Federal
Department of Health funding
for the project, the PSA said the
revised Code would be open until
11 Nov, with draft Code accessible
online at psa.org.au and feedback
via an online survey.

#### Immunisation science

LIES misinformation and fear that is peddled by the anti-vaccination movement are put to rest in a new resource made available from the Australian Academy of Science, titled *The Science of Immunisation: Questions and Answers,* providing "compelling evidence about the benefits of immunisation to the health of children and the community".

The publication was launched yesterday at Parliament House by Health Minister Sussan Ley, the president of the Australian Academy of Science Professor Andrew Holmes, AMA president Dr Michael Gannon and Nobel Prize winner Professor Peter Doherty.

Gannon said the booklet, a rework of the Academy's 2012 publication of the same name, was the perfect response to antivaccination lobbyists.

"Immunisation saves lives. That is an undeniable fact," Gannon said.

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### Ego takes out export award

#### Caffeine fuels brains

WOMEN 65 years and over who consume above the median level of caffeine per day have lower odds of probable dementia or cognitive impairment, according to a US study published in The Journals of Gerontology.

The findings from the Women's Health Initiative Memory Study are described by the authors as "consistent with the existing literature showing an inverse association between caffeine intake and age-related cognitive impairment."

## TGA NSAID warning update

**THE** Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) is reviewing the wording of advisory statements to create more consistency around the effects of NSAIDs in connection with miscarriage or spontaneous abortion.

The move follows a review of the Product Information (PI) documents and package warnings for all NSAIDs, including comparisons of Australian and international PIs, published literature and therapeutic guidelines and an analysis of case reports from the TGA Adverse Drug Reactions System database.

The TGA seeks comments from interested parties on the wording of an additional advisory statement for the NSAID range of medicines, namely diclofenac, flurbiprofen, ibuprofen, ketoprofen, mefenamic acid and naproxen for oral use, proposing the inclusion of the statement Do not use if likely to become pregnant or during the first six months of pregnancy except on doctor's advice. Do not use at all in the last 3 months of pregnancy.

The Australian Self-Medication Industry responded to the NSAIDs review, saying it was not prompted by new evidence, but rather aims to achieve consistency among label warnings for NSAIDs.

Consequently the label warnings will apply to period pain-specific NSAID products, which are

currently not required to carry a warning about using them if likely to become pregnant.

In addition, the TGA is similarly consulting on proposed new Required Advisory Statements for Medicine Labels for combinations of paracetamol and ibuprofen.

Both consultations have a closing date of 22 Nov, with submissions able to be uploaded online or submitted in hardcopy by post.

#### CWH location push

**CHEMIST** Warehouse says much of the extensive regulation of pharmacy in Australia has had the effect of raising costs for consumers, preventing innovation in the industry and curtailing investment.

In the CWH submission to the Review of Pharmacy Remuneration and Regulation, the group contends that the "heavy-handed regulation" imposed on the industry could threaten its long-term viability.

Chemist Warehouse's submission also includes a report from Deloitte Access Economics on the current distribution of retail pharmacies, which concludes that the current ownership and location rules are counter-productive, distort the market and are ineffective in achieving their objectives.
