Hunt to open PSA₁₇

FEDERAL Health Minister Greg Hunt will officially open the flagship conference PSA17 hosted by the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) and the Commonwealth Pharmacists Association (CPA).



PSA National Presidentelect Dr Shane Jackson said he was delighted that Minister Hunt

would deliver the keynote address on Fri 28 Jul.

"PSA looks forward to an update from the Health Minister on healthcare policies impacting pharmacists and pharmacies in Australia," he said.

Jackson said with such a unique and engaging program, PSA17 was a must-attend event for all pharmacists in Australia.

Caffeine weight loss

CAFFEINE could be helping obese mice lose weight by keeping their appetites at bay and upping the amount of energy they use, according to an international study.

Chinese researchers found that obese mice had unusual activity in the part of the brain that regulates energy balance, but caffeine, which interacts with that part of the brain, led the mice to eat less, lose weight, and use more energy.

The mice were given the human equivalent of around 30 cups of coffee, so caffeine probably shouldn't be the next weight loss fad. warn the scientists.

Morning after pill to go OTC

EMERGENCY contraception pill ulipristal acetate (EllaOne 30mg by MS Health) was included on the Australian Register of Therapeutic Goods (ARTG) on 06 Mar 15, but is now slated for an over the counter (OTC) schedule 3 listing effective 01 Feb 18, as a one of the final decisions by the Health Department delegate in line with recommendations by the **Advisory Committee on Medicines** Scheduling (ACMS #20).

Ulipristal inhibits or delays ovulation by stopping the surge in lutenising hormone prior to ovulation.

The amended listing supports the sponsor's submission for the drug to be scheduled "for emergency post-coital contraception" as an Appendix H New Entry meaning it can be advertised to consumers.

The ACMS determined that S3 scheduling and allowing advertising together with the drug's "low toxicity and low potential for abuse" would benefit public health "since increased community knowledge may improve access to this product, which will likely reduce the incidence of unplanned pregnancies".

Pharmacist counselling and supply was also cited as reducing the risk of misuse and ulipristal is also "not an abortifacient, therefore risk of 'abuse' is minimal".

The delayed start date will "give some lead time for pharmacists to gain experience with the relatively new Schedule 3 listing," the TGA announcement said.

by the ACMS for marketing from 01 Oct 17 in a modified release dosage form containing 600 mg per dosage unit in packs of 32 or less dosage units when labelled with a recommended daily dose of 1200 mg or less and not for the treatment of children under 12 years of age.

The new extended release form will be schedule 3 which the committee saw as comparable with the scheduling status of naproxen 600 mg modified release, diclofenac 25 mg immediate release and paracetamol 665 mg sustained release.

Advertising of this schedule 3 product is also permitted, with an Appendix H entry on the basis that "there is a public health interest to inform consumers about pain relief options through advertising".

In addition this listing "will give consumers access to a product for pain relief that is longer-lasting than currently available products" and "the potential for abuse and toxicity are low and in line with existing ibuprofen products".

Pharmacist intervention will also help consumers manage any risks, the TGA noted.

PSA not 'regulatory'

RESPONDING to criticism from university and CSIRO supported website publisher The Conversation, the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) has fought back defending its stance relating to pharmacists selling homeopathy remedies (PD yesterday) saying it is "not a regulatory body".

PSA ceo Lance Emerson responded to the claim that the PSA has not been "strong enough on homeopathic products" with an implication that membership could be affected because "some of its members would sell these".

"All of PSA's position statements are based on evidence and the best interests of consumers," Emerson said, pointing out that "in practical terms the Conversation suggestion would force PSA to publish a list of everything pharmacy owners should and shouldn't stock."

"PSA can't enforce this as we are not a regulatory body," Emerson explained.

"PSA's policy clearly states pharmacists must use their professional judgement to prevent the supply of products with no reliable evidence or evidence with no effect," he added.







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FDA plan to eliminate orphan backlog

THE US Food and Drug Administration has unveiled a new plan to address a significant backlog of requests for orphan designation of new medicines.

The Orphan Drug Modernisation Program follows a commitment by FDA Commissioner Scott Gottlieb to slash the queue within 90 days.

The program provides orphan status to drugs and biologics for the treatment of diseases that affect less than 200,000 people in the US.

Currently there are 200 requests pending review, and the FDA will now deploy a "Backlog SWAT team" of experienced reviewers who will exclusively focus on the backlogged applications.

in additional funds to offset the impact of a funding agreement between the government and

Medicines Australia that was

announced as part of this year's Federal Budget.

Sigma Healthcare said in its ASX announcement that it would receive \$5.2 million of the funding, calculated based on its CSO market share over the past two years.

"The amendment to the CSO Deed reflects the Federal Government's budget commitment to provide compensation to CSO wholesalers to offset the impact of the funding arrangement agreed by the government with Medicines Australia," the company said.

Sigma said from an earnings perspective it would recognise the additional monies between now and June 2020 in line with the corresponding impact from the Medicines Australia agreement.

EBOS offshoot Symbion and Australian Pharmaceutical Industries will also share in the additional revenue, but have not announced details at this stage.

myDNA diet test


MELBOURNE-BASED genetics and consumer health company myDNA has launched a new diet DNA test.

Company founder and medical director Associate Professor Leslie Sheffield said that the new diet report consisted of four carefully evaluated DNA tests.

"myDNA brings its team of genetic scientists, dieticians and genetic counsellors to the international body of research on DNA," he said.

"We evaluate the evidence and only propose tests which we feel have evidence justifying their use."

Sheffield said the new myDNA Personalised Diet Report relied on four genes to uncover personalised insights into appetite, storage of fat, and how the body is programmed to regulate fat storage and breakdown.



Customers who use the test can also speak directly to an expert, a "free and market differentiating service" available from myDNA to ensure people can ask questions and understand their results.

Sheffield said the company's medication reports, available since 2016, must be delivered during a consultation with a healthcare professional, such as a pharmacist to ensure appropriate prescribing considerations were made.

A FLORIDA man is celebrating after being released from prison, where he was incarcerated for three months over a suspicious white powder in his car.

Karlos Cashe - who happens to be a home handyman - was pulled over by police for a routine traffic stop when the officer noticed the powder.

Despite Cashe's protestations that it was plasterboard dust, the policeman called for backup and a sniffer dog reacted to the vehicle, so he was arrested.

Lab tests were completed 90 days later confirming the powder was indeed drywall residue and had shown a negative result for any form of drug.

Cashe said he will now seek compensation for the false arrest.

CHF slams Guild 'privilege'

THE Consumers Health Forum of Australia (CHF) has published a scathing critique of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia as having a "favoured place in Australia", "shrouded in secrecy" and "delivering pharmacy owners political clout that reaches well beyond their customers".

"The pharmacies' status has helped ensure and protect substantial government payments to dispense the subsidised medicines available through the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme", the CHF said.

The nation's 5,500 pharmacies were protected by "local monopoly status", otherwise known as "location rules", and would receive more than \$18.9b from the taxpayer over the five years of the current community pharmacy agreement (6CPA), CHF claimed.

The article cites the performance audit conducted three years ago by the Australian National Audit Office which, with some unsatisfactory outcomes, resulted in the wider government-initiated probe, namely the Review of Pharmacy Remuneration and Regulation chaired by economist Professor Stephen King (PD 22 Jun), but vehemently opposed by the Guild.

The CHF particularly blasted the Guild for recommending that pharmacy owners "be wary" about participating in the financial survey commissioned by the Review which said it was concerned that despite the sector receiving significant government funding there is a "general reluctance to provide... the information required to ensure accountability and transparency".

Also under fire was the Guild's opposition to location rule changes, with the CHF noting the interim report's wide-ranging recommendations on the issue

including opening up the sector to in-supermarket pharmacies.

However due to the recent Compact agreed to by the Guild and health minister Greg Hunt these options will not proceed.

"Once again, the Guild's prescription has won the day," the CHF concluded.

GSK raises awareness

WHILE 93% of Australian parents believe that they know what meningococcal disease is, about 28% are not fully aware of the facts about the disease, according to marketing research conducted by Ipsos on behalf of GlaxoSmithKline (GSK).

In response to the research, a national awareness campaign #KnowMeningococcal is launching in partnership with Kyly Clarke, mother of Kelsey Lee and wife of Aussie Cricket legend Michael Clarke, to encourage parents to know more about the devastating



and potentially lifethreatening bacterial infection. Further.

while 97% of parents believe vaccination is important, almost half (46%) did not know that routine childhood vaccination did not cover all strains of meningococcal disease.

"Most parents only know of one type and don't realise that the rest of the strains aren't covered by their routine vaccinations," said vaccination expert and Head of the Clinical Research Team at the National Centre for Immunisation Research and Surveillance Professor Robert Booy.
