Managing codeine stocks post 01 Feb

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has posted an update on how to manage stocks of products containing codeine following their rescheduling to S4 on 01 Feb 2018.

Products involved include those for both pain management as well as cough and cold products which also contain codeine.

All states and territories have agreed that S2 and S3 codeine-containing medicines that have been rescheduled to Schedule 4 and are still in a retail pharmacy after 01 Feb 2018 may be dispensed after that date on prescription for a maximum period of nine months (until 31 Oct 2018) or until the end of the shelf life, whichever is earlier, the TGA said.

Other conditions apply, namely, a valid prescription is required, the stock needs to be stored in the dispensary and state or territory laws still need to be observed.

Pharmintercom tracks trends

NATIONAL president of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia George Tambassis hosted the presidents and ceos of the national bodies for community pharmacy from the United Kingdom, Ireland, New Zealand, the United States, Canada and South Africa at Pharmintercom last week.

This grouping of community pharmacy leaders has been meeting since 1987 to share knowledge and build mutual understanding of the opportunities and threats facing community pharmacies in the English-speaking world, Tambassis explained in the Guild newsletter Forefront.

The Guild president identified common trends across the seven Pharmintercom countries.

There is increased corporatisation of pharmacy with more supply chain vertical integration, while many independent pharmacies choose to differentiate themselves from the "cheap, accurate and fast" corporate pharmacies, he said.

There is also a trend towards capitation and patient outcome based funding models, while evidence is mounting that healthcare by pharmacists utilising the full scope of their professional skills increases adherence and reduces costs, particularly hospital stays, while delivering better health outcomes.

Community pharmacies are growing to be the preferred health destination for treatment of minor ailments, general ill-health, and for preventative health, including immunisation, screening, smoking cessation and managing lifestyle related health risks, he added.

"With hospital and MBS costs ballooning, a targeted and evidence-based investment to enable pharmacists in community pharmacy to practice at the top of their profession in the full medicine management of patients with hypertension is a no-brainer," Tambassis concluded.

Dementia-cardiac link

A WORLD-FIRST experiment by a University of South Australia cognitive neuroscientist could mitigate the impact of heart surgery on thousands of older Australians at risk of dementia.

The work could improve outcomes for many over-65s having cardiac surgery - scimex.org.

No prenatal alcohol

RESEARCHERS at the University of Bristol, UK, assessing the impact of prenatal maternal alcohol intake on the foetus via a systematic review and meta-analysis, reported they were surprised to find a lack of strong data.

However, scientists say a lack of evidence of harm does not imply a lack of harm and strongly recommend against any alcohol at all, due to a range of known effects on the developing brain.


Established effects include changes to nerve migration and neurotransmitter production along with cognitive impairment.

In addition, maternal ingestion of alcohol is associated with babies being small for gestational age, preterm delivery, developmental delays and more.

DEFICIENCY of vitamin D during growth and development has been health concerns, incuding the risk of chronic diseases such as type 1 diabetes, hypertension, multiple sclerosis and many types of cancer, according to a study summarising the effects in the International Journal of Contemporary Pediatrics.

The study went on to confirm that vitamin D deficiency or insufficiency is also common to obese and overweight adolescents, and linked to the previousy associated chronic conditions - CLICK HERE.

Alzheimer's hope

AUSTRALIAN researchers in Melbourne and China have used experimental drugs to target a recently described molecular pathway that damages the brain after a stroke, bringing these treatments one step closer to the clinic for stroke sufferers.

Using pre-clinical animal models of ischaemic stroke, researchers have now shown that the tau protein, which stabilises the cellular 'train track' that transports molecules around cells, is also involved in stroke.

Published in Molecular Psychiatry, the study showed that tau levels could be protected following a stroke and five different experimental drugs were trialled, with ferroptosis inhibitors clear winners for their therapeutic potential in the end.

HOW do you manage a misspelt set of football jerseys?


Vermont's capital city is saying merci to a French city it's named after for plans to send some misspelled soccer jerseys its way.

AMR still dominates at EMA

THE European Medicines Agency (EMA) is hosting a joint meeting with the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC) to discuss antimicrobial resistance (AMR).

The event will take place at EMA's premises in London on 19 Sep 2017 and will be broadcast live on the FMA website

Antimicrobial resistance is an increasingly serious threat to global public health that requires action across all government sectors and society, the EMA says.

A growing number of infections such as pneumonia, diarrhoea caused by clostridium difficile, or gonorrhoea, have become more and more difficult to treat because bacteria are becoming increasingly resistant to antibiotic medicines.

Some common pathogens have turned into so-called 'superbugs' that are resistant to a whole range of antibiotics, leaving healthcare professionals with very few options to treat patients.

To win this battle a global strategy is needed, the EMA said.

The webcast meeting will

ultimately develop coordinated efforts on awareness and empowerment of all stakeholders, the FMA said.

HCP suicide rates

A RETROSPECTIVE mortality study has found that suicide rates for health care professionals (HCP) with ready access to prescription medications was higher than for those in health professions without such access or in non-HCP occupations.

Female HCP rates of suicide were greater than for non-health related occupations, while male rates for medical practitioners were roughly equal to non-HCPs, but male nurses and midwives had higher rates.
