The power of the professional word

RESEARCHERS have found that the biggest hindrance to vaccinating against potentially tragic preventable diseases, such as influenza, is the lack of professional enthusiasm and insistance.

Misconceptions about flu vaccine are also a barrier: that it causes

flu, that it's not effective or that it's not needed, according to a well-referenced



article by University of Sydney's Associate Professor Julie Leask and Samantha Carlson published online in The Conversation.

While for many people the flu can be relatively mild, it has been estimated to kill more than 3,000 Australians over the age of 50 years and has taken more children's lives than any other vaccine-preventable disease in Australia between 2005-2014, the data show.

VPA mandates first-aid couch

THE Victorian Pharmacy Authority (VPA) has specified that a "first aid couch or similar" is to be in the room where vaccinations are carried out within a pharmacy.

The VPA has recently revised its guidelines (PD yesterday), but said that requirement had been in situ previously.

Although not specifying any particular make, model or design, the VA said the purpose of providing this was "for clients who are uneasy about injections in general and are inclined to feel faint, nervous or unsteady.

"People who have experienced problems of this kind may then recline or lie down during the procedure."

One of the other concerns the VPA expressed around vaccination procedures related to level of privacy, saying that the private consultation area, or room used to administer vaccinations, must be set up so that the procedure cannot be seen or overheard by other persons in the pharmacy.

The VPA reported four Panel Hearings for Aug this year around allegations that licensees had failed to meet their responsibilities to comply with the Pharmacy

Regulation Act 2010 and/or good pharmacy practice at registered premises.

Other requirements summarised in the VPA communiqué relate to the quality of raw materials used in compounding - they need to be sourced through an Australian wholesaler or manufacturer.

Pharmacists surprise

THE University of Sydney has highlighted the "Surprising things pharmacists do", in AN ARTICLE promoting its pharmacy course.

In case of emergency, many pharmacists can administer firstaid, from wound-dressing and Epipen treatments to asthma management, the article reads.

There are a range of treatments pharmacists can offer precluding the necessity of seeing a GP for minor ailments or injuries, and will generally save patients money by providing less expensive generic versions of drugs prescribed.

The article even says pharmacists may be able to supply Fido with a product not in the local vet's store.

PBS cost flat this year

PHARMACEUTICAL industry peak body Medicines Australia (MA) has analysed the Final Budget Outcome papers released yesterday, finding that efforts of MA members have kept expenditure low on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS).

The Final Budget Outcome for 2016-17 shows that the Federal Government spent \$13.379b on the PBS, MA said.

"However, the final outcome is a gross figure that does not subtract the significant rebates provided by our members through pricing and supply agreements with government," MA's chief executive Milton Catelin said.

Catelin added that these rebates were in addition to the recent MAgovernment agreement to reduce pricing for on-patent medicines by a total of \$1.8b over five years.

Vax accessibility key

ALMOST every patient vaccinated against flu at a UK community pharmacy last winter would have their vaccination there again, a patient satisfaction survey carried out by NHS England has found.

With around 100,000 participants in the survey on the 2016-2017 flu vaccination program in the UK, 99% of them said they would have the vaccination at a community pharmacy again, and recommend the service to their family and friends, according to the Pharmaceutical Journal.

Alastair Buxton, director of NHS services at the Pharmaceutical **Services Negotiating Committee** (PSNC) described the results as "very encouraging".

"The results of the patient questionnaire from last year show just how much patients value the accessibility of the community pharmacy flu vaccination service."



"Of course, it comes as no surprise given that pharmacies allow patients to have their flu vaccination without needing to make an appointment and at a time and place that is convenient to them."

Data published by NHS Digital this month showed that 41.5% of threeyear-olds and 33.9% of four-yearolds in England were immunised against influenza as part of last year's programme.

Dispensary Corner

EATING purple potatoes could reduce the risk of developing colon cancer, according to a new study by Pennsylvania State Uni.

Pigs fed the vegetable found levels of a damaging protein that fuels tumours and other inflammatory bowel diseases were reduced by six times.

Both uncooked and baked potatoes had similar 'purple patch' effects.

Researchers say other colourful fruits and vegetables, such as broccoli and red grapes, could bring the same beneficial effects.



SO IT turns out peeing in the pool can be very harmful according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Urine, dead skin cells and other traces left behind by swimmers react poorly with chlorine to produce chemicals that irritate the eyes and respiratory system.

Attempts to clean the peefilled pool with chlorine just made matters worse for 48 pool employees that reported burning eves and trouble breathing.

The findings were found after several years of research by the CDC including three-days of on-site investigation at an Ohio indoor water park.

Urine is high in nitrogen, so the more pee, sweat, dead skins cells or lotions in a pool, the more concentrated and irritating the chloramines become.
