Ultibro Breezhaler TGA approval

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has updated the indication for Ultibro Breezhaler (110/50 indacaterol maleate/ glycopyrronium bromide).

This is the first long-acting betaagonist (LABA) and long-acting muscarinic antagonist (LAMA) combination therapy approved to reduce exacerbations of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) in patients with a history of exacerbations.

Professor Peter Frith from Flinders Medical Centre in Adelaide said the "the ability to prescribe a LABA/ LAMA combination to high-risk COPD patients should lead to a reduction in the use of inhaled steroids" - **CLICK HERE** for the PI. IN AN enthusiastic statement of support for the Therapeutic Goods Administration's (TGA's) upscheduling of products containing codeine from S3 to S4, the Royal Australian College of Physicians (RACP) has made what Pharmacy Guild national president George Tambassis has called, a "remarkable omission".

The RACP statement failed to face the need for any real time recording and reporting of prescription drugs, and Tambassis said that throughout the debate, doctor groups had avoided addressing the issue.

"According to the Penington Institute, between 2008 and 2014 Australia experienced an 87% increase in prescription opioid deaths, with the increase in rural regional Australia a shocking 148%," Tambassis said.

New data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics released this week showed almost 70% of drugrelated deaths in Australia in 2016 were the result of prescription drug abuse (*PD* yesterday). "Despite this, the medical profession has done little or nothing to bring about a national real time recording and reporting system," Tambassis pointed out. The Guild introduced the MedsASSIST system in 2016 to record and report on usage, and "so far more than 4,000 pharmacies – or more than 70% of all PBS-approved pharmacies - are voluntarily using MedsASSIST."

Approximately 9 million transactions have been MedsASSIST recorded, with a sharp reduction in codeine sales, and thousands referred to GPs for further pain management.

The Guild has long proposed a limited upscheduling exception to allow pharmacists to supply them under strict protocols with mandatory real-time recording.

"Let's get real about our commitment to protecting Australians from opioid misuse," Tambassis concluded.

Electronic scripts win

THE Electronic Prescription Service (EPS) in the UK is "saving time and improving the patient experience" according to a study by auditors PwC.

Commissioned by NHS Digital, with the support of the Pharmaceutical Services Negotiating Committee (PSNC) and NHS England, the study published this month aimed to assess the costs and benefits associated with the EPS Release 2 system compared with paper prescriptions.

Of those who responded to the survey, 65% were either positive or very positive about the system, and 16% were either negative or very negative.

Most pharmacists (61%) preferred the EPS over paper scripts, but 24% preferred paper, *the Pharmaceutical Journal* reported.

The conclusion says pharmacies should install more computer workstations, and at least one pharmacy team member should have the role of EPS champion, to help train colleagues.

Risk-based CM assessments

Enhance phcy vax role

THE ongoing severity of this year's influenza season has highlighted the need to extend the role of community pharmacies in protecting the community from this potentially tragic disease, Pharmacy Guild of Australia executive director David Quilty said in a *Forefront* article.

He explained that immediately extending the National Immunisation Program to community pharmacies and enabling access to the MBS would ensure more vulnerable people would be protected against the disease.

A Galaxy Research survey conducted for the Pharmacy Guild found more than six million Australians would be more likely to have a flu shot if it could be administered at a local pharmacy, including around two million who previously had no intention to vaccinate against flu.

The research revealed that an extra two million Australians were likely to have a flu vaccination this year because of its availability through community pharmacy, highlighting the success of the scheme and emphasising the imperative to extend it further next year, Quilty advised. THE Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) is seeking feedback on a number of proposed reforms that it says will "deliver a more flexible, predictable, efficient and transparent regulatory framework for complementary medicines (CMs)".

There are five key issues on which the TGA seeks input:

1. The introduction of risk-based application categories for premarket assessments

2. Proposed application requirements, business processes, legislated assessment timeframes and fee structure for applications in each category

3. A set of minimum data requirements to standardise complementary medicine premarket assessments

4. Criteria and mechanisms for acceptance of reports from comparable overseas regulators and alternate sources of evidence for *de novo* assessments

5. Strategies to enhance the postmarket monitoring and compliance scheme for listed medicines.

The TGA also points out that while

it has consulted previously on the proposed use of evaluation reports from comparable overseas regulators for prescription medicines and medical devices, this consultation focuses on complementary medicines only.

Stoptober ticks e-cigs

PUBLIC Health England's 'Stoptober' quit campaign is backing the use of e-cigarettes, despite them not being licensed medicinal products for smoking cessation, according to a report by the Royal Pharmaceutical Society.

Growing evidence of their success in supporting smoking cessation has led the public health body to encourage health professionals to recommend them to patients.

The campaign is even including images of vaping in its television advertisements explicitly stating that e-cigarettes are a "great way to combat nicotine cravings and carry a fraction of the risk of cigarettes".

NICE **DRAFT GUIDANCE**, published this month, also supported vaping.

Length of opioid Rx

FINDINGS from an analysis that included more than 200,000 US patients who underwent common surgical procedures suggests that the optimal length of opioid pain prescriptions is four to nine days for general surgery procedures, four to 13 days for women's health procedures, and six to 15 days for musculoskeletal procedures, according to a study published by *JAMA Surgery*.

As rates of opioid prescribing have increased dramatically in recent years, the overprescription of pain medications has been implicated as a driver of the burgeoning opioid epidemic and the associated increases in overdose deaths in the United States, researchers wrote.

The study of 215,140 people, showed median opioid prescription lengths ranged from four days post general surgery to six days for musculoskeletal procedures, but there was less refill if used for nine to 15 days respectively.

Opioid prescriptions post-surgery should balance adequate pain treatment with minimising the duration of treatment adding that a seven-day limit, as per the CDC, may be "inappropriately restrictive", authors concluded. **CLICK HERE** for the research.
