PSA appoints Belinda Wood as GM

FORMER ceo of the Generic and Biosimilar Medicines Association (GBMA) Belinda Wood (pictured)



has taken up the role of General Manager, Policy and Advocacy for the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA).

PSA national president Dr Shane Jackson welcomed the move, saying "The PSA Board recognises that as this is an important time for PSA and for the profession, we need the right team to deliver tangible improvement in the recognition of the role of pharmacists in the healthcare system.

"I am confident that Belinda will drive the PSA agenda of expanded roles for pharmacists, improved recognition of the expertise of pharmacists and will also lead our work on improving remuneration for pharmacists," Jackson added.

Wood said she was pleased to take the role, saying "my focus will be to represent PSA as the leading professional body for Australian pharmacists, advocate for pharmacists to be fully utilised in medicines management and develop opportunities for pharmacists regardless of where they practise their profession".

Flu vax advertising advice

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration has updated its guidance for advertising of vaccination services, reminding pharmacists there are strict controls around the release of information to the public.

All vaccines for human use are classified as prescription-only, meaning advertising of these medicines to consumers is banned.

Thus while advertising of immunisation of vaccination services themselves is not prohibited, pharmacies must avoid using information that might enable consumers to identify the particular vaccine being used or its manufacturer.

The TGA has recommended that advertisements for seasonal influenza vaccination services inform the public that it is either a "trivalent" or "quadrivalent" vaccine, as well as informing

that influenza vaccines are free to people from high-risk groups identified in the National Immunisation Program and that these people should seek advice from a medical practitioner.

Any ads for vaccination services must also avoid using price comparisons, incentives to encourage consumers to obtain the service, representations that harmful effects will occur from not being vaccinated, or references to any misleading therapeutic benefit.

TGA Latuda approval

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has announced its approval of Latuda (lurasidone HCl) for the treatment of schizophrenia in adolescents (aged 13-17 years) as "an important therapy" for young patients with this debilitating mental illness.

Latuda has a streamlined authority required PBS listing for schizophrenia.

Leave certificates

THE Pharmacy Guild is reminding patients that with the pending flu season, their community pharmacy is the go-to place for vaccinations and absence from work certificates, especially where they are unable to get to their doctor easily.

An update from the NSW branch of the Guild yesterday noted that "pharmacists may now issue these certificates as proof of legitimate absence for their patients," and can be used to verify either:

- Absence from work due to illness or injury (personal leave)
- Absence due to illness or injury of a member of the employee's immediate family or household (carer's leave).

"Pharmacists are able issue certificates for conditions within their scope of practice, and if the illness or injury falls outside of this they may refer their patient to a doctor or relevant healthcare professional," the notice advised, urging consumers to visit findapharmacy.com.au to find their "closest Guild Member Pharmacy offering these services".

Quit smoking course

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Immunotherapy hope

UNIVERSITY of Queensland (UQ) researchers have announced the development of a vaccine delivery technology called NanoEmulsion that enables treatment to be tailored precisely for different types of cancer.

UQ's Professor Ranjeny Thomas said the technology had the potential to improve the precision of cancer immunotherapy, leading to better outcomes and reduced harmful side effects.

"Flexible cancer vaccines are a long-sought treatment strategy in cancer immunotherapy," Professor Thomas said.

"Cancer vaccines represent a precision cancer treatment strategy which stimulates the immune system to attack cancer cells without affecting other cells in the body," he added, noting that current cancer vaccines have limited flexibility and effectiveness.

NanoEmulsions are described as tiny carrier packages that encapsulate proteins made only by cancer cells.

In this way, they "educate the immune system about cancer proteins," Thomas explained.

Focusing on major depressive disorders, the authors conducted a systematic review and network meta-analysis scanning a range of academic databases.

The research aims to inform clinical guidelines and the therapeutic stakeholder shared decision making process.

Particular focuses of the group's work includes the provision of resources around anxiety, menopause and endometriosis.

MMJ Cannabis Access move

ASX-LISTED cannabis company MMJ PhytoTech has announced a \$1 million investment for a 16.7% ownership stake in Biologics Research Institute, the owner of Cannabis Access, an online portal for medicinal cannabis access in Australia.



Cannabis Access supports Australian healthcare professionals seeking to access the appropriate type of medical cannabis for their patients within the current regulatory environment by making the process faster and easier.

The portal showcases the products locally available and the conditions they are best suited to treat, along with research details.

Doctors need to obtain both TGA and state approvals (apart from in NSW where the procedures have been simplified (**PD 02 Mar**)), and the portal prepopulates the forms necessary for doctors to undertake the application processes.

Cannabis Access says 500 Australian doctors and pharmacists have signed up to the service and the company expects this to "grow rapidly over the next few years".

Cannabis Access executive chairman Giles Craig said, "We are delighted to have the support of MMJ as we roll out our strategy to work with doctors throughout

Australia and make it easier for them to prescribe medical cannabis.

"This investment is an endorsement of our strategy and provides us with the capital needed to accelerate our program," he said.

"Based on mature markets for medical cannabis access such as California, we estimate the addressable market in Australia to be around 500,000 patients.

"Currently, there are only 500 patients who are legally using medical cannabis in Australia at a time when we understand up to 100,000 patients are accessing it through other means," he added.

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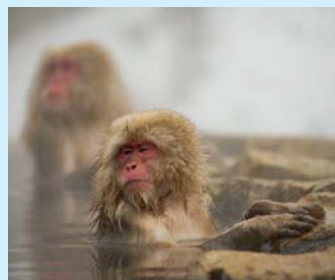
Dispensary Corner

BOOK that spa retreat - science has confirmed what we've suspected all along.

According to a study published in *Science Daily*, Japan's famous snow monkeys seek out thermal pools to not only warm up, but also to enjoy a little bit of welcome stress relief.

Scientists who studied the macaques found reduced levels of the stress hormone glucocorticoid when they analysed the droppings of those who had just taken a dip.
