Steglatro PBS listing

MERCK Sharp & Dohme has welcomed the addition of its Steglatro (ertugliflozin) to the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme, with the SGLT2-inhibitor listed for adults with uncontrolled type 2 diabetes mellitus as evidenced by HbA1c blood glucose levels.

The Authority Required indication is for Steglatro use in combination with metformin or a sulfonylurea.

Save Santa this Xmas

A PUBLIC health announcement by cardiac safety group Australian Hearts is urging the community to help Save Santa this Christmas.

The tongue-in-cheek campaign says that like all workers, Santa faces many workplace risks including the possibility of sudden cardiac arrest.

"Saint Nick is old, and he should have retired centuries ago, but his demanding schedule doesn't let up," the organisation said.

Other key issues include the fact he travels in a sleigh at about 3,000 times the speed of sound, along with workplace expectations to consume at least two choc-chip biscuits in each home - a total of a whopping 154 million kilojoules.

"If Santa suffered a cardiac arrest in his workplace - which could be your home - you or his little elf could save his life if there was access to a defibrillator," Australian Hearts noted, adding that there are 3,000 unnecessary and preventable deaths from sudden cardiac arrest in Australia each year.

Spokesperson Matt Andrews said Australian Hearts was determined to create a situation where every worker is within three minutes of a defibrillator - potentially saving up to 10 Aussies per day.

"Everyone deserves a second chance at life, including Santa, and that's why this Christmas we are sending a message that all workers should have access to defibrillators," Andrews said, with the campaign calling on governments to make the items, along with training, mandatory in every workplace.

SafeScript saving Vic lives

DRONE technology has enabled the vaccination of 13 infants and five pregnant women on a remote island in Vanuatu, with UNICEF arranging for the injection to be flown about 40km across an

impenetrable mountain range. The medicine, along with a temperature logger, was carried in a small styrofoam box (pictured), with the incident believed to be the first time people have been immunised with the assistance of a commercial drone.

"Today's small flight by drone is a big leap for global health," said UNICEF executive director, Henrietta Fore.

"Drone technologies can be a game-changer for bridging that last mile to reach every child," Fore said, with the drone supplied by Australian firm Swoop Aero.



ODOR-EATERS may have

helped a Chinese man who has reportedly ended up in hospital with a severe lung infection from smelling his own socks.

According to media reports from the city of Zhangzhou, each day when he got home from work the man underwent a ritual including changing into more comfortable clothes and giving his socks a good sniff.

It turns out he caught a fungal infection from the practice, with doctors saying me must have inhaled spores which spread to his lungs from his sweaty feet.

THE SafeScript real-time prescription monitoring system currently being rolled out in Vic has alerted doctors and pharmacists in Western Victoria to almost 3,300 patients at risk of harm or overdose from visiting multiple clinics or pharmacies.

That figure has been achieved in just the first two months of operation of the platform, with more than 400 sites part of the initial deployment across the Western Victoria Primary Health Network at a range of locations including Ararat, Ballarat, Geelong, Maryborough and Warrnambool.

SafeScript is monitoring all Schedule 8 medicines such as morphine and oxycodone, along with other drugs including codeine and diazepam, giving health professionals "finger-tip access to real-time information about their patients' prescription history of monitored medicines.

"Prescription medicine dependency can happen to anybody, and deaths caused by prescription medicine misuse have outnumbered the road toll in Victoria for the past six years," said Vic Health Minister, Jenny Mikakos.

"We said SafeScript would save lives and that's exactly what this cutting-edge program is doing.

"Now health professionals can access real-time information about a patient's prescription history, and discuss with them the risks of using dangerous amounts of prescription medication," Mikakos said.

The Victorian Government has invested \$29.5 million to implement SafeScript, including the development of the platform by Guild/Telstra offshoot Fred IT as well as training and support for practitioners.

A public awareness campaign has also been rolled out targeting more than 600,000 people in the region, who can also get free, confidential advice by calling the 24 hour SafeScript Pharmaceutical Helpline on 1800 737 233.

The system will be rolled out across the state in Apr 2019.

Hunt also toured the Holland Park Chempro Chemist medical centre, as well as a Gold Coast pharmacy.

Pharmacy Guild of Australia Branch Vice President, Kos Sclavos, said key issues on the table included concerns about the \$1 PBS discount, access to the National Immunisation Program, the next pharmacy agreement and the opportunity to embed specific programs so they are not up for renewal every five years.
