Veterans HMR uptake rises

THE rate of Home Medicine Review (HMR) uptake among Australian veterans over the last decade has grown sustainably due to regular repetition of quality improvement messages, according to new research published in the Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA) journal, the Journal of Pharmacy Practice and Research.

Researchers based in the Quality Use of Medicines and Pharmacy Research Centre, Sansom Institute for Health Research, University of South Australia, Adelaide, evaluated the impact of quality improvement interventions at different time points on the uptake of collaborative HMRs.

National interventions to promote HMRs, comprising patient-specific prescriber feedback and tailored educational materials for patients and clinicians, were conducted in 2004, 2006 and 2011 through the Veterans' Medicines Advice and **Therapeutics Education Services**

(Veterans' MATES) program.

More than 40,000 patients were targeted in each HMR intervention, creating data with statistical significance showing the monthly HMR rate increased from 0.2 per 1000 patients in Nov 2001 to 2.7 per 1000 patients in Dec 2012.

Prostate DNA test

THREE hundred UK men are taking part in a trial evaluating the potential of a new DNA test looking for high risk genes for prostate cancer, believed to affect one in 100 men.

The test takes a saliva sample and could form the basis of a nationwide screening program, Institute of Cancer Research scientists hope.

The foundation DNA research investigated more than 140,000 men and identified 63 new genetic variations that can increase the risk of prostate cancer.

Antibiotic stewardship

CANADIAN researchers investigated the impact of antimicrobial stewardship programs (ASPs) in 73 hospitals throughout the country to determine the key structural and strategic aspects of ASPs that were associated with differences in risk-adjusted antibiotic use.

The new work was published in Infection Control & Hospital Epidemiology and found there was a 7-fold range in antibiotic use from 253 to 1,872 defined daily doses (DDD) per 1,000 patient days.

The only structural component associated with lower risk-adjusted antibiotic use was the presence of designated ASP funding or resources.

Permissible ingredients

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has made a total of 88 changes in the updated Permissible Ingredients Determination labelled No. 2 of

The listing provides transitional arrangements for medicines that are currently listed in the Register to comply with new

requirements included in the previous determination.

These include requirements such as new concentration limits or safety information required on product labels.

The listing contains nine new ingredients and makes changes to 75 existing ingredient entries.

These latter are designed to make requirements either less restrictive such as broadening the administration options, or more restrictive such as requiring warning statements and transitional provisions.

Some changes reflect existing requirements from the Poisons Standard while some make minor changes to ensure greater clarity with entries.

Four ingredients were identified

Less alcohol, less risk

LIGHT drinkers have the lowest risk of developing a number of cancers or dying according to a nine-year Queen's University Belfast, Northern Ireland, study published in PLOS Medicine.

The study's lowest drinking category was an average of less than one drink per day across a lifetime, and the risk for some cancers increased with each additional drink per week, the researchers wrote.

The analysis was limited to older adults and could be confounded by socioeconomic factors, and the findings should not be taken to support a protective effect of light drinking, the authors cautioned.

Coffee for BG control?

AN ARTIFICIAL genetic 'circuit' that can be switched on with



caffeine can help regulate blood glucose (BG) levels in

diabetic mice models, according to international researchers, published in Nature Communications.

Although only a proof-of-principle demonstration, this work shows how synthetic biology may one day be used in healthcare with minimal invasive disruptions to lifestyle.

Polypharmacy probe

NEW research published in the International Journal for Quality in Health Care found "substantial variation" in polypharmacy, hyperpolypharmacy and antipsychotic medicine use across 71 residential aged care (RAC) facilities in NSW and the ACT.

The study used routinely collected electronic



medicines administration relating to 4,775 permanent residents living in participating facilities on 01 Oct 2015.
