Flu vaccines for 2019

THE Government's National Immunisation Program (NIP) has secured more than 6 million doses of influenza vaccine to ensure Australians most at risk during this year's flu season are able to access free influenza immunisation.

Those eligible for a free flu shot under the NIP are people 65 years and over (*PD* Fri), pregnant women, those with chronic conditions and, for the first time, all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People from six months of age.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and adolescents aged 5-14 years of age will now also have free access to the flu vaccine.

Four different quadrivalent influenza vaccine brands are being supplied this year for people aged under 65 - Afluria Quad (Seqirus), Flu Quadri and Flu Quadri Junior (Sanofi) and Fluarix Tetra (GSK), with enhanced trivalent vaccine Fluad (Seqirus) available for over 65s - the four-times potency Fluzone is available on private script.

Treating Dry Skin Issues

IN LAST week's comment I discussed chapped lips and how pharmacist advice might be critical in choosing the right lip care product for a patient. Skin can get affected similarly with peeling, cracking, roughness, tightness, red marks and associated itch due to many external factors; drug side effects, climatic conditions or use of chemicals etc.

Often the first visible sign of eczema, psoriasis and many other dermatological conditions is presence of very dry skin or Xerosis. Patients with diabetes can also present severe dry skin due to the alteration of sweat production. Therefore, choosing the right moisturiser is often a very critical step for a desired therapeutic outcome and cannot be ignored.

A good moisturiser should have the right balance of occlusive to form a protective seal, humectants to draw water from deep layers, emollients to fill in the cracks and barrier repair ingredients. Often a keratolytic agent such as urea is thrown into the mix to help with extra dry and scaly skin. Skin feel, texture, SPF presence and claims such as clinically or dermatologically tested should also be given careful consideration when selecting the right product for the individual.

As always, when in doubt ask for your pharmacist's help.


