Workers on strike at CWH

MEMBERS of the National Union of Workers this morning kicked off indefinite strike action at Chemist Warehouse (CWH) distribution centres, confirming the walkout endorsed last week (**PD** 04 Mar).

Described by union National Secretary, Tim Kennedy, as a "David and Goliath struggle," the staff are demanding "wages and conditions on par with industry standards," as well as conversion of roles from labour hire casual to permanent positions, and "an end to the toxic culture of bullying and harassment".

The union claims to have recruited up to 75% of permanent employees at the CWH Melbourne

Dispensary Corner

AMERICAN pharmacy giant CVS is changing its on-hold music, after a plea from a Boston-based doctor who said the current CVS jingle played on the pharmacy phone system "haunted him day and night".

The Boston Globe reported the case of Dr Steven Schlozman, a child psychiatrist at Massachusetts General Hospital, who last year wrote a tongue-in-cheek letter to a local radio station about the issue.

A national debate ensued, culminating in an announcement last week by CVS that it was in the process of updating the system.

YOU'VE heard of "baby brain" - that phenomenon where the parents of newborns seem to lose touch with reality.

There was an extreme case in Saudi Arabia this week, when a flight from Jeddah to Kuala Lumpur was forced to turn back because a mother realised she had left her infant in the terminal before boarding the aircraft.

Fortunately local air traffic controllers were able to expedite an emergency landing, and the embarrassed mum was safely reunited with her baby.

Opioid use debate

WHILE recent research out of Monash University has declared the move to make codeine prescription-only has had no effect on the rate of prescribed opioid use, Pharmacy Guild of Australia Victorian Branch President Anthony Tassone is unequivocal that there has been a rise in opioid prescriptions.

The study by Monash Addiction Research Centre tracked opioid prescriptions across three years, two before the restriction came into force, and one year after.

The data showed that in the 12 months following the restriction, there was no increase in opioid prescriptions.

On an ABC 7.30 report, Tassone argued otherwise saying, "What we have seen, not only in my pharmacy, but pharmacies in general, is there has been an increase in PBS-subsidised codeine".

He said prescriptions were being filled at a higher dosage therefore the average dose of opioid was now much higher than prior to the restriction on codeine, whereas the move was intended to reduce opioid deaths as in the US crisis.

PBS payments faster

THE Federal Department of Human Services has advised of shorter payment cycles for PBS online payments.

Approved suppliers of PBS and RPBS medicines who make claims online will receive funds within two to nine days, with the changes to be implemented from 29 Mar 2019.

For example claims submitted between 29 Mar and 03 Apr will be paid on Fri 05 Apr, while claims submitted between 04 and 10 Apr will be paid on Fri 12 Apr.

Claims submitted before 29 Mar will be paid using the current cycle time of nine to 16 days.
