#### **Opioid substitution**

**GUILD** Learning and Development has created a new online course titled *Opioid* substitution



therapy: A guide for pharmacists.

The module educates pharmacists about opioid substitution therapy including the pharmacological basis for using substitution therapy, its benefits and aims for treatment.

Guild Learning and Development adds that the course also provides preliminary information for pharmacists who wish to initiate an opioid substitution therapy service within their pharmacy.

There are nearly 50,000 people in Australia who use methadone or buprenorphine to treat opioid dependence, and an estimated 40,000 people are eligible for opioid substitution therapy who, for many different reasons, are not accessing treatment.

# TWC switches ad agency

TERRYWHITE Chemmart (TWC) has appointed Brisbane-based creative agency VMLY&R to manage its marketing, with the deal including retail, digital, mass media and in-store channels for the 450-strong pharmacy group.

#### **Spinal manipulation**

THE Chiropractic Board of Australia has banned spinal manipulation treatments for children under two years of age while a formal review of the practice is undertaken.

The Council of Australian Governments Health Council review will "examine the current best evidence for the efficacy of spinal manipulation to treat childhood illnesses or health concerns in infants and young children," with the Board saying it wants to ensure the public has access to "safe, ethical and competent care".

The Australian Chiropractors Association has responded, saying it is "disappointed that the care we are able to provide children may be restricted".

The Association said it did not want to see a restriction of choice, adding that "greater regulation in this area will not improve the healthcare provided to children" and claiming "significant evidence of the value parents place on the informed care provided".



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#### Pharmacists drive down admissions

**CLINICAL** pharmacists in a multidisciplinary team in the UK town of Croydon, south of London, have helped reduce avoidable hospital admissions under a program which sees them work together with local GPs to discuss complex patients and also receive

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hospital discharge referrals.

The first six months of the program, which was established in response to high local hospital admission rates, saw the pharmacists identify almost 600 medication related problems and estimated savings of almost £180,000 in avoidable admissions.

The approach is described as "outcomes-based commissioning" which aims to reward outcomes that matter to patients, in contrast to payment-for-volume services.

As well as regular "huddles" at each GP practice, the pharmacists undertake home visits to counsel patients and deprescribe.

#### Italy bans non-vax children from school

ITALIAN children have been told not to turn up to school unless they can prove they have been properly vaccinated reports BBC News.

The decision follows months of national debate over compulsory vaccination.

Parents risk being fined €500 if they send their unvaccinated children to school and children under six can be turned away.

Under Italy's new Lorenzin law, named after the former Health Minister who introduced it, children must receive a range of mandatory immunisations before attending school, including vaccinations for chickenpox, polio, measles, mumps, and rubella.

The ruling takes effect on Mon.

#### PPA picket line push

**UNION** group Professional Pharmacists Australia (PPA) is urging its members to support sister organisation the National Union of Workers (NUW) by joining picket lines at Chemist Warehouse distribution centres (PD 12 Mar).

An update from PPA Qld director Adam Kerslake said "Professional Pharmacists Australia members know that Chemist Warehouse is not a great employer from working in their stores...we've now learned from the NUW that distribution workers supplying the products and perfumes to stores are being exploited - on sham contracts and threatened with being sacked via text if they raise any issues.

"I've been down on the picket in Queensland and I'd encourage you if you live nearby to a distribution centre to come down and show your support," Kerslake urged.

Workers at the sites in Preston and Somerton in Vic, and Eagle Farm in Qld, have gone on an indefinite strike with a range of demands including a 30% pay increase and better conditions.

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### Dispensary Corner

**BUTT** surely you must be joking. A new well-intentioned craze has swept the globe, with action groups and individuals apparently making a thing out of collecting cigarette butts.

Their unified goals are to reduce plastic litter and to educate the masses around the impact on our delicate planet.

Lorella Doherty from New Plymouth, UK, smashed her goal of collecting 10,000 cigarette butts in ten days, picking up over 12,000 fag-ends from streets, beaches, walkways and gutters.

In Queenstown, NZ, woman Liz Smith (pictured) collected 10,527 cigarette butts from beaches over 30 days and now wants smoking banned in public areas - NZ aims to be smoke free in 2025.

So perhaps pharmacies should prepare for a slump in NRT sales.



LIGHTNING struck twice in the case of America's Terry Splawn from Massachusetts - he won \$1 million with a \$150 Million Cash Explosion scratch-off ticket he bought on Wed at Sam's Mini Stop in Concord, just two years after a previous win of \$1 million, bought from the same store.

The odds of winning US\$1 million in each game are one in 1.8 million and one in 1.248 million respectively, according to the lottery's website, making the odds of winning both around one in 2,246 billion.

### Medlab's NanaBis ticking boxes

LISTED Australian medical life sciences company, Medlab Clinical has announced further strong data resulting from both clinical trial and approved Special Access Scheme (SAS) use of its nano-delivery form of cannabis, NanaBis.

Head to head comparisons between Nanabis and an ARTGlisted cannabis-based drug demonstrated a similar plasma level of THC and CBD, while NanaBis is only half the dose.

In addition, the rate of absorption for NanaBis was faster.

Medlab CEO, Dr Sean Hall this week presented a clinical update to medical practitioners as part of an on-going medical education program around NanaBis, saying the data was "very encouraging".

Hall said the trials were indicating NanaBis was safe and tolerable, with results repeatable.

Several case studies for NanaBis use under the Special Access Scheme in patients with severe pain

were also discussed, with Hall citing ""significant improvements in quality of life inclusive of sleep and movement with reduced pain/restriction".

Other reported

outcomes related to the reduction/replacement of previously prescribed medication (in particular opioids), reduction in pain severity scores and reduction

of symptoms.

Hall said based on the trial activity, Medlab was actively pursuing regulatory pathways for the TGA in Australia, FDA in the USA and the European Medicines Agency, adding that "Medlab has a planned framework that should take NanaBis to an approved drug".
