SHPA maps out bold workforce vision

PHARMACY practitioners should be positioned as "essential to Australian healthcare" in all practice settings, according to a new document released by the Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA) at its annual gathering on the Gold Coast.

Titled Advancing Australia's Pharmacy Workforce, the manifesto "ties together years of planning," according to SHPA President, Peter Fowler, in his opening address to Medicines Management 2019, the 45th SHPA National Conference.

"Pharmacy represents an under-utilised pillar of Australian healthcare at a time of rapidly changing demographic and economic challenges," he said, with the document showing "how SHPA supports members in their everyday work, while fostering a broader healthcare environment in which every pharmacist can maximise their impact on patient care".

The vision includes the Society's Practitioner Development Pathway which links the organisation's key initiatives and programs, "showing how SHPA supports growth in a pharmacist's skill, expertise and experience, connecting ambition

and opportunity as they advance their practice," Fowler said.

Growth in a pharmacist's skill, expertise and experience is underpinned by the continual development of five core competencies: medicines management and patient care; leadership and management; education and research; professionalism and ethics; and communication and collaboration, according to the document.

A second concept showcased comprises SHPA's six "Pharmacy Innovation Principles" which demonstrate "how we intend to foster intra- and inter-hospital environments that fully harness the value and expertise of Australia's hospital pharmacy workforce".

The principles outlined were:

- Position all pharmacy
 practitioners, across all settings
 and in all roles, as essential to
 Australian healthcare
- 2. Support and recognise pharmacists and technicians to operate at their fullest scope of practice
- 3. Embed an advancing practice approach to reflective life-long learning from earliest stages of career development



- 4. Establish equitable access to experiential learning for students, hospital pharmacy interns, and foundation and advanced training residents, across Australia
- 5. Progress advanced and specialty roles and career opportunities for pharmacists and technicians
- Build and strengthen
 partnerships fostering innovation
 and research between
 practitioners, healthcare teams
 and organisations.

SA vax age lower

THE South Australian Government is considering lowering the age for pharmacist influenza vaccination to patients as young as 10 years old, in the wake of this year's "horror influenza season".

Currently pharmacists in SA can only immunise people aged 16 and up, with the state's Health Minister, Stephen Wade, saying lowering the age would boost the proportion of vaccinated children.

More than 100 South Australians have died from influenza this year.

SA Chief Public Health Officer, Nicola Spurrier, noted that increasing pharmacist vaccination to include younger children would make it easier for families to ensure they were protected.

The South Australian Branch of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia hailed the proposals, saying such a move would "bring Australia a step closer to national harmonisation of flu vaccination delivery through community pharmacies".

Currently children aged 10 and up can be vaccinated by pharmacists in Western Australia, Tasmania and Victoria.

"Lowering the minimum age of pharmacist-administered flu vaccinations will undoubtedly improve access and save more lives," said SA Guild Branch President, Nick Panayiaris.

"Clearly pharmacists are part of the solution and giving pharmacists the ability to practise at their full scope, applying their training and expertise will bring great benefits to our health system."

Sigma+Cronos

SIGMA Healthcare and listed medicinal cannabis supplier Cronos Australia Limited have signed a new national distribution deal (PD breaking news Fri).

Cronos is aiming to import the Peace Naturals range of CBD and THC-based products from its sister operation in Canada, and also develop its own range for sale in Australia, which will be distributed via Sigma's pharmacy brands.

Biome Osteo out

ACTIVATED Probiotics has this month launched a new Biome Osteo Probiotic into the Australian pharmacy sector.

The company's CEO, Michael Oredsson, said the clinically trialled product reflected a "mounting body of research" which had uncovered an important role of the gut microbiota in the maintenance of hone health.

The study, published in The Lancet Rheumatology, found a significant reduction in bone loss (assessed at the lumbard spine) in women who received the probiotic product daily for 12 months, compared to those who received a placebo.

SHPA technician standard release

THE Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA) has launched a new Standard of Practice for clinical pharmacy technicians.

SHPA CEO, Kristin Michaels, showcased the new Standard of Practice for Pharmacy Technicians to Support Clinical Pharmacy Services, which outlines how pharmacy technicians can undertake a range of ward-based administrative, supply, technical and cognitive activities.

Chair of SHPA's Pharmacy Technician Role Redesign Steering Committee, Trudy Teasdale, said the new document incorporated best practice from across Australia.

"We've gathered the views and expertise of a broad range of members over many months of consultation," she

CHF demands 7CPA seat

THE Consumers Health Forum (CHF) has issued a formal position statement on the Seventh Community Pharmacy Agreement (7CPA), saying it should be a signatory to the pact.

"The agreement should involve all key stakeholders, including consumers, as recognised parties to the National Medicines Policy on behalf of the Australian people.

"Consumers typically have more contact with pharmacists than with any other health professional, and should have more say in the funding and design of pharmacy services," according to CHF CEO, Leanne Wells.

Releasing the statement, the Forum has also made a number of recommendations about the 7CPA. including urging the Government to ease dispensing restrictions and permit consumers to get two months' supply for each dispensing of a range of commonly prescribed medicines.

"Removing this often unnecessary restriction - unless prescribed otherwise by the doctor - would improve accessibility, convenience and affordability for consumers on routine medication who currently have to go back to the pharmacy

every month for no good reason." Wells said the issue of two month

dispensing was an example of the need for reform in pharmacy regulation and financing.

"Community pharmacy is largely funded and governed through an agreement worth billions of dollars covering consumer-related services, yet consumers have little say in it."

Other recommendations made by the CHF include splitting the agreement into two parts - one covering pharmacy remuneration, and the other relating to professional services, to strengthen the consumer focus on services and invest in innovation in pharmacy service delivery.

The Forum is also urging "innovation to remove regulatory barriers such as anti-competitive location and ownership rules which stifle competition," as well as regulatory change which would help deal with innovations such as e-prescriptions and pharmacy vending machines.

CHF's manifesto also urges increased transparency, to give consumers more timely information on prices and medicine information at the point of dispensing.

Dispensary Corner

THEY'RE generally good at sniffing out truffles, but some wild boars in Italy got a little more than they bargained for after coming across a stash of cocaine hidden in a forest.

Narcotics dealers allegedly buried the drugs, worth about \$60,000, in Tuscany's Valdichiana valley, but were dismayed to find the packages scattered throughout the woods when they went to retrieve them.

A phone tap tipped off the police to the incident, leading to the arrest of the gang which is claimed to have traded about 2kg of cocaine each month in nightclubs in the city of Arezzo.

It's unclear what the effect of the drugs were on the animals, but locals were on the lookout for a pack of plastered porkers.

WANT to work on your mental health at work? Have a meeting.

That's the suggestion of a researcher from the University of Malmo in Sweden, who have published a study saying meetings can be seen as a type of "therapy" rather than actually a forum for decision-making.

Professor Patrick Hall particularly highlighted long meetings, which are theoretically a place to work on company strategy, but actually serve as an "opportunity to complain and be acknowledged by colleagues".

He also noted that while some meetings seem pointless to those taking part, they can sometimes be used to assert the authority of an organisation.

SHPA awards winners

Fowler, pictured above right with Morris, said the award celebrated the NPS chief's strategic vision, inspirational leadership and his ability to effect service improvement



for the betterment of patient care.

Other accolades announced during MM2019 included the **Australian Clinical Pharmacy** Award for 2019, which went to Matthew Rawlins from WA, recognising his longstanding work in infectious diseases and antimicrobial stewardship as a clinician, researcher and educator on pharmacy practice and patient

During the conference gala dinner a number of SHPA Members' Awards were also unveiled, including Dr Jacinta Johnson, named as Emerging Leader of the Year, while Gemma Kemsley was awarded Technician of the Year.

The team at TOPCare Cardiology Project at Ballarat Health Services was awarded Hospital Team of the Year, with SHPA CEO, Kristin Michaels, saying the standard of achievement this year was "indicative of the depth of talent and innovation across Australia's leading community of pharmacists and technicians".

Michaels also highlighted the achievements of Jacinta Costello from Austin Health as part of the SHPA Residency Program.
