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JPPR to deliver Fast Track research

THE Society of Hospital
Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA)
has closed it's 45th National
Conference on the weekend
reporting strong financial footing,
record membership retention
and several program milestones,
including the announcement of
a Fast Track research publication
plan.

In her Chief Executive's Address, Kristin Michaels announced the opening of *JPPR* Fast Track, a new, expedited review option for leading translatable research to find faster publication in the *Journal of Pharmacy Practice and Research (JPPR)*.

"For research that is of high quality within its discipline or field and/or pertinent to dominant or emerging issues in pharmacy practice, JPPR Fast Track authors will gain access to premium promotional support from SHPA

in addition to four- to six-week timelines from submission to first decision and from acceptance to online publication," Michaels said.

SHPA President, Peter Fowler (pictured), detailed some of the video highlights, which spanned advocacy, SHPA Residency, CPD and events and the release of the organisation manifesto Advancing Australia's Pharmacy Workforce (PD 18 Nov).

Summarising the organisation's achievements, Fowler went on to say, "In 2019 we saw national policy achievements in areas such as opioid management, and continued to drive the conversation on electronic medicines management and closed loop systems.

"We began the progressive release of new and updated guidelines on optimal clinical practice, saw growth across national and Branch CPD events



and roll-out of Residency sites, launched the CPD Central planning and recording tool, remained the principal driver of the Advancing Practice credentialing program and saw the first year of full operation of the SHPA Mentoring Program."

Fowler also spotlighted the SHPA's 2019 Annual General Meeting which saw the launch of the *Investment to impact: 2019 SHPA Annual Report* video and supporting summary.



Statins-memory



AN AUSTRALIAN study led by Garvan researchers reveals there is no link between statin use and cognitive decline in the elderly.

In fact, their findings, based on work involving more than 1,000 elderly patients over a period of six years, shows that statin use can actually slow down cognitive decline in individuals at risk of dementia.

Statins had formerly been loosely associated with isolated cases of memory loss, but the body of evidence now supports ongoing therapy with statins as a preventative measure - CLICK HERE to access.

AusVaxSafety reports on 2018 results

THE AusVaxSafety system in Australia is an early detection mechanism to monitor adverse events associated with vaccines.

A few days after an individual receives a vaccine at any participating immunisation clinic, the clinic sends an SMS to the person to determine if they have had any reaction to the vaccine.

Those responding with a

"Yes", are then surveyed for a description of the adverse event.

AusVaxSafety monitors the responses closely so that any potential problems with vaccines can be detected and acted on

The system has released its 2018 report with 91% of patients reporting no adverse events.

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Dispensary Corner

DIRTY and well over thirty, Ireland's over-50s are experiencing the less than pleasant consequences of their sexual freedom.

Health experts in the Emerald Isle have noted that sexual health campaigns have targeted young adults, while cases of syphilis and gonorrhea among older people have exploded in recent years.

While it is often said that young people feel invincible, Cork Sexual Health Centre Manager, Catherine Kennedy, told the Irish Sunday Mirror, those over 50 appeared to believe they were immune to the consequences of engaging with multiple partners.

"There can be a huge misunderstanding when it comes to sexually transmitted infections in adults in their 50s, 6os and 7os," she said.

"Just because they may not have had many sexual partners they might feel that they aren't at risk.

"They received little or no formal sex education [and] therefore they don't have the same knowledge."

Kennedy has called for campaigns to normalise STI screening to curb the rapidly rising problem, which has seen a 130% increase in the number of cases of gonorrhea in the last three years in Ireland.

Pharmacist, Laura Dowling, said the spike in STIs came as no surprise as condom sales slumped over the last few years, saying "they seem to be going out of fashion".
