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Access to MMRs down

PATIENT access to medication management reviews (MMRs) is in decline, the Commonwealth Department of Health's 2018/19 Annual Report reveals.

Data from the report, published last week, revealed that the percentage of urban centres with a population of more than 1,000 with a resident service provider or recipient of MedsCheck, Home Medicines Reviews (HMRs), Residential Medication Management Reviews (RMMRs) or Clinical Interventions, fell by 9.1% since the 2015/16 year.

The report found that while the rate was within the Government's 80% target, it had fallen steadily over the last four years.

NPS MedicineWise Director and consultant pharmacist, Debbie Rigby, said the Department's figure indicated caps on HMRs, RMMRS and MedChecks had reduced uptake.

"I think the funding needs to change, especially for HMRs and RMMRs - maybe they should just be called MMRs," she said.

"The [Pharmacy] Guild [of Australia] seems to set and forget... there was substantial support for when those programs were



introduced, but little or no ongoing support.

"Current Guild leaders want to kill off HMRs and RMMRs as they are largely not done through community pharmacy, and yet they are the only programs which have shown positive outcomes and sustainability.

"We now have a workforce ready and able to deliver... many early career pharmacists see it as part of their future, and yet artificial constraints are imposed.

"They restrict access, especially in rural and remote areas."

While Rigby noted the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia has been advocating for pharmacists to be allowed to provide MMRs through the Medicare Benefits Scheme, she warned there were risks with that.

ON WORLD Polio Day Sun 27 Oct, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) officially declared the world free of wild poliovirus (WPV) type 3, due to determined vaccination programs, and emphasised its commitment to achieving the same for the final remaining strain, type 1.

All types of WPV have been eradicated in Australia since 2002.



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Poll shows public backs deregulation

AN ONGOING News Corp poll is showing a public appetite for reforms of the Pharmacy Location Rules in the wake of repeated claims that regional pharmacies are charging up to three-times more than discounters.

The poll featured in an article across News Corp's tabloid websites attacking the location rules showed 80% of respondents wanted to see them overturned to increase the opportunity for discount pharmacies to open in regional areas - at the time of publication.

The article cited data from a survey conducted by Chemist Warehouse in 18 regional NSW towns, reporting that 57% of people had travelled to another town to access medicines from a discount pharmacy, and follows a similar poll in Victoria, which reported patients were being charged up to three-times the price for prescription in rural pharmacies than in metropolitan discount stores.


Melbourne Business School, Dean, Professor Ian Harper - the author of the *2015 Competition* Policy Review - told News Corp "the location rules are not in the interests of consumers".

Responding to the article, a spokesperson for the Pharmacy Guild of Australia noted that Harper had assisted in the preparation of Chemist Warehouse's submission to the King *Review of Pharmacy*, calling for the abolition of the location rules, while a consultant for Deloitte Access Economics.

However, Professor Stephen King, rejected the recommendation in his 2016 report, saying evidence showed there was an inconsistent spread of pharmacies in regional areas prior to the introduction of the Location Rules in 1991.

"[The 1988 Pharmaceutical Benefits Remuneration Tribunal] found that many pharmacies in urban areas were clustered together with rural and remote areas having significantly poorer access," he said.

"In some cases pharmacies were located within 10 metres of each other, 25% of pharmacies were within 100 metres of another pharmacy and 62% were within one



kilometre of another pharmacy, while other areas struggled to attract even one."

King said the introduction of the Location Rules resulted in a restructuring of the sector that encouraged greater efficiency within the sector and led to the opening of pharmacies in areas of need.

Meanwhile, Medici Capital Managing Director, Frank Sirianni, warned moves to deregulate the industry could come at a cost to patients and the economy (*PD* vesterday).

BKL finalises deal

BLACKMORES (BKL)

has taken full ownership of the Catalent Australia manufacturing facility in Braeside, Victoria, on Fri, following the completion of a \$43.2 million acquisition (*PD* 26 Apr 2018).

The Australian Securities Exchange-listed supplement brand finalised the deal with a final payment of \$33 million, with \$20 million capital payment to be made early next year attributable to upgrades and expansions at the 30,000m² plant.

From Mon the Braeside facility will provide close to 50% of all BKL's tablet and capsule requirements.

Further plans for the business will be raised at BKL's annual general meeting later this week.

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Dispensary Corner

A US man has had a double dose of luck after winning \$200,000 on his way to his final chemotherapy treatment.

Ronnie Foster from North Carolina said he stopped off en route to the clinic for some scratch lottery tickets, and was shocked to win the jackpot.

"I saw all those zeros and I froze," he told lottery officials.

"I was already happy because it was my last round of chemo... winning this made it my lucky day," Foster said.

ALL that beer and bratwurst has to have some effect - and scientists have now quantified the shocking environmental impact of Germany's annual Oktoberfest celebration.

And the news isn't good apparently attendees at the 16-day event in Munich last year emitted 10 times more methane than the US city of Boston over the same period.

Researchers from the Munich Technical University walked around the perimeter of the celebration with special mobile sensors, attempting to measure the flatulent emissions of the thousands of revellers.

That's somewhat of an exaggeration - they actually said much of the whopping methane count was due to incomplete combustion in cooking and heating appliances.

However, a significant proportion - about 10% - was attributed to the burps and farts of the attendees, according to a paper submitted to Atmospheric Chemistry and Physics.

Sleep well with hypertension

PATIENTS treated for hypertension with oral therapy have better outcomes if they take their medication prior to retiring at night to sleep, according to new research.

Published in the European Heart Journal, the Spanish study demonstrated significantly enhanced decrease in asleep blood pressure (BP), increased sleep-time relative BP decline and reduced risk of major cardiovascular disease events.

The multicentre, controlled, prospective study involved 19,084 hypertensive patients followed up over around six years - academic.oup.com.

Gentamycin offlabel risk alert

DUE to a shortage in supply of Pfizer Gentamicin 80 mg/2 mL (as sulfate) injection BP ampoule, an alternative, Gentamicin Injection USP 40 mg/mL ampoule is a suitable alternative in most situations, but not inhalation.

The TGA said it was aware that the Pfizer product was sometimes used off-label via inhalation.

Clinicians and pharmacists are warned by the Therapeutic Goods Administration that the off-label use of this substitute product needs to consider the effects on the lungs of its different preservatives.
