Sanofi, GSK vax collaboration

PHARMACEUTICAL giants Sanofi and GSK are joining forces to the development of a vaccine for COVID-19.

The companies signed a letter of intent earlier this week, pledging to share technology in a bid to have a vaccine available by the second half of 2021.

Sanofi will contribute its S-protein COVID-19 antigen, while GSK will provide its pandemic adjuvant technology, in their joint effort to develop a vaccine to protect against the virus.

Sanofi CEO, Paul Hudson, said the scale of the COVID-19 crisis showed that "it is clear that no one company can go it alone".

"That is why Sanofi is continuing to complement its expertise and resources with our peers, such as GSK, with the goal to create and supply sufficient quantities of vaccines that will help stop this virus."

PROPOSED solutions to extend pharmacists' scope of practice enabling therapeutic substitution of medications without approval from the prescriber are "almost unworkable", Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) National President. Dr Chris Freeman. helieves

Speaking during the PSA's weekly COVID-19 webinar last night, Freeman flagged concerns over the Therapeutic Goods Administration's (TGA) planned protocols for the measure, which was announced by Federal Health Minister, Greg Hunt (PD 01 Apr), as part of the Government's response to the COVID-19 crisis.

"While we have welcomed the initial announcement from the Minister around the ability for therapeutic substitution for both the strength and form [of prescribed medications], unfortunately the way in which the proposed solution will be implemented is almost unworkable for the pharmacy profession," Freeman said.

"That includes protocols being issued by the TGA for pharmacists to follow, and multiple forms to be filled out.

"This is well within the scope of practice for a pharmacist.

"It is a very sensible solution to the medicines shortages issue and we are working now to ensure the implementation of this is done in a way which does not add to the workload of the already busy pharmacy workforce."

Freeman also noted PSA members' concerns around the pace of legislative reforms at State and Territory levels, to enable the use of digital prescriptions following the Federal Government's announce that it would permit the use of electronic scripts.

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PSA backs calls for COVID tax breaks

FINANCIAL supports need to be introduced by the Federal Government to support pharmacy and other health workers who are separating themselves from their families to mitigate against the risk of spreading COVID-19, the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) believes.

PSA National President, Dr Chris Freeman, raised the issue during a COVID-19 webinar last night, following questions from delegates.

"A colleague of mine who works in a rural location has had to separate himself from his young family because one of his children, who is newly born, had a few medical conditions," Freeman said.

"He said he didn't want to expose his wife and family by potentially bringing that home to them, so he's chosen to seek alternative accommodation.

"He's having to pay that accommodation cost out of his pocket to simply protect his family. "So I absolutely agree [there should be something.

"[Financial support] measures that have been introduced recently are welcomed, but they don't directly trickle down to the front line health staff in terms of their increased costs, the stress and pressure that they are facing on the front line.

"There should be ways in which either tax concessions at an individual level could be implemented so those front line health staff feel more supported, or as some states have already implemented, funds [should be made available] for short-term accommodation for front line health staff who have had to separate themselves from their families."

Meanwhile, an online petition has been circulated calling on the Prime Minister, Scott Morrison, and Federal Health Minister, Greg Hunt, to provide a "hazard allowance" and a tax break for pharmacy workers.

The petition launched by Queensland-based pharmacist, Pardeep Singh, notes that "while most doctors are consulting online through telehealth and have closed their doors, we remain open".

Women's shelter seeks support

PHARMACISTS are being urged to collaborate with other health professionals to support domestic violence services in the face of an expected surge in cases throughout the COVID-19 crisis.

Sydney-based Hornsby-Kuring-gai Women's Shelter President, Louise McCann, called on pharmacists and other health professionals to help women in need to access the vital services.

"It's critical that at this time that health professionals and domestic violence service providers work together to ensure women have access to the vital support services they need," she said.

"Women turn to doctors and nurses in emergency, often suffering critical injuries.

"However, health professionals often don't know where to refer their patients after they have been treated."

McCann added the implementation of social distancing an isolation were barriers to accessing services.

Campbell added that pharmacists needed to find a way to "switch off", if possible to help manage their stress levels.

"You're on the front line and you've got that feeling of risk," he said.

"It's not something that we've had to deal with before.

"Do not hesitate to reach out to the Pharmacists' Support Service

(PSS), even if it's to run through how others are dealing with the increased pressure."

PSA National President, Dr Chris Freeman, also encouraged pharmacy owners and managers to have regular check-ins with their teams as a group to ensure staff members remain connected despite reduced contact with each other.
