Vax education needed: WHO

HEALTH authorities around the globe need to empower people to make informed decisions around COVID-19 and any potential vaccines, World Health Organization (WHO) Health Promotion Director, Ruediger Krech, believes.

Speaking during a World Federation of Public Health Associations webinar, Krech said the world was "much better prepared to develop a vaccine for COVID-19 that it was during the Ebola crisis five years ago".

However, he said authorities would need to invest in educating people about the virus and the measures required to stop it, to boost willingness to be vaccinated. He added that authorities

need to listen to concerns surrounding the uptake of a vaccine.

Funding key to pharmacist integration

ADEQUATE funding and recognition of the professional contribution and competencies of community pharmacists will be critical to ensuring their integration into primary health networks, researchers believe.

In an article published in Pharmacy Practice, looking at primary care policy and the vision for community pharmacy in Australia, the authors from the University of Technology Sydney, noted the "integration of community pharmacy into primary health care faces challenges, including the lack of realistic integration in Primary Health Networks (PHNs), and in service and remuneration models from government".

The authors said the details of both the yet to be signed Seventh Community Pharmacy Agreement (7CPA) and the Federal Government's Primary Health Care 10-year Plan, would shape the future practice and viability of community pharmacy.

"It is essential that both provide a philosophical direction and prioritise integration, remuneration and resources which recognize



the professional contribution and competencies of community pharmacy and community pharmacists, the financial implications of service roles and the retention of medicines-supply roles," they said.

"A significant barrier to pharmacists achieving highimpact contribution as integrated members of the health team is the current state of remuneration for services.

"The right incentives must be provided for all health practitioners, like GPs, nurses and pharmacists to integrate services effectively, with clear responsibilities contributing to overall health outcomes.

"All aspects of the pharmacist's role need to be resourced appropriately.

"However, there will also be specific challenges such as freeing pharmacists' time to deliver services, recording and using data to demonstrate value for the viability of community pharmacy.

"Without adequate funding and recognition of pharmacist's contributions to primary care, it will be difficult to ensure integration.

"It is clear that the next five years will be critical to lay the foundation for change that is needed to support further integration of community pharmacy into primary care. "

Router stolen in pharmacy break-in

QUEENSLAND Police are investigating possible links between three break-ins at pharmacies, with prescription medicines and a VOIP router among the items stolen.

The three incidents occurred between 2.30am and 4am on Thu, at pharmacies on Waldron Street, Yarrabilba, Maudsland Road, Oxenford and Egeersdorf Road, Ormeau.

Police reported two males were seen entering the Yarrabilba store.

A large rock or piece of concrete was used to smash windows in each case, with TerryWhite Chemmart Yarrabilba, noting the break-in on its Google Business

NSW needs NIP access

NSW needs to join Victoria, Western Australia and the ACT in giving pharmacists approval to administer vaccinations through the National Immunisation Program (NIP) the Pharmacy Guild of Australia believes.

Guild NSW Branch President,
David Heffernan, told *The St George*and Sutherland Shire Leader,
that with the ongoing COVID-19
crisis it was more important than
ever to boost access to influenza
vaccination services.

"NSW needs to catch up with Victoria, Western Australia and the ACT to empower pharmacists to administer vaccines through the taxpayer subsidised NIP," he said.

"The NIP means older Australians, and other vulnerable groups can get their flu vaccine from the healthcare professional of their choice and in their local community pharmacy if they want to.

"Unfortunately, unlike those elsewhere, over-65s in NSW aren't allowed to choose which healthcare provider they want to receive their NIP flu vaccine from.

"Under the taxpayer-subsidised NIP, people in NSW should get



the same choice as those in other states."

Heffernan's appeal for pharmacists to have access to the NIP was backed by researchers from the University of Technology Sydney, who reported that a number of patients have paid to receive vaccinations in the community pharmacy setting rather than going to a GP even though they were subsidised, in an article published in *Pharmacy Practice*.

"The fact that some consumers [who are eligible for NIP vaccines] are willing to pay for a service... underpins the need to have these vaccinations easily accessible to ensure greater uptake through all community pharmacies," they said.


