THE Therapeutic Goods Administration has issued a warning for patients to stop taking Maxman XI tablets after testing revealed they contain undeclared sildenafil.

Users have been urged to dispose of any remaining tablets at their local pharmacy.

Pharmacy in a year like no other

Arronis, who has received

Corp Thanks A Million campaign,
and as the 2020 Community
Pharmacy Hero (*PD* 22 Sep), said
the year had seen pharmacists
face "many unprecedented
and confronting situations and
challenges".

Arronis reflected on stock shortages of medications for chronic conditions.

"I never expected [at] any time during my career in pharmacy to see the shelves bare of those items," she said.

"It's still unbelievable to me that we experienced that."

2020 Pharmacy of the Year Winner, Capital Chemist Chisholm (ACT) Owner, Rebecca Young, said the challenges have allowed the profession to utilise an increased scope of practice to support patients, highlighting the benefits of the Continued Dispensing measures, which have been



extended until 31 Mar 2021.

"This has been really useful when we've had patients who've run out of their prescription, they've come into us, when they can't get in to their usual doctor," she said.

"We've been able to provide them with ongoing supply for a month and it's meant they haven't gone without their medication, which has improved health outcomes, so this is something I hope will continue."

For the co-owners of Westgarth Pharmacy in Victoria, Claire Elovaris and Stephanie Miridakis, noted the COVID lockdowns have seen their team dealing with the mental health of patients.

Research, analysis skills key to future

PHARMACISTS need to ensure they have skills in research, data analysis and informatics to support their roles in a post-COVID-19 world, Australian Pharmacy Council (APC) Chair, Associate Professor Sue Kirsa, believes.

In a message posted on the APC website, Kirsa noted that pharmacists across community, hospital and academic settings have faced significant challenges due to the COVID pandemic.

"Universities have been hit hard by the global pandemic," she said.

"They've had to turn around, in very short timeframes, their models for delivery of degree courses as well as seeing much of their research suspended.

"Hospital pharmacists have worked hard to maintain the supply of medicines to our patients.

"For many hospital pharmacies, there was a need to act quickly to secure additional spaces for medicines storage.

"Our community pharmacy colleagues have also been doing it tough over the last few months.

"Especially as the hint of shortfalls in medication supplies caused public concern

"Front-line community pharmacy staff have continued to serve the public despite personal risk.

"Pharmacists have also been at the forefront of data analysis to determine what impact COVID-19 has had on medical supplies.

"They have worked with the states and the Commonwealth on realtime data, monitoring:

- · treatment regimens, and
- increasing visibility of medicine supplies across the country.

"This work has highlighted that skills in research, data analytics and informatics are important for us to attain.



"They are core skills that pharmacists of the future need." Heralding the profession's efforts during the crisis, Kirsa added, "let's hope the Commonwealth recognises both the great job pharmacy has done during the pandemic and the likely challenges that the pandemic will bring to the supply chain for medicines."

SHPA honours Vaughn Eaton

SOUTH Australia's Vaughn Eaton has been named as the 2020 Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA) Medal of Merit recipient.

Eaton, who holds academic positions at the University of SA, Flinders University and Monash University, was awarded the medal for his "selfless sharing of expert pharmacy knowledge" over 30 years.

SHPA President, Peter Fowler, said Eaton was a "truly deserving recipient", highlighting his role in developing a state-wide pharmaceutical contract model and medicines formulary in South Australia, which "had led to unprecedented efficiencies and savings for SA Health".

Politicians review tobacco strategies

A FEDERAL Senate select committee is set to report on tobacco reduction strategies, including the use of vaping, in the wake of the Therapeutic Goods Administration's (TGA) interim decision to make certain nicotine-containing products Prescription-Only.

Centre Alliance Senator, Stirling Griff, called for the Senate to note "research by the Australian National University, which confirms that non-smokers who vape are three-times more likely, on average, to take up tobacco smoking" and "for people trying to quit tobacco smoking, e-cigarettes tend to result in prolonged use of nicotine, rather than cessation".

Liberal Senator, Jonathon Duniam, called on the Senate not to pre-empt the work of the select committee, noting "the proposed changes would mean that certain nicotine-containing products could only be supplied with a doctor's prescription".

He added the TGA's decisions were made independently based on expert medical advice.

Seqirus seals deal to supply UQ COVAX

CSL subsidiary, Seqirus, has finalised an agreement with the Federal Government to supply 51 million doses of the COVID-19 vaccine (COVAX) candidate being developed by the University of Queensland and CSL.

The deal includes an upfront commitment from the Government to support the clinical and technical development activities required to progress the vaccine, if clinical trials are successful.

In an announcement to the Australian Securities Exchange

(ASX), CSL said it is "almost ready" to start a large-scale Phase 2b/3 randomised, observer blinded, placebocontrolled study.

"Subject to progress in the current Phase 1 study, the first subject for the Phase 2b/3 [trial] would be enrolled in Dec, with the goal of completing recruitment by Mar 2021," the company said.

The ASX announcement also noted CSL is working with the Therapeutic Goods Administration to get the vaccine to market quickly and safely.

Dispensary Corner

BUGS Bunny eat your heart out. A London street looked likely to suffer a massive overdose of vitamin A this week after 32 tonnes of carrots were dumped as what turned out to be part of

an art installation.

The mystery mound of vegetables appeared on a road within the University of London campus, with locals taking to social media with photos (pictured) and questions about the humongous heap.

A spokesperson for the university's Goldsmiths Art College eventually confirmed that the produce pile was actually an exhibit titled "Grounding" by Master of Fine Arts student Rafael Perez Evans.

"Rafael has arranged for the carrots to be removed at the end of the exhibition and donated to animals," he said, with the installation aiming to raise awareness of food waste.

However to help the industry out, the scientific team here at *Pharmacy Daily* world headquarters has also done some analysis of the incident.

One large carrot contains six milligrams of beta carotene, which converts to 1,000 micrograms of vitamin A - meaning the roughly 500,000 carrots dumped on the street equates to about 16,000 100-packs of a typical 10,000 IU vitamin A softgel supplement.
