MedAdvisor wins contract

Heart benefits?

NOVO Nordisk said the heart-protective benefits of its Wegovy (semaglutide) obesity drug are due to more than weight loss alone, according to new data, *Reuters* has reported.

Full results from the study, presented at the American Heart Association annual scientific meeting in Philadelphia in front of a standing-room-only crowd and published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, suggest the drug has other beneficial effects beyond the known health benefits from losing weight.

The heart risk difference between patients who received Wegovy and those on placebo "began to appear almost immediately after starting treatment," researchers said. MEDADVISOR Solutions has won a contract to develop and deliver enhancements to its PlusOne software platform to support the 2024-2025 North Queensland Community Pharmacy Scope of Practice Pilot.

The pilot program will allow prescribing pharmacists to diagnose and treat up to 23 everyday health conditions across acute care, chronic conditions, and medication management.

The program will be delivered via an enhanced MedAdvisor PlusOne software platform, which will consist of a patient portal, clinical information system, prescribing functionality, secure communications, and data analytics, the company stated.

The cost of delivering the program will be partially funded by the Pharmacy Guild of Australia.

According to MedAdvisor CEO Rick Ratliff, the awarding of this contract is a "testament to the company's enduring reputation among its 5,700+ pharmacy customers around the nation".

Ratliff also noted that the company expects to generate new revenue streams in the future from assisting in the delivery of these expanded services.

National President of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, Trent Twomey, said, "with timely primary care becoming less accessible for patients in addressing their healthcare needs across Australia, we anticipate that community pharmacies can play a key role in bridging this gap".

The pilot program is expected to launch on 01 Feb 2024, and operate for a period of 16 months, concluding on 31 May 2025.

Currently, approximately 135 community pharmacies in North Qld have registered to participate in the program.

Prescribing pharmacists will be able to offer up to 23 diverse clinical services to their local communities. *JG*

National apology

ON WED 29 Nov, the Australian Govt will issue a national formal apology to all Australians impacted by the Thalidomide tragedy.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese will deliver the apology on behalf of the Govt.

"The Thalidomide tragedy is a dark chapter in the history of our nation and the world.

"This moment is a long overdue national acknowledgement, and in giving this apology, we will acknowledge all those babies who died and the families who mourn them, as well as those who survived but whose lives were made so much harder by the effects of this terrible drug," Albanese remarked.

Federal Health Minister Mark Butler said, "so many were let down by systemic failures, and it's a sobering reminder of our duty to put in place measures to protect people from harm".

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Time for a pulse check

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) has launched an end-ofyear survey this week to check the pulse of its members, following a turbulent year for pharmacists.

Leveraging pastilles and vapes for growth

ECS Botanics is launching a range of GMP-certified cannabidiol (CBD) and tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) pastilles and vapes.

The products are expected to be in the market before the end of this year and will increase ECS Botanics' white-label offering to four products - flowers, oils, pastilles and vapes.

Managing Director Nan-Maree Schoerie said, "the expansion of our B2B product range to include GMP-certified CBD and THC pastilles and THC vapes provides our customers and their patients with alternative dosage methods.

"Pastilles and vapes are relatively new delivery methods and will complement our existing B2B offering, leveraging our expertise to meet growing consumer demand for premium medicinal cannabis solutions.

"We have already received preorders for these new products and expect demand to increase rapidly," Schoerie commented. The pastilles will be available in both CBD and THC forms, as well as combinations of both.

They are sugar-free, plantbased, and offered in a range of flavours and colours.

Pastilles are chewed and dissolved in the mouth, enabling the active ingredients to rapidly enter the bloodstream.

The THC distillate vape will be infused with additional terpenes, replacing the previous dried flower vaporiser cartridge product that ECS was looking to introduce to the market in 2023.

The cartridges will be available in 0.5ml and 1ml strengths.

Australian-made, the vape cartridges use oil concentrates manufactured from ECS' pharmaceutical-grade extracts derived from the company's Australian-grown flower, and come in child-resistant packaging, the company statement explained.

"I didn't think it would create such a big sensation."

Since their photos went viral, Hsueh said her friends and relatives had promised to rethink how much waste they create in their daily lives.



PHARMACISTS are trusted and accessible healthcare professionals who are accustomed to delivering brief health behaviour change with technique-based interventions for chronic health conditions.

However, little is known about the factors influencing pharmacists' use of behaviour change techniques and their capacity to deliver these interventions within community pharmacies in Australia.

A Curtin University study, led by Dr Chloe Maxwell-Smith from the Curtin School of Population Health. employed the COM-B model to explore the factors that explain pharmacists' delivery of behaviour change techniques in practice.

A secondary objective was to ascertain whether capability, opportunity, and motivation are associated with and explain significant variance in using behaviour change techniques



during patient interactions.

"The study found pharmacist motivation was the most important construct explaining behaviour change technique use," Smith said.

"Interventions should seek to foster pharmacist motivation and may benefit from adopting COM-B as a behaviour change framework. to understand the factors influencing the delivery of behaviour change interventions." To learn more CLICK HERE, JG
