CW partnership

CHEMIST Warehouse (CW) and virtual research provider ObvioHealth have entered into a partnership in a bid to give sponsors easier access to a wider pool of participants by driving awareness about trials in the chemist group's stores (PD Breaking News yesterday).

CW co-founder Jack Gance saw this initiative as a logical extension of the company's complete line of clinical health and provider services.

"Not only is this a win for trial sponsors but also for the participants - our customers who will have access to trials they never knew existed," explained Gance.

"As a dependable health and wellness source, we are eager to educate our customers about new opportunities that might be relevant to their health."

In addition to CW's reach, where it stated it has seen 180 million customers every year across its 550+ outlets across Australia, there has been an increase in trial activity in recent years, which means "each of those customers is a potential trial participant".

ObvioHealth can also use CW's telehealth services, Instant Consult, for studies that require clinician assessments.

Butler justifies 60-Day scripts' impact

FEDERAL Health Minister Mark Butler told a packed audience that 60-Day prescriptions is not the first time the Guild and a Labor Govt have disagreed on the way forward and won't be the last time.

Speaking at the Pharmacy Guild's Annual Parliamentary Dinner 2023 held in the Great Hall of Parliament House in Canberra on Tue night, Butler said the Guild had been "mad" about some of its decisions made over the past 12 months and that at times heated exchanges needed to take place.

"These are hard words, and those words were also spoken by Bob Hawke back in 1990 in an address to the pharmacy organisation then," Butler added.

"This has shown again and again that Labor is prepared to do what it takes to strengthen the PBS," he added, Evidence shows that the 60-Day scripts are delivering





patient benefits while maintaining a strong and vibrant pharmacy sector, a sector that has grown in the six months since the policy was introduced, he remarked to an audience of politicians from all sides, Guild officials, members, and pharmacists (pictured).

Butler pointed out that in the two months since the 60-Day scripts came into effect in a "phased and measured way as expected for the first 100 medicines, 3% of scripts have been double dispensed, while 97% are single dispensed, with patient savings of almost \$5m".

The Health Minister explained that the Govt is "deeply committed to the objective" of delivering the 8th CPA by Mar next year (*PD* 15 Nov) however, he did caution that "these are big asks in any negotiating time and an even bigger ask in a shorter timeline".

"What will be delivered is an agreement in the next period that is in the spirit of engagement, a recognition of the priorities of the Govt, and of the pharmacy sector, and a willingness to sit down to seriously work through all those issues," he remarked.

"The Govt has elected to speak for Medicare and that means strengthening the PBS to reflect the



needs of today not for decades ago. "Cheaper medicines, pharmacy

profitability, sustainable govt spending, these are not ends in themselves," Butler commented.

"They are a means to an end, and the end you know is patient benefit." *JG*

"Misled the room": CAPS



THE Community and Pharmacy Support Group (CAPS), representing the independent pharmacy sector against the 60-Day Double Dispensing policy (60DD), has challenged Federal Health Minister Mark Butler's recent speech to the Pharmacy Guild in Canberra.

CAPS asserts that the minister "downplayed the detrimental effects of 60DD on both the industry and its patients and misled the room about the policy impact".

In response to Minister Butler's assertions, CAPS emphasises the critical issue of pharmacy viability, particularly in the context of small businesses that play a vital role in employing local communities and providing essential services.

The organisation argues that while the govt intended to alleviate the cost of living through 60DD, the reality on the ground tells a very different story.

Contrary to the promised savings for vulnerable community members, pharmacists report a misconception about 'two for the price of one' medicines, increased prices and heightened pressure on medicines already facing shortages.

The supposed benefits to patients are actually coming at the expense of community pharmacies struggling to adapt to the changes imposed by 60DD, stated CAPS.

Shadow Health Minister Senator

Anne Ruston (**pictured** below) echoed the sentiments shared by CAPS, representing their concerns.

She stated her support for cheaper prescription medicines but was critical of how the 60DD policy had been implemented.

"But we do not support a policy which sees community pharmacies wear the entire cost of the 60DD policy," Ruston added.

"Frankly, the cost should be funded by the govt, especially if the govt intends to take credit for the policy," she asserted.

"Most of you are small businesses, and it's unreasonable to expect you alone to shoulder the burden of the change in dispensing costs," Ruston remarked.

CAPS spokesperson Christine Kelly said that Butler's comments were "out of touch".

"Butler spoke about pharmacies being in a good position as new ones are opening up, I think it's fair to say that the pharmacies opening had been ongoing projects that had been in the works prior to 60DD, today is a very different landscape." JG



APC approval

THE Australian Pharmacy
Council (APC) Board has
approved the Accreditation
Standards for Pharmacist
Prescriber education programs.

APC was engaged by the Pharmacy Board of Australia (PharmBA) to develop these Accreditation Standards to complement PharmBA's previous work on pharmacistled prescribing.

The organisation will now provide PharmBA with the Standards which signals the end of the year-long project.

From 20 Nov, education providers can apply to the APC to have their programs accredited against the organisation's standards.

APC Chair Associate Prof Sue Kirsa said accreditation is a critical enabler for enhancing the safety and quality of healthcare expanding scope and improving access to medicines by the community.

"We are committed to supporting the growth and expansion of pharmacist roles whilst assuring safety and quality in pharmacy education.

"APC is now firmly recognised as a leader and expert in the development of accreditation standards," Kirsa added.

"Our standards are evidencebased and ensure pharmacists who have completed an accredited program are competent to practise safely within their scope.

"We thank everyone who has contributed to the whole consultation process and APC looks forward to receiving applications from education providers," Kirsa concluded.
