Bondi Sands alert



THE TGA has put out a product defect correction for Bondi Sands Everyday face SPF50+ Sunscreen Mist as it states the directions for use incorrectly indicate users can spray the product directly on their face.

If a customer sprays the sunscreen mist directly onto their face this may cause accidental inhalation, local irritation of the nose, mouth, and throat, as well as coughing and sneezing, warned the TGA.

Pharmacists should inform their staff that customers should be advised if they have purchased a Bondi Sands **Everyday Protection Face SPF** 50+ Sunscreen Mist to not spray it directly on their faces.

The updated direction is to spray it onto your hands and then apply it on your face, the regulator explained.

As a general rule of thumb, aerosol sunscreens should not be sprayed directly on the face, the TGA added.

UTIs drive MedAdvisor

NEW pharmacy programs in Australia for services such as uncomplicated UTI treatment continue to drive demand for the MedAdvisor platform, according to an update from the firm today.

The ASX-listed medication management technology firm this morning reported a strong start to the financial year, with \$25.4 million in operating revenue for the three months to 30 Sep, a year-onyear increase of 27%.

In Australia and NZ the company grew its gross profit by 35% to \$5 million after cutting costs through the consolidation of GuildLink into its operations, while recent price increases also saw subscription revenues increase.

Overall subscriptions in Australia rose "as MedAdvisor's role solidifies as the preferred partner enabling community pharmacies to take advantage of new scope of services", the company said.

In the USA MedAdvisor also grew, attributing the expansion to the growth and diversification of vaccine programs as well as new chronic medication programs such as diabetes.

CEO Rick Ratliff said, "despite the economic and operational changes affecting our customers both in the USA and ANZ, we are witnessing a strong demand for our services as our customers rely on us to navigate these challenges effectively".

He said recent restructuring in both regions as well as the recent addition of a US-based Chief Operating Officer positioned MedAdvisor to deliver growth.

"Our focus on pharmacy-driven patient engagement solutions in the US and ANZ will continue to support community pharmacies as market economics and structure of the healthcare industry changes," Ratliff concluded. BP

Top findings from 3 million health checks

PRICELINE Pharmacy has provided more than three million health checks at its instore health stations since rolling them out nationwide in 2015.

Hold the shaker

THE average Australian eats far too much salt - almost double the recommended maximum, the latest Grattan Institute report, Sneaky salt: How Australia can shake its salt habit, has revealed.

Each year, more than 2,500 Australians die from illnesses caused by high salt intake.

The report calls on the Federal and State Governments to double the number of food types covered by salt limits and make some limits mandatory because there has been no progress in reducing salt intake under Australia's voluntary scheme.

Further, the report's authors said that the salt content must be measured for foods sold in bakeries and fast-food restaurants, to pave the way for salt limits there.

The authors urge investigating the feasibility of requiring the enrichment of salt with potassium, starting with bread and table salt, as "potassium enrichment makes salt healthier without changing its taste".



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Vic prescribing pilot starts

THE commencement on Fri of the Victorian Community Pharmacist Prescribing Pilot means participating community pharmacists can prescribe antibiotics for women experiencing an uncomplicated urinary tract infection.

Community pharmacists can also repeat the supply of oral contraceptives (**PD** 04 Aug).

"Patients will now be able to access safe and timely treatment for everyday conditions and basic healthcare needs from appropriately trained community pharmacists," said Pharmacy Guild of Australia, Vic Branch committee member, Megan Kazantzis.

"The pilot framework ensures collaboration between a patient, their pharmacist and GP through active communication and referrals, meaning patients will have more options for getting timely access to treatment," said Kazantzis.

The Vic Community Pharmacist Prescribing Pilot will later expand to also include the treatment of select minor skin conditions.

Pharmacist immunisers participating in the pilot will also soon be able to administer select travel vaccines following the completion of additional training.

There will be no charge for patients to see a participating community pharmacist to receive care under the pilot, said Kazantzis.



If medications are required, the cost to the patient would be no more than if they had received prescription from a GP, she added.

To participate in the Victorian Community Pharmacy Prescribing Pilot, community pharmacists are required to meet certain criteria, including having a consulting room at the pharmacy, and completing mandatory training for each of the piloted services they will be providing, follow other protocols and guidelines (*PD* 20 Oct and *PD* 25 Oct).

Following the 12-month Vic Community Pharmacy Prescribing Pilot, an evaluation will take place with recommendations informing future scope of practice for community pharmacists in Vic, reported the Guild. *JG*

ACP's new guideline to treat sick children


A NEW guideline has been developed by the Australasian College of Pharmacy (ACP) on the management of acute pain and fever in children.

Pharmacists provide accessible and affordable primary healthcare and are often the first health provider consulted by parents and carers when a child has pain and/or fever.

Supported by a grant from Reckitt, the guideline provides evidence-based advice for the community pharmacist to utilise when recommending non-prescription medicines and providing advice to a caregiver on the management of pain and/or fever in children.

Where possible, assessment of pain and fever in children involves the consideration of both verbal and non-verbal cues, the College added.

While there are validated tools for assessing pain in children, a community pharmacy environment may not be conducive to using these effectively, so taking an appropriate history from the child and/or their caregiver(s) is key to



deciding a course of action.

To officially launch the guideline, the College will be hosting a free webinar on Tue 31 Oct at 7pm AEST for pharmacists.

The webinar to treat paediatric patients will be presented by the College's Chief Pharmacist Suzanna Nash; academic pharmacist Dr Brett MacFarlane; and a community pharmacist with a specialisation in pain management, Karalyn Huxhagen.

Migraines a big headache for women

A NEW report by pharmaceutical company Organon called *Australian* Women and Migraine, has uncovered that migraine attacks are still taking too long to be controlled, with women revealing it can take up to eight hours to manage symptoms.

Almost five million Australians live with migraines, with women being twice as likely to be impacted than men.

Key insights show that 61% of women who are unsatisfied with how their migraine is managed blame the lack of better solutions as a barrier to managing the difficult condition.

Nearly two thirds of these women felt they can't reduce their symptoms fast enough.

The majority of women living with episodic migraine attacks found themselves having to isolate in a dark quiet room to deal with the pain.

Further, only 15% carry their script with them, preventing quick access to treatment.

The report also showed that a migraine's common triggers included lighting in the office (63%), or loud music and conversations (52%), making triggers difficult to avoid, affecting productivity and concentration in daily life.

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Dispensary Corner

AFTER struggling to sleep for several nights, a 64-year-old woman in Taiwan visited an ear, nose and throat clinic.

There, doctors discovered a small spider moving about her ear canal.

It had also discarded its exoskeleton, which sat nearby.

The doctors used a tube to suction out the spider and exoskeleton from the woman's ear, according to a case report published last Wed in the New England Journal of Medicine.

"She didn't feel pain because the spider was very small, it's just about 2-3mm," said Dr Tengchin Wang, the report's coauthor and the director of the otolaryngology department at Tainan Municipal Hospital.

Most ear, nose and throat specialists see "tens, if not more, of bugs or some sort of arthropods" in ear canals throughout their career, according to Dr David Kasle, a physician at ENT Sinus and Allergy of South Florida, who wasn't involved in the new research, reported NBC News.

However, the image in Wang's report is "unusual and disturbing," Kasle said.

Wang said he wrote the report because of the case's novelty.

He has seen ants, moths, cockroaches and mosquitoes inside people's ears before, but never an insect that molted inside an ear canal.

He urged the public to see a doctor if they ever experience such symptoms and not stick their finger in their ear as the insect could sting them.

NSW expands vaccines

VACCINATION access has been expanded in NSW following updates to the state's Pharmacist Vaccination Standards that increases access to the National Immunisation Program (NIP) vaccines.

The minimum age requirements for Shingrix vaccines were lowered, while written consent requirements for COVID-19 vaccines have been removed, the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) explained (PD Breaking News Fri).

PSA NSW President Luke Kelly said the changes cut red tape, making vaccines more accessible across the state.

"As a state our focus should be on removing barriers to vaccination, cutting the red tape that prevents qualified pharmacist immunisers from delivering more vaccines to more people," Kelly explained.

The key changes to vaccinations in NSW now means that pharmacist immunisers can administer the Shingrix vaccine to patients from previously 50 years and over to those now 18 years and over, to align with the eligibility for the Shingrix vaccine under the NIP.

The inclusion of the monovalent meningococcal C vaccine for people aged five years and over will now



ensure pharmacist immunisers can provide a full range of meningococcal vaccines to eligible people in the state.

The changes also remove the reference to the COVID-19 vaccine following its recent inclusion in the Australian Immunisation Handbook, to be consistent with the approach for all other vaccines that pharmacist immunisers are authorised to administer.

The COVID-19 vaccine written consent requirements have also been removed to be consistent with consent requirements for all other vaccines, meaning informed consent must be obtained and documented evidence of verbal consent must be made. *JG*
