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Report calls for national eczema plan

UP TO three million Australians, including one in three children aged six years or younger, are afflicted by eczema which causes severe pain, distress and sleep disruption.

Those were the findings of 'The Burden of Eczema - Evidence for a National Strategy', a major report launched by Eczema Support Australia with input from a multidisciplinary group representing nurses, psychologists and GPs and supported by the Australasian College of Dermatologists.

Eczema Support Australia says it costs the economy \$4 billion per year and is calling for a national strategy to "prevent Australians from being lost in a treatment maze".

Eczema Support Australia Managing Director, Melanie Funk (pictured), said she has experienced the issues first-hand and that the report should act as an "SOS call to Government to establish a National Eczema Strategy".

"As a mum with twin boys

diagnosed with eczema 14 years ago, it was shocking to me how little support and patient education there was, made all the worse because eczema never sleeps - so neither does anyone dealing with eczema," she said.

"For a condition that is so common and requires such a high level of self-management, it is truly shocking there isn't more support and education, and so many are lost in a treatment maze."

Dr Adriene Lee, President of the Australasian College of Dermatologists said, "a coordinated response will go a long way to ensuring all Australians with this condition have optimal and equitable access to treatment and care, which is why the College has no hesitation in supporting this report - and the evidence for a National Eczema Strategy".

The report includes a 10-point list for a National Eczema Strategy to address starting with standardising the care of Australians with eczema



so those impacted receive the right medicine and services, including psychological support, at the right time, regardless of where they live.

Other areas to address include countering 'steroid phobia' to prevent the underuse of corticosteroid therapy which leads to unnecessary eczema flare-ups, and ensuring all Australians with eczema benefit from timely access to treatment.

Further, increasing health literacy for those affected, funding patient support services, bolstering dermatology training in general practice, addressing a nationwide shortage of dermatologists, and establishing an eczema registry. See the full paper, **HERE.**

Lauder to step down



LEONARD A. Lauder, the billionaire head of the Estée Lauder Companies cosmetics fortune, will be stepping down from the company's Board of directors in Nov of this year.

The 90-year-old's son, William Lauder, is currently the Executive Chairman of the Board, while his other son, Gary Lauder, serves as the Managing Director of Lauder Partners LLC, a US-based venture capital firm.

Gary will take over his father's role once he vacates, while Leonard will remain Chairman Emeritus of the Board.

"As Chairman Emeritus of the company, I'm looking forward to continuing my work as an advisor and 'chief teaching officer,' serving what I believe to be the best company in the world", Leonard said in an internal memo.

He first started working at Estee Lauder in 1958 and has held multiple senior positions, including President and CEO, Chairman of the Board and finally, Chairman Emeritus for the company.


The Lauder family has a 35% stake in the company.

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Dispensary Corner

BRITISH MPs have expressed outrage after discovering that some of the country's hospitals are able to treat obese patients only on the ground floor over fears that the floors made of crumbling concrete might collapse.

The unnamed medical facilities were described in an article in *The Times*, where Labour MP Meg Hillier commented that the findings were "jaw-dropping".

"In one hospital, staff can carry out roof maintenance only if they and their tools are a certain weight...heavy patients must be treated on the ground floor because the combined weight with equipment is too heavy to be safe," she wrote.

The issues surround the use of RAAC or Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete, a lightweight building material which was used in the 1980s and 1990s.

The UK Government has confirmed RAAC is present in buildings at 34 hospitals across the country, pledging that seven of the worst affected will be upgraded by 2030.

Unions blamed the "perilous state" of the facilities on "years of budget cuts" which have caused the postponement of upgrade plans.

RAAC is less dense than traditional concrete because its manufacturing makes it "bubbly", with some engineers describing the material as "somewhat like an Aero bar".

Officials say they believe the current monitoring of the buildings remains appropriate.

Medicinal cannabis trial is promising

ASX-LISTED Little Green
Pharma Limited has hailed the
initial results of a new Australian
clinical study which has found
the use of medicinal cannabis led
to significant improvements on
patient quality of life.

The Quality of Life Evaluation Study (QUEST) Initiative shows "very strong evidence of clinically meaningful improvements" for those suffering health-related quality of life and fatigue issues, with the peer-reviewed findings published this morning in the openaccess *PLOS ONE* journal.

QUEST is one of the world's largest longitudinal clinical studies on medicinal cannabis, with the research supported by Little Green Pharma and led by the University of Sydney.

Adult patients in Australia who were newly prescribed medicinal cannabis for health conditions such as chronic pain, fatigue, sleep, depression and anxiety between Nov 2020 and Dec 2021 were invited to participate in the study.

A total of 2,327 people aged between 18 and 97 years participated, with 63% of them being female and patients recruited across six states by 120



independent doctors.

The most common conditions being treated were chronic pain (69%), sleep disorders (23%), anxiety (22%) and anxiety/ depression (11%), with half of the patients being treated for more than one condition.

The results from the first three months of patients using medicinal cannabis found very strong evidence of clinically meaningful

improvements in health-related quality of life and fatigue across all health conditions assessed.

Good results were reported for pain, moderate-to-severe anxiety and depression, however the three month results for those patients assessed for sleep disorders found no change despite very strong evidence of statistical improvement in feelings of fatigue.

The study was supported by notfor-profit private health insurance provider Health Insurance Fund of Australia and guided by an experienced advisory group, with the next step involving analysis of 12-month results to see if improvements are maintained over the longer term.

A range of national bodies endorsed the project such as MS Research Australia, Chronic Pain Australia, Arthritis Australia and Epilepsy Australia.

Little Green Pharma Head of Research & Innovation, Dr Leon Warne, said the initial results were highly encouraging.

"As well as the medical benefits to patients, this study was able to provide access to experienced providers and more affordable medication," he said.

Fake drug alert

THE World Health
Organization has issued a
Medical Product Alert relating
to a fake batch of Defitelio
(defibrotide sodium) which
was detected in India and
Turkiye in recent months in
falsified packaging.

The medication is indicated for the treatment of severe hepatic veno-occlusive disease in haematopoietic stem-cell transplantation therapy.

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
