Dispensary help

Insulin SSSI

NOVO Nordisk has advised the TGA that it will discontinue the Protaphane InnoLet human insulin (rys) 100 IU/mL injection multidose cartridge on 01 Feb 2025.

The TGA has created a Serious Scarcity Substitution Instrument (SSSI) that allows a pharmacist to dispense a Protaphane Penfill cartridge in its place without a new prescription, if the pharmacist considers it will be suitable for the patient - see more HERE.

Forged prescriptions alert

PROFESSIONAL indemnity insurer, Pharmaceutical Defence Limited (PDL), is warning pharmacists to look out for forged prescriptions being presented.

PDL said that despite the introduction of Real Time Prescription Monitoring (RTPM), "some forged or fraudulently obtained prescriptions may still slip through the checking process".

PDL noted that falsified prescriptions often have multiple "red flags", such as being for S8 or S4 monitored medicines that may be subject to misuse or abuse; the patient or prescriber are from outside the local area; or the prescription has not been recorded on an RTPM system.

There may also be behavioural indicators, such as being overly friendly, or the patient or prescriber have called in advance to check if the medication is in stock.

Before acting on suspicious prescriptions, the insurer has stressed the need to prioritise safety of staff and other customers, and suggests making a copy of the script before interacting with the individual.

It recommends that pharmacists should contact the prescriber if



they have doubts over the validity of a script, and check recent communications from authorities and the RTPM system.

The insurer reminded pharmacists to be aware that "sophisticated forgeries often have valid PBS Authority Approvals", and that they should "not use the existence of a valid PBS Authority Approval as a way of verifying a prescription".

PDL also suggested caution when presented with phone, fax and emailed scripts for high-risk medication, and to encourage the use of electronic prescriptions.

Pharmacists should report forged prescriptions to state health departments and the police as soon as possible. *KB*

Call to roll out new pneumococcol vax

AMID the worst outbreak of pneumococcal disease in 20 years, the Immunisation Foundation of Australia is urging the Federal Government to prioritise the rollout of the newer, broader-coverage pneumococcal vaccines that are approved by immunisation and regulatory authorities.

"Newer pneumococcal immunisations protect against more strains than the vaccines currently available, but a funding decision is mired in bureaucratic red tape," said Catherine Hughes, Immunisation Foundation Director and Founder.

"We have the tools to make a difference, and now is the time to ensure Australians at greatest risk of infection are protected," Hughes said.

With over 2000 cases this year, invasive pneumococcal disease is a leading cause of death and serious illness among children.

Non-invasive pneumococcal disease causes bronchitis, sinusitis and ear infections in children and the elderly.

Dispensary Corner

ISN'T there a saying along the lines of 'what you don't know can't kill you'?

Because you may prefer to not know that your breakfast is out to kill you.

But it's not the usual suspects, such as bacon or dripping or croissants with lashings of butter or sugar-filled cereal.

It's toast.

When cooking starchy food at high temperatures, such as baking, frying, air-frying, or indeed toasting, a substance called acrylamide arises from the reaction between natural sugars in the food and the heat that causes browning.

Acrylamide has long been linked with cancer, but now some Spanish experts have reported a link with heart attacks and stroke.

Among the cheery findings were an almost doubled risk of cardiovascular death in people with conditions such as type 2 diabetes, and around a 50% increased risk of suffering heart disease in the next decade.

Acrylamide is not only found in toast and other deliciously browned starchy foods, but also ultra-processed foods and coffee (nnnooooo!).

The good news, according to other experts, is that you need to eat about 160 pieces of burnt toast a day for it to have a worrying effect - probably not an issue for most people.

And you can also reduce acrylamide exposure by cooking your food to a nice golden colour, rather than...well, burning it.
