## Balloon lifts off

THE Enlighten Canberra Balloon Spectacular took place over the weekend, with Capital Chemist flying a hot air balloon from the lawns of the capital's Parliament House.

Pharmacist Amanda Galbraith's family, who own the balloon and are pilots, have partnered with the Capital group for nearly 20 years on this promotion.

CEO Andrew Topp said the popular balloon does several "cheeky" antics over the area. THE number of students entering internships is significantly lower despite the total number enrolled in all pharmacy degree programs steadily increasing since 2018, revealed the Guild's Workforce Capability Project's recent *Training and Qualifications Report*.

There is also a substantial difference between the student numbers enrolled in a pharmacy vocational education and training (VET) course and the completion rate, showed the report.

The highest completion rate was in 2021 at 39%, which was lower than the national average VET course completion rate of 46.1%.

According to the Australian Census 2021, the approximate size of the employed pharmacy workforce, including pharmacists and non-professional pharmacy employees, is 70,360.

This total comprises 28,297 pharmacists, 35,174 pharmacy sales assistants (working in the community setting) and 6,889 pharmacy technicians (working in the hospital setting).

Attrition high for pharmacy internships

However, students training to receive non-professional community and hospital pharmacy qualifications are not eligible to receive Commonwealth financial assistance to cover the cost of tuition fees and instead must seek financial assistance from their state and territory governments. The report explained that

for professional pharmacy qualifications, there are currently 20 universities in Australia offering 47 academic courses in total, which include both Bachelor's and Master's degrees.

The Guild stated that through future editions of both this report and the *Career Paths* report, it will seek to understand why students are not following a pharmaceutical career trajectory.

## WA pharmacist suspended and fined

A WESTERN Australian pharmacist has been reprimanded, suspended for two months, and fined \$10,000 last week for professional misconduct after inappropriate dispensing of steroid medication.

Chetan Anant Hegde, a registered pharmacist, dispensed anabolic androgenic steroids during the period 01 Jan 2008 to 30 Apr 2009, and was referred by Ahpra in May 2017 to the State Administrative Tribunal of Western Australia.

The tribunal cancelled Hegde's registration and disqualified him for three years.

However, on appealing the decision, the penalty was set aside, as the incident happened 15 years ago.

The Tribunal said that since then Hedge has practised without any incident, is remorseful and has undergone counselling and further training.

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#### Shifting of gears

THE Public Health Association of Australia's inaugural Preventive Mental Health Symposium today, will be the first-of-its-kind event with an "urgent focus" on preventing mental disorders.

The National Study of Mental Health and Wellbeing found that of Australians aged 16-85 from 2020-2022, an estimated 8.5 million people, or 43% of the population, had experienced a mental illness at some time in their life.

Of these, 39% of young adults (16-24) report a disorder.

Hosted in partnership with Beyond Blue, the event will see experts share their latest research about all of the potential causes of deteriorating mental health, from child maltreatment and changes in parenting through to physical activity, diet, social media, bullying, COVID-19, and even climate change. THE Australian Government announced yesterday that it will abolish almost 500 "nuisance" import tariffs from 01 Jul this year which may see the price of some pharmaceutical products reduced. Four tariffs related to

pharmaceutical products are slated for removal.

Two of them relate to "unmodified immunological products being polyethers in the primary forms", such as liquids, pastes, dispersions, solutions, and solids which include blocks of irregular shape and, lumps and powders, granules and flakes.

The other two tariffs relate to medical consumables and the appliances identified for ostomy use such as colostomy pouches.

Treasurer Jim Chalmers (pictured) said, "this is the biggest unilateral tariff reform in at least two decades". "It will cut compliance costs, reduce red tape, make it easier to do

business, and boost productivity." A full list of tariffs to be abolished

will be finalised and provided in the upcoming Budget.

In this one package of reforms, the Treasury stated it would abolish 14% of Australia's total tariffs.

Consultation on the proposed initial reforms is underway, with submissions open on the Treasury website and closing 01 Apr 2024.

The Treasury indicated that removing these tariffs will streamline approximately \$8.5 billion worth of annual trade and save businesses over \$30 million in compliance costs each year.

Chalmers mentioned, "Australian workers and businesses are not protected by these tariffs, but they still have to navigate the red tape involved and bear the costs of complying with the tariff regime". "These reforms are an important

step towards simplifying Australia's trading system and removing compliance costs for Australian businesses, particularly small to medium enterprises."

He commented that after successive trade agreements, most goods are now imported duty-free.

This now means that businesses spend time and money proving their imports are eligible for existing tariff preferences and concessions, a compliance cost often passed on to consumers, Chalmers explained. JG

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## Dispensary Corner

A WOMAN in the US who bought a mobility scooter online for US\$600 (A\$907) was ripped off by an online retailer after only receiving a walking cane. "That wasn't what I ordered," said Linda Lindell.

"You can't get in touch with them, I tried."

It seems the company, Upright Cane, has ghosted Lindell, who has not heard from them since following up her order.

"They were advertised all over the internet, not just on Facebook, but also on Google," Lindell told a US news outlet.

It's not the first time Upright Cane has come under fire, as a US journalist investigated the same issue with another consumer last year.

Five weeks later, another news reporter contacted Upright Cane, who said they were reviewing the problem.

But five weeks later, he visited Upright Cane's website and found that it no longer exists.

Meanwhile, Lindell, who is on a fixed income, said the US\$600 she lost to Upright Cane is crucial to her living expenses. "I can't afford to buy another scooter," added Lindell.

"I'm pretty much housebound unless my kids take me wherever." Upright Cane even gave customers the option to donate to Friends of Disabled Adults and Children.

However, the charity stated, "we have not heard of this company, nor had any conversations or agreements about their raising money on our behalf".
