PM's top prize for cancer drug success

SYNTHESIS BioVentures' founder, Prof Andrew Wilks, has been awarded the 2024 Prime Minister's Prize for Innovation in Science for his work in drug development, particularly the invention of momelotinib.

Along with co-inventor Dr Chris Burns, Prof Wilks created the JAK inhibitor that treats myelofibrosis, a form of bone marrow cancer.

Wilks' colleague and SYNthesis Managing Director Dr Fabio Turatti praised the award as a testament to Prof Wilks' contributions to Australia's biotech industry.

"Andrew's experience and expertise uniquely position him to guide the fund's investments.

"His success with momelotinib demonstrates his ability to identify and support promising medical research," Turatti said.

Momelotinib was acquired by GSK for US\$1.9 billion (A\$2.82 billion) in May and was recently approved by the US FDA.

This recognition highlights Prof Wilks' ongoing efforts to streamline



the path from medical research to marketable treatments.

His own experience with momelotinib, which took over 20 years to reach patients, underscores the need for more efficient drug development processes.

Today, he leads SYNthesis BioVentures, a venture capital firm focused on accelerating early-stage medical research.

The firm is currently raising \$75 million to invest in innovative healthcare projects.

Since its founding last year, SYNthesis BioVentures has raised nearly \$25 million and invested up to \$10 million in three more Australian companies.

One of these, Aculeus Therapeutics, is working on a treatment for paediatric cancers.

With over \$30 million in total funding, including \$3.25 million from SYNthesis BioVentures, Aculeus is preparing for human clinical trials and plans to list on the ASX within 12 to 18 months.

The company's other two investments are also progressing toward clinical trials.

Anaxis Pharma is developing a novel treatment for inflammatory diseases, with human trials expected in 2025.

Meanwhile, Skin2Neuron is working on a treatment for Alzheimer's and other neurodegenerative diseases, with clinical data expected within the next two to three years. JG

Call for sarcoma funding



THE Australian and New Zealand Sarcoma Association (ANZSA) is urging the government to increase funding for sarcoma research, particularly for early detection and better treatment options.

At a Sarcoma Community Connection event in Brisbane today, ANZSA highlighted the challenges faced by those diagnosed with this rare cancer, which affects both soft tissue and bones.

Sarcoma impacts around 600 Australians and 150 New Zealanders annually, with a fiveyear survival rate of just 50-70%.

Prof Peter Steadman is an orthopaedic surgeon, and incoming President of the international sarcoma group hosting the conference, ISOLS, at the Brisbane Convention Centre with ANZSA.

He noted that sarcoma is especially concerning for young people, being the third most common cancer in children and adolescents.

"Early detection is crucial, yet it's incredibly difficult to diagnose,"

Steadman commented.

"We desperately need breakthroughs, and that starts with greater investment in research."

Despite sarcoma's significant impact, it remains one of the least funded cancers, with little progress in treatment over the past 40 years.

Sarah Cheung, Chairperson of ANZSA's Consumer Advisory Panel and a sarcoma survivor, emphasised, "it's shocking that sarcoma has not seen a breakthrough in decades".

"As a sarcoma survivor, I know how difficult the journey is."

Without increased resources and research, patients will continue to face poor outcomes, she stressed.

"We need to amplify awareness of sarcoma and ensure people understand the gravity of this disease," Cheung added.

"Early detection can save lives, but without proper funding, advancements will remain out of reach," she concluded. *JG*

NSW vape audit

FROM the start of this month, certain nicotine vaping and e-cigarette products have been down-scheduled to Schedule 3 (S3), allowing pharmacists to supply them without a prescription.

In response, insurer Pharmaceutical Defence Limited has issued guidance titled 'Schedule 3 Supply of Therapeutic Vaping Products' to help pharmacists navigate this change.

The Pharmaceutical Services Unit (PSU) in NSW has also launched the e-cigarette Compliance Program to support regulatory compliance among pharmacists and medical practitioners involved in supplying vaping products.

The program aims to foster best practices, ensure compliance with legislation, and mitigate risks in the supply chain.

A key part of the initiative is the Pharmacy Inspection Program, which also began on 01 Oct.

Compliance officers will conduct routine inspections of pharmacies across NSW to ensure proper storage, sale, and compliance with regulations for Schedule 3 and Schedule 4 vaping products.

Pharmacists are encouraged to review PSU's audit tool to ensure they meet all regulatory requirements.

MICHAEL Straight, a former jockey who regained his ability to walk after a riding accident thanks to a US\$100,000 ReWalk Personal exoskeleton, found himself grounded once more - not by a horse this time, but by a dead battery, according to 404 media.

When the exoskeleton stopped working, he contacted the manufacturer, Lifeward, for a fix. Their response was "sorry, it's too old".

After 371,091 steps, Straight's high-tech legs were benched by a \$20 wristwatch battery.

"Really, a \$100,000 machine, but a very cheap battery is why I can't walk," Straight fumed on Facebook.

Determined, he launched a huge social media campaign, went on TV, and rallied the horse industry about medical mobility devices that are not easily repairable.

Lifeward finally caved, fixing the exoskeleton.

But for a while, it seemed a dead battery had beaten a man who had once been bested by

Breast self-check a must

REGULAR self-examinations are critical for the early detection and treatment of breast cancer, and one breast surgeon, Associate Professor Sanjar Warrier (pictured), has developed a method to help women during the process.

Dubbed the 'look, lift, feel' method, women are required to stand in front of a mirror, shoulders straight and arms on hips, to look for any changes in size, shape or symmetry of their breasts.

Look for dimpling, puckering or any changes in skin texture.

"Then lay flat and lift your arm up over your head and with two fingers together, using the pads of each finger, place gentle pressure on the breast, moving your fingers around in a circular motion.

"Cover the entire breast from top to bottom and side to side," suggested Warrier.

"Also feel up under the armpit, change sides and repeat."

Women should also look for any changes or unusual lumps, thickening or hardened knots, or nipple discharge.

While most issues are benign, it is always important to see a doctor.

Colour change usually occurs due to general ageing and/or



pregnancy, although it's often overlooked as a symptom of the presence of breast cancer.

It is especially abnormal if it occurs only in one nipple.

"A woman's risk of developing breast cancer increases with age.

"Over 75% of breast cancers fall into the 50 to 74 years age group.

"Regular breast screens are the best way to find cancer early," Warrier said.

Self-examinations should take place once a month.

Women aged 50-74 are invited to a free two-yearly mammogram through Breastscreen.

Those aged 40-49 and over 74 are eligible to receive a free mammogram, but do not receive an invitation. IHM

Mental strain up

A MENTAL health leader is calling on the government to address the rental crisis on the Sunshine Coast.

"Affordable housing is a cornerstone of recovery for those with mental health challenges," said Carmel Crouch, MD at STEPS, provider of mental health services.

"We need urgent action from all levels of government and the community to address this crisis, not just for the general population but especially for those with mental health issues who are being disproportionately affected."

According to figures from the Everybody's Home campaign, low-income renters are spending up to 58% of their income on rent.

A 2023 report from Mental Health Australia found that for 20% of individuals, financial barriers stop them from accessing support.

"Many are already dealing with complex mental health issues, and the added strain of trying to find secure, affordable housing is pushing them to breaking point," explained Crouch.
