AUSTRALIAN Pharmaceutical Industries this morning announced that it's signed an agreement for the sale of its Price Attack franchise business.

Statin study

RESEARCH released this week at the American Heart Association congress in Florida has found that the addition of statins to other treatments didn't significantly improve the survival of advanced heart failure patients.

The first ever statins outcomes study reported a "not statistically significant" 8% reduction in the combined primary endpoint of cardiovascular death, myocardial infarction or stroke in patients receiving rosuvastatin.

"The findings of this study tell us that statins do reduce heart attack and stroke in patients with heart failure but the other benefit that was hoped for, a reduction in death from pump failure, was not forthcoming," said Professor Philip Barter of the Heart Research Institute in Sydney.

DOCTORS in India have begun a marathon operation on a twoyear-old girl who was born with four arms and four legs.

The eight-limbed child, who's named Lakshmi after the fourarmed Hindu goddess of wealth, is joined to a "parasitic twin" which stopped developing in the womb, in a rare condition called isciopagus.

The surgery aims to give the girl a normal anatomy, with her parents hoping the operation will stop passing circuses from trying to buy or kidnap her.

AND while we're on the subject of limbs, a team of English scientists will travel to China shortly to fit a prosthetic leg to an injured panda.

The doctors from the University of Salford said the panda, named Nui Nui, has been unable to feed itself since losing a leg in a fight.

Dr Glyn Heath warned that more than one artificial leg may be required because the animal "may well reject it by means of trying to chew on it, eat it, whatever".

ANTI-VENOM needed here? A Texas man has beaten his own world record this week by sitting in a bathtub together with 87 rattlesnakes.

Jackie Bibby, who's also known as the 'Texas Snake Man', spent 45 minutes with the reptiles, beating his previous mark by 12 snakes.

The snakes slithered all over hi during the attempt, but Bibby said the key to not being bitten was to "stay completely still".

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
