Europe PI proposal

UK regulatory authorities are seeking feedback on a proposal which would allow pharmaceutical companies to "disseminate certain information on prescription medicines directly to patients."

The move aims to provide a framework for the provision, particularly via the internet, of "non-promotional" information about medications in Europe - with the current ban on direct consumer advertising maintained.

The European Commission has estimated a substantial annual financial benefit from the proposal due to better consumer awareness of symptoms, earlier treatment, better interaction with health professionals and more compliance.

THE first ever mobile blood bank for dogs has launched in the UK, and is now on the road and looking for canine donors.

It's an initiative of Pet Blood Bank UK, a charity established in March 2007 to collect, process, store and supply pet blood.

Dogs who visit the specially designed trailer are given a meal afterwards, as well as a goody bag of toys to thank them for their donation.

It takes about 7 minutes to give blood, and pets are also given a quick check-up.

"We have always had a shortage of donors, so it is exactly the same as it is for humans," said director Wendy Barnett.

"If you went into hospital, you would expect the blood to be there. We are aiming to ensure it's the same for our pets," she said.

A BRITISH woman has lost 25kg in just four months after being hypnotised into thinking she'd had gastric banding surgery.

The 35-year-old had five sessions of hypnotherapy, which involved her being talked through every step of the procedure as though she was in an operating theatre.

She now believes her stomach is the size of a golf ball, and feels extremely full if she tries to eat large portions of food.

Reports say the same clinic has successfully used hypnotherapy to help people stop smoking.

ASTRONAUTS aboard the International Space Station have toasted each other's health - for the first time using recycled urine.

NASA says its Mission Control gave the space travellers a "go" to drink water purified by the station's new recycling system.

"This has been the stuff of science fiction," said one of the engineers behind the system.

"Everybody's talked about recycling water in a closed loop system but nobody's ever done it before," he said.

Reports don't say how the recycled urine tasted.
