3 new therapeutic groups

THE government yesterday unveiled the establishment of three new therapeutic pharmaceutical groups, as part of the Mid-Year Economic and Financial Outlook.

The new groups will cover selected biphosphonate drugs and selected antidepressants on the PBS, and as for existing groups will "use the cheapest medicine in the group as the basis for the price paid for other medicines within the same group."

The government estimates that the move will save \$48.2m over four years from 01 Apr 2010.

Medicines Australia is furious at the move, saying it's "effectively an unannounced price cut.

"It is a substantial blow to companies who have negotiated a fair price in good faith with the government," said Medicines Australia acting ceo Brendan Shaw.

"Reimbursement prices to manufacturers in Australia are already 19% lower than the OECD average...The pharmaceutical industry does not expect the government to pay over the odds, but industry doesn't expect to be

He said the ongoing erosion of payments to manufacturers under the PBS undermines the industry's

ability to bring new medicines to Australian patients.

The budget update also confirmed the deferred implementation of major changes to reimbursement for chemotherapy drugs which would only fund the amount of active ingredient used, rather than the number of vials used.

The deferral will reduce savings to the PBS and RPBS by \$36.3m in 2009-10, with the delay to "allow further consultation with industry stakeholders to address implementation issues"

Other measures revealed in the Outlook include \$2.5m in continued funding for the National Skin Cancer Awareness Campaign and the ongoing impact of H1N1 influenza, with \$229.6m over five years in response to swine flu for the storage, compounding and distribution of antivirals and personal protective equipment, and purchase of H1N1 flu vaccine.

Byetta label revision

THE US Food and Drug has asked for labelling changes for type 2 diabetes medication Byetta (exenatide) to include new safety information about possible kidney function problems, including kidney failure.

The FDA says it's acting on reports it received over a four year period regarding 78 cases of kidney-related side effects.

Arthritis pain

THE government has removed the Medicare benefit for pain relieving joint injections for children and people suffering from severe arthritic conditions.

Arthritis Australia is outraged at the move, saying will end up costing more money than will be saved.

"The net profit that a doctor made from such an injection was \$2, as opposed to a significant loss now that it isn't reimbursed," said Dr Lou McGuigan, vice president of the Australian Rheumatology Association.

"This is a budget measure made without consultation - and by people who had no understanding of the technical aspects of the joint injections. We've offered the government some solutions but they haven't responded to them," Dr McGuigan said.

Indigenous Institute

THE government has provided \$312,000 to help establish the new Institute for Urban Indigenous Health, which was today launched in Brisbane.

Minister for Indigenous Health, Warren Snowdon, said the institute would integrate health planning and servicing within Brisbane and the surrounding regions to meet the health needs of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population.

"The majority of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people reside in urban centres and addressing access to services for these people is crucial to closing the gap in health status between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians.

"This Institute will go along way to a coordinated/integrated approach to the planning, development and delivery of primary health care services to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander populations within the region, involving Indigenous-specific and key mainstream providers," he said.

UK drug chief sacked

Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs has been sacked by the UK government over a comment that alcohol and cigarettes cause more harm than ecstasy and cannabis.

"For some members, these matters are of such seriousness as to raise the question whether they can, in good conscience, continue on the council," the group said.

The ACMD was established in 1971 to offer independent advice on drug use and the appropriate scheduling of illicit drugs.
