THE Therapeutic Goods Admininistration has designated Cegdarglen Investments' C1 esterase inhibitor (Cinryze) as an orphan drug.

The medication is indicated for the treatment, routine provention and pre-procedure prevention of angiodema attacks in adults, adolescents and children from six years of age with C1 inhibitor deficiency.

A TRIO of tourists from Spain have had a salutary lesson in hygiene during a holiday in New Zealand this week - a session of picking up public poo.

Police were alerted about the travellers by a member of the public, who said they were parked in a residential street in the South Island town of Te Anu, allegedly defecating in public.
