### Visit your pharmacist

AUSTRALIA'S peak pharmacist representative organisation, the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA), has called out to consumers to pay a visit to their community pharmacist to prepare for the well publicised PBS medicine changes taking effect from 01 Jan 2016.

With some 17 types of overthe-counter medicines, including paracetamol and aspirin, delisted from the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) (PD 04 Nov), PSA national president Joe Demarte said patients with chronic conditions who normally paid for a PBS prescription will be affected.

"Pharmacists know from previous experience that changes to PBS rules can cause confusion for patients and carers, especially during the Christmas holiday period," Demante explained.

# Pharmacy as first choice

### First-aid kit fail

THE Federal Court has ordered that Safety Compliance pay penalties totalling \$515,000 for making false or misleading representations to small businesses in connection with the supply of safety wall charts and first aid kits following a challenge by the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission.

The Court also ordered that the three individuals associated with Safety Compliance: Dean King, shadow director, Shane Black, gm, and Fiona Schimmel, a director, pay penalties of \$125,000, \$30,000 and \$10,000 respectively for their involvement in some of the contraventions.

### New phcy resources

MENTAL health resources for pharmacists have been given a boost today with the release of an innovative mental health resource sheet and the final report of the Eastern Melbourne Partners in **Recovery Pharmacy Integration** Project.

The project was developed jointly by the Victorian Branch of the Pharmacy Guild and EMPHN's program, Eastern Melbourne Partners in Recovery (EMPIR).

EMPHN ceo Robin Whyte said the project was one of the first of its kind in Australia.

"This report and the resulting resource sheet show that pharmacists in our region are willing and able to assist consumers suffering from ill-mental health," Whyte said.

"In the report, 53 local pharmacies were consulted to explore the ways community pharmacy could provide support to people with mental illness and any existing barriers."

Victorian branch of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia president, Anthony Tassone, said the mental health resource sheet should help begin to build pharmacists' expertise in sourcing health system referral and navigation tools.

HUMANS are not the only species that thrive on the summer festive season, with mosquitoes also enjoying the fact that an easy source of blood is facilitated by our outdoor activities becoming commonplace in Australia, warns SA Health.

SA Health director of health protection Dr Chris Lease said mosquitoes are not only a nuisance but can also carry potentially serious diseases.

"Most of the time mosquitoes leave us with only an irritating and itchy bite, but in some cases mosquitoes can transmit diseases, some of which can result in long term, debilitating symptoms," Lease said.

He went on to say that in South Australia and eslewhere, the most common mosquito-borne illnesses are Ross River Virus and Barmah Forest Virus, and while the majority of people fully recover from these illnesses in time, the symptoms can still be very severe.

"Symptoms of mosquito-borne diseases can include joint or muscle aches, a rash, fever, chills and headaches, so anyone experiencing these symptoms should visit their doctor for advice.

"In recent years there we have also seen the re-emergence of the rare but potentially fatal Murray Valley Encephalitis virus, and that is why it is so important for people to avoid mosquito bites."

SA Health recommends covering up with clothing, using an insect repellent which contains DEET or picaridin, and eliminating mosquito breeding sites, such as areas where water can pool and become stagnant, such as pot plant water trays, old tires and even bird baths.
