Australia key for GSK OTC

GLAXOSMITHKLINE Consumer Healthcare is set to heavily target the Australian market, with the company saying the business here has "huge potential".

GSK Consumer Healthcare head for Asia-Pacific, Middle East and Africa, Zubair Ahmed, has confirmed GSK will invest strongly in its local operations, boosting its staff and "advertising disproportionately" to maximise its growth potential here, according to a report in The Australian today.

He said the OTC category in Australia had doubled in the last decade to almost \$9 billion.

'You have a large ageing population...consumers' knowledge and self-education is pretty high and per capita spend on health care in Australia is pretty high," he said.

Mr Zubair said GSK would look at tailoring products for Australia, similar to the creation of Panadol Osteo, which is now its biggest single item in the local market.

"The brands will be global but the formulation and packaging will be different," he said.

J&J HaTCHathon winners

JOHNSON and Johnson has announced the winners of its inaugural Health and Technology Challenge (the HaTCHathon event), held from 9-11 Sep in Sydney.

The weekend-long 'hackathon' challenged participants to create innovative solutions for healthcare problems including obesity, medication compliance, patient empowerment, the burden on the hospital system, and rural and regional access to healthcare.

The 'KneeHab' team (pictured courtesy Joshua Concepcion) was awarded the top prize of \$8,000 and the opportunity to work with the Johnson & Johnson Australia Family of Companies to consider commercialising their idea, which



uses a wearable connectable device, namely a smartphone, to improve patient compliance and treatment outcomes for knee rehabilitation after a reconstruction.

The runner-up team named 'JAX' developed an electronic monitoring device, called "Forget me not", to help carers of the elderly to monitor medication compliance.

New orphan drug

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration has advised of the addition of Orfadin (nitisinone) to the list of designated orphan drugs.

Orfadin is sponsored by Orphan Australia Pty Ltd and is indicated for the treatment of hereditary tyrosinaemia type 1.

Cochrane ticks vit D

A NEW Cochrane Review has been able to demonstrate that asthmatics given vitamin D had fewer severe asthma attacks that needed treatment with antiinflammatory tablets, namely oral corticosteroids.

The review also showed vitamin D reduced the likelihood of attending hospital for an acute asthma attack from 6% of patients to around 3%, but had little or no effect on day-today asthma symptoms or breathing tests.

No serious side-effects of vitamin D occurred at the doses tested and the evidence reviewed was graded as of high quality - CLICK HERE.

Illegal druggist jailed

PEPPINO Fiori, 66, from Oxted, Surrey, South of London, has been jailed for 12 months for importing and selling potentially dangerous steroids and unlicensed medicines for the treatment of erectile dysfunction and depression, the UK Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) has announced.

MHRA investigation enforcement officers found more than 69,000 doses of illegal drugs in Fiori's home with an estimated street value of nearly £210,000.

MHRA's head of enforcement, Alastair Jeffery said "Unlicensed medicines can be dangerous as they may contain impurities, incorrect ingredients, and there is no way of knowing if they are manufactured to acceptable standards of quality and safety."

SO HOW do colourful coastal cephalopods (cuttlefish, squid and octopus) do it, or know to do it?

Change their skin colour, that is, to match their environment as an effective camouflage - because scientists from the Queensland Brain Institute have now found out that they are pretty much colour-blind, in spite of their quick-change tricks.

It doesn't sound like an intuitive jump, but Professor Justin Marshall and Dr Wensung Chung that these "remarkably intelligent" animals (pictured below) can however adjust their visual focus, from green in coastal waters, to blue to match deep sea conditions when necessary.

The study was published in Proceedings B, was funded by the Australian Research Council. **CLICK HERE** for the abstract.
